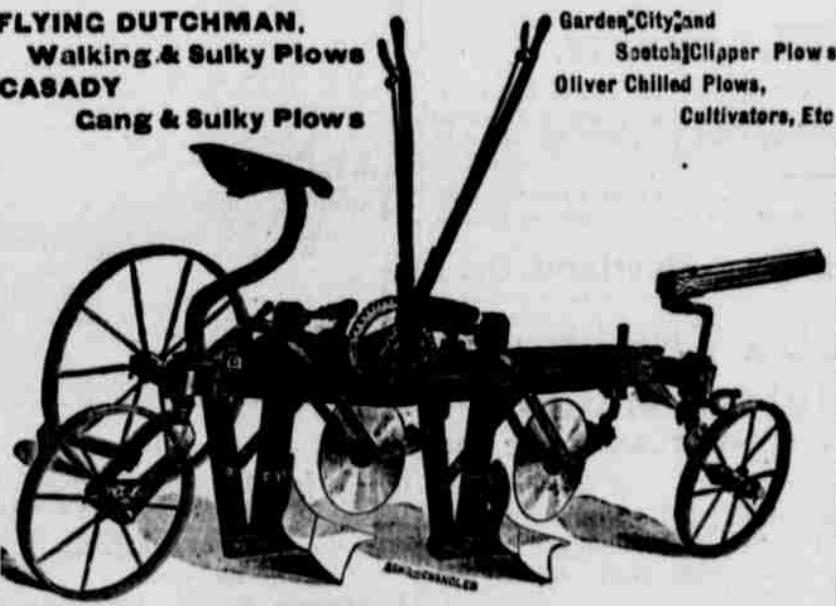

PORTLAND POINTS.

CONGRESS.

To Protect Seal and Salmon Fishing in Alaska—A Contested Election Case.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—In the House Dunn, of Arkansas, from the committee on merchant marines and fisheries, called up the bill to provide for better protection of the seal and salmon fisheries in Alaska.

FOREIGN NEWS.

STANLEY'S FATE. He is Reported to Have Been Killed in a Recent Fight.

PARIS, Feb. 18.—A correspondent of the Petit Journal at Saint Salvador, Congo, says: "A courier has arrived from the West coast, who states that a report is current that Henry M. Stanley was killed in an engagement with the natives near Mougamba."

NAVY MOVEMENTS. KEY WEST, Feb. 18.—The United States steamer Galena with Rear Admiral Genexardi on board has sailed for Port-au-Prince.

THE ENGLISH NAVY. LONDON, Feb. 18.—It is reported that at the coming session of parliament the government will propose a defense loan of £100,000,000, the proceeds to be devoted to the construction of twenty new torpedo boats.

EASTERN NEWS.

A TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

A Boiler Explodes in a Hotel at Hartford, Conn., and Great Loss of Life is the Result.

HARTFORD, Conn., Feb. 18.—The boiler of the Park Central hotel blew up at 5 o'clock this morning, wrecking the entire front of the structure, which was a five-story brick building.

A SIGHT OF HORROR. The main portion of the Park Central hotel, facing on Hugh and Allen streets, fell at 5 o'clock this morning, burying at least fifty people.

THE DEATH LIST. The following is a partial list of those believed to be in the ruins: Louis H. Bronson and wife, M. Walcott, editor of the German Herald, Andrew F. Whiting and wife, D. Wight, H. Buell, a jeweler, Wellington Ketchum, proprietor of the hotel, and wife and son Eddie and brother George, Rev. Perrin, and wife, secretary of the Congregational tract society, W. Tilcock, commercial traveler, Mr. Siedless, a safe agent, William Meymour, and William Skinner, employed in the boiler room, Eddie Boyle, employe of the hotel, Charles Webster, an insurance agent, and Mr. Pond, of Indiana, a Democratic speaker.

HEARTRENDING SCENES. The scenes about the ruins were horrible. In the center of the hotel was man, wife and child. No help could reach them and they finally fell back in the flames and perished in plain sight of the spectators.

THE WORK OF RESCUE. The force of the explosion threw a bed with a sleeping woman in it far out into the street. By 8 a. m. the flames were so far subdued that the rescuers were able to reach the victims.

AT 3 P. M. the bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Bronson were taken out.
