THE National Association of Wool Growers met in convention at Washington on Thursday last. Resolutions were adopted declaring that while Congress maintained a general policy of protection, the wool-growers and wool manufacturers of the United States have a right to demand that the duties on wool and on woolen and worsted goods shall be adjusted and maintained so as to secure to them the American market. The resolutions protest against the Senate tariff bill so far as it affects wool, and providing for a committee of seven to formulate such schedule of tariff duties for wool as may be deemed just and necessary, and to present the same to the finance committee of the Senate, and urge its adoption. They further declare that the determination of the economic and financial policy of this government is so important to wool growing and all other industries and business of the nation as to require immediate and definite legislation, and if this shall not be accomplished during the present Congress an early extra session of the Fifty-first Congress is recommended.
