THE GOVERNOR AND THE OREGONIAN.

This is why Governor Penney's views in his veto of the Portland water bill were not sustained by the East Oregonian, but if it be levered as the Oregonian says at times it does, it would have agreed with Governor Penney in language very forcible.

As long as the products of labor are taxed the laborer will pay the greater proportion of taxation, though indirectly and unknowingly, and the monopolies, trusts, combines and those interested in them, will continue to rob him of his just dues. The editor of the Oregonian used a good pair of "specks," free from "parallel-headedness," when he wrote his articles on the non-taxation of Portland's water bonds, but the trouble is he lays them aside when he writes about similar questions of as grave importance and value to the people. This is real mean of the editor of the Oregonian, but he does not care and we can't help it. So there now!
