The Empire of the Cittle King, Fast Fed

ing Away. In a conversation with a well known and rustling cattle owner, the fact, be coming more and more apparent every year, that cattle raising in Eastern Oregon as a separate industry is gradually becoming unprofitable, was developed becoming unprofitable, was developed. The numerous herds which roamed the hills in the past, some of them numbering way up in the thousands, are now nearly extinct, and a thousand head of cattle is now considered a "big band" where formerly it was merely a "small bunch." The large and fertile ranges, covered with the succulent buncherass covered with the succulent bunchgrass which were the empire of the cattle king in the long ago, are gradually being in vaded and monopolized by the settler, fenced in and plowed, and soon not only every foot of available ground, but bunchgrass, itself, will have disappeared as far as the cattle owner is concerned.

Even in Montana and Texas, where the plains are utilized and occupied only by the cowboy and his herds, the busi ness is not what it was in the past. In Montana the flerce winter blizzards have proven the most dangerous and destructive foe, and in Texas, whose warm climate offers a refuge, the ranges are becoming over crowded with cat le, grass is growing scarcer, and is disappearing rapidly down the throats of millions of hungry animals.

Their cattle, of course, must look to Dame Nature, unassisted by man, for support, while the farmer of the Middle States who has only a few head of cattle has an immeasurable advantage, in that he can easily raise food for their sustemance.

Thus the magnificent bands of cattle, with their daring cow-boy herders, and the cattle king who numbers them among the cattle king who numbers them among his princely possessions, with all the romance and imagery with which the writer loves to endow them, must soon disappear, and the more plebian and common-place farmer, with his little herd of blooded stock, will take their place; and perhaps it is better so.
