EASTERN OREGON.

Region of Great and Undeveloped Resources.

Eastern Oregon is a region of great and largely undeveloped resources, says J. P. Wager in the Portland Telegram. In it is a large aggregate area of arid and desert lands, but there is enough that is good for something to support in abundance twice the present population of the whole state. It contains fertile agricultural lands, fruit lands, grazing lands, broad prairies, vast bodies of timber, man-made streams and mines of almost uncountable riches. In grain, livestock, wool and gold, the productive districts of Eastern Oregon—and they are large and numerous—can scarcely be exaggerated for natural wealth anywhere on the continent.

The proposed new railroad will, for the most part, run through agricultural and stockraising districts, though it will tap timber belts and may strike through mineral districts, too. It will bring to the Columbia river, which means to Portland, vast quantities of grain stock and other products. Along the line of its construction the country will be settled, and towns will spring up, making an increased demand for merchandise in this metropolis. Other local roads are also projected in Eastern Oregon, indicating, in connection with other enterprises, the great and rapid development of the region.

NEW CANDIDATES.

Some New Names Mentioned for County and Legislative Positions.

Now that the dates of the county conventions of the local parties are drawing nearer, aspirants for the various county offices are commencing to put in an appearance. A great many have announced their candidacy openly, but the majority are yet "in the hands of their friends." Milton has a candidate for county recorder in the person of George Coule. It is understood that Mr. Coule has not yet openly announced himself, but his many friends at that place are pushing him to the front. Charles Barrett, a prominent republican of Athena, has announced that he will be a candidate for the position of county clerk. Mr. Barrett has a strong republican following throughout the county and they will make a hard fight at the republican convention to secure him the nomination he asks for. For the legislative nomination on the republican ticket the names of Tom Kirk and E. L. Barnett have been mentioned. It is not known positively yet whether Mr. Barnett and Mr. Kirk have announced themselves, but the friends of both are using their names for the position mentioned.

As yet very few democrats and populists have made announcements. In a talk with a prominent member of the populist party, and also a member of the central committee of that organization, the East Oregonian was given to understand that the aspirants of both the democratic and populist parties were waiting to see whether there would be any fusion of those parties before announcing their candidacy. "Should there be a fusion arrangement," said the gentleman, "there will be no end of candidates, but if not the rush will not be so great. The majority feel that they will stand a very much better chance of carrying the county under a fusion arrangement than would be the case if there are three tickets placed in the field."

Weston has two prominent candidates. B. B. Hall, of that city, will make a fight for the assessorship, if he can secure the nomination from the populist convention. For the office of surveyor, Frank VanWinkle has announced his candidacy. He has been given the position of school superintendent in the person of Marville Watts, whose name is being used in that connection by his democratic admirers.

There remains about three weeks until the conventions meet to select men for various county and legislative offices, but already there are many candidates in evidence and new names are being added to the list every day.

NEW DOG ORDINANCE.

Councilmen Endeavoring to Get Up a More Favorable Law.

There has been recently considerable agitation in Pendleton over dogs. Since the ordinance has been enforced the ordinance compelling owners to take out license on their animals there has occurred considerable friction between dog owners and the man who is employed by the city to catch the unlicensed canines. A number take the position that the city has no right to kill an impounded dog on which no license has been paid, and to support their theory they quote innumerable authorities on the question. The following opinion of a prominent lawyer has been handed the East Oregonian by a gentleman of the city with a request that it be published: "This lawyer says: 'In the state of Michigan dogs are held to be property and the question arises whether a dog license act is constitutional, which on the face of it permits a warden to destroy property merely because the city has not paid. The Michigan law has not yet been considered by the supreme court, but upon principle I am inclined to the opinion that the act is unconstitutional and that the dog warden killing a dog must take his chances as to a suit that may be brought against him by the owner of the dog. If the act is unconstitutional, the warden killing a dog would not be protected in his act and would have to respond to the owner to the full amount of the value as shown upon the trial against him, should such a suit be brought.'"

