SAD STATE OF AFFAIRS.

Here follows a sample story of the destitution going on in large cities, and which has the effect of setting men to thinking why there should be hunger and distress in the midst of plenty and of peace, and, to those in many instances, who are too glad to work for "bread and raiment" if only they had the chance. Industrial slavery exists, which is the cause of the sad state of affairs. Read the story:

"A little six-year-old girl came crying into a Hoboken police court last Saturday morning. Her mother had been arrested the night before and the little one pleaded with tears for her release. The magistrate said:

"Your mother cannot be released until she returns the watch she stole."

"Why, mamma bought that watch only last night," said the child innocently. "If I get it will you let her go home with me?"

"Do you know where it is?" asked the magistrate.

"Oh, yes," exclaimed the child. "She put it between the mattresses on the bed."

And then a policeman went home with the poor little tot, and, sure enough, brought back the watch."

This woman could not get work, so the inference is she stole the watch with the expectation of pawning or selling it, in order that she might provide for her little children, one of whom was so innocent that she believed her mother had bought the watch with money, the very thing of all others of which she possessed the least. Do not such conditions appeal to the noblest feelings of humanity? Can't men be made to feel that a great wrong exists, and that a remedy is possible? Why not look for the root of the tree of evil, and commence the work of destruction there, instead of trying to diminish it by trimming off its branches, which work has a tendency to more permanently establish it, the same as trimming the branches of a tree causes it to become more firmly rooted until it stands up before a storm like a stone wall. A natural law makes this true, and this law applies to the establishment of an evil with the same force as it does to the strength of a tree. The roots of an evil must be shown before we can successfully plead with men to stop partaking of its fruit, or before they can see the injurious effect it has upon mankind. By united effort the great reform of abolishing evil, the greater part of which is poverty, can be brought about, and to do it we need only to apply ourselves earnestly and at all times. Our work will tell, and the good results will come much sooner than the most sanguine of us imagine.

Mr. H. W. Scott, of the Oregonian, denies emphatically the report that he will be a candidate for United States Senator in 1891, to succeed Senator Mitchell. He closes a paragraph in his paper as follows:

There is nothing more demoralizing to people whose minds are over-strong than a lottery or gambling scheme of this kind. Oregon has done the right thing in legislating against lotteries, and Washington had best follow so good an example.—Oregonian.

Will not the author of the above sensible paragraph please include under his strictness the people who hold vacant land for speculative purposes, and note that they often draw a prize, make a raise and get money without the necessary corresponding amount of labor?