The question has also been called to the attention of the city council, and two of the councilmen have taken hold of the matter and are now endeavoring to frame an ordinance in regard to dogs that will meet with more general favor. What their labor has resulted in so far is not known, but the question will be considered at the next council meeting.

A PUZZLE IN POLITICS.

The Question of Joint Senators in the Next Legislature.

Citizens of Marion and Linn counties are in a quandary over the question of joint senators in the next legislative assembly. The number of senators is limited to 30. Until the change in senatorial districts made by the last legislature, Marion and Clackamas had a joint senator. Linn had two senators and Marion two. By the act of February 7, 1899, Multnomah and Clackamas counties were given a joint senator, Marion two senators, Linn one and Marion and Linn one jointly. Section 5 of the act provides: "Senators holding over, representing districts composed of more than one county, shall, when districts have been changed by this act, be considered senators of the districts created by this act in which they reside."

As L. L. Porter, who represented the district composed of Marion and Clackamas, is a resident of Clackamas, it is clear that he will, under the law, be the senator from Multnomah and Clackamas. But there is no joint senator residing in either Marion or Linn. Both Clem and Kelly, of Linn, answer the requirement of holding over, but neither of them was

elected to represent districts composed of more than one senator. They were elected to represent Linn county. If either of them is held to fall heir to the joint senatorship, there is no rule provided by which it may be determined which represents Linn and which represents the joint senatorial district. If a joint senator should be elected, there would be one more senator than the law allows, and there is no provision for getting rid of either of the Linn county senators, although, under the new law, that county is entitled to only one representative in the upper house.

The question whether Marion and Linn counties are entitled to elect a joint senator in June was brought up at the recent meeting of the Marion county republican central committee, but was held aside as not being a proper question for determination by that body.

The only political importance that attaches to the matter is in the fact that Clem, of Linn county, is a fusionist. The election of a joint senator for Marion and Linn would almost certainly result in the choice of a republican. The only chance for a legal decision of the question is that if any political party nominates a candidate for joint senator for this district, the right of the candidate to a place on the official ballot might be challenged and a decision reached in that way.

M'KINLEY AND CARNEGIE.

They Have Come to an Understanding and Carnegie Will Support McKinley.

A Washington correspondent writing to the Seattle Times, says:

Since the time of the Morrison tariff bill through to the last presidential election, there have been no stronger friends than McKinley and Carnegie. The president has ever incorporated Mr. Carnegie's ideas and desires into every tariff bill since he was in congress. Today they are very wide apart, but tomorrow may be very near again. Carnegie has been denouncing the president's policy in the Philippines. In the meantime the president has been giving Carnegie's steel company to understand that the monopoly to furnish armor plate to the government will be taken away from them. Lately, Frick, Carnegie's partner, called the latter to account, informed him that he was hurting business by his attacks on the administration, and then followed the real secret of the present Carnegie-Frick suit. Mr. Carnegie offered to sell Frick his complete interest for \$200,000,000. Frick paid \$2,000,000 as earnest money. The remainder was to be paid in a certain number of installments. The suit was prevented the meeting of the payments.

Carnegie coolly appropriated the \$2,000,000 as a forfeit. Thus the fight came on. The government now threatens to build an armor factory at Newport News. A day or so ago Mr. Carnegie came to visit the president. He told the president he was opposed to his policy, and secretly gave him to understand, however, that he would not be for Bryan or the silver men if the administration would stop the navy department from carrying out its intention of building a governmental armor factory. The conference was warm. Mr. Carnegie left for Pittsburgh, and in a few days an announcement will be made by Carnegie such as was made by Senator Hoar, that while opposed to the Philippine policy, he is against Bryan and free silver, and regards the success of the democratic party as worse than the acquisition of the Philippines. The sensational suit between Frick and Carnegie will be quietly closed up in order to prevent the public from knowing of the enormous profits made out of the government to give its contracts for armor plate to the Carnegie company.
