BACK FROM CALGARY.

W. M. Rudlo Visited the Home of Pat Burns, the Canadian Cattle King.

W. M. Rudlo returned Tuesday evening from a trip to Calgary, Alberta territory, Canada, where he went some time since to look after beef cattle for shipment to Dawson City, says the long Creek Eagle. While in that country, Mr. Rudlo was the guest of Pat Burns, the big Canadian cattle king. Mr. Burns practically controls the beef and cattle output of that section of Canada, including Alberta and several adjoining territories. He has several thousand head of cattle every fall to supply all the various markets in the numerous mining camps of that country. Mr. Burns has also been a heavy shipper to Dawson City in past years, and will likely send another load north this season.

Relative to the beef outlook at Dawson City, Mr. Rudlo says it does not look as favorable as last season, since many small shippers are taking in beef which will result in an over crowded market, and virtually end in all the small shippers' losing business. It is estimated that about 600 head of beef cattle are going into Dawson City over the ice, which are being driven through at a very heavy expense for feed, etc. All of these persons are bound to lose money, since the beef market is very dull on account of the plentiful supply of mutton and caribou.

Mr. Rudlo will arrange to take a small bunch of cattle north on the approach of good weather, but will not ship as many head as he had at one time anticipated.

While Mr. Rudlo is in the north, Mr. Rudlo and the children will make their home in Pendleton.

farmers, stockmen and sheepmen at Pilot Rock are in a Pleasant Mood.

J. E. Smith, the well known sheepman, was in Pendleton today from Pilot Rock. Mr. Smith says that sheep of that section of Umatilla county are being taken out on the spring ranges at the finest kind of condition. They ever were brought in from the winter range looking better than they do in any spring. Their condition is generally healthy and the wool on their backs is much heavier and of a superior quality than it has been for several seasons past. "Sheepmen have occasion to complain," says Mr. Smith. "The flocks of the county are in a better condition than they have ever been before and the wool clip this year is going to surpass that of any previous season in the history of the county. Not only will the yield be larger, but the product will be of a much finer texture and will command a higher price when placed on the market." Mr. Smith is also engaged to some extent in fruit raising, having a large and varied assortment of trees on his large farm in that neighborhood. He says that the neighborhood as a whole, very little damage has resulted from fruit on account of the cold weather.

STOCK AT WILLOW SPRINGS.

Good Prices Offered, but Stockmen Will Not Sell.

George Linsner, a well known farmer and stockman of the Willow Springs neighborhood, was in Pendleton Monday. Mr. Linsner reports that part of the country flourishing and that stockmen generally are feeling good over present conditions and are holding on in the expectation of a considerable rise in the price of beef cattle in the very near future. According to Mr. Linsner, he has been many years since cattle have wintered so well as they have during the past winter. The percentage of loss has been very far below the average and feeding expenses have been comparatively light in proportion to that of previous years. "Without any exception," he said, "this has been an ideal year for the stockgrower. We have had all kinds of opportunity to dispose of our stock the last six weeks, but none are inclined to take advantage of the price that has been offered. Stock have wintered so well and at such a light expense that it has been practically no expense to hold them, and now, that the time has come when they can be placed on the range, there is a comparatively few cattlemen who would care to part with their stock at almost any price.

"We have had plenty of opportunity to sell the last six weeks, because that section of the county has simply been overrun with buyers. All the way from 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 cents has been offered. This is, probably, the best price that has been offered for sometime, but it does not seem to have the result of making any sales. Buyers have left in disgust, being unable to secure even the few scattering head of the small owners.

"For the last two weeks the stock in that section have been fed to some little extent, but this was merely for the purpose of giving them strength to be driven out on the range. Large herds are being driven out daily now and within a very short time the foothills will be covered with them."

BEEF NOT FOR SALE.

Idaho Beef Buyer Falls in His Efforts to Secure Any.

A. W. Frost, a cattle buyer from the Boise valley, in Idaho, has been in this section of Oregon for some days past endeavoring to purchase beef cattle for shipment east. After spending a week here in a vain endeavor to buy any, he has left for the more eastern part of the state. Mr. Frost stated to an East Oregonian representative that he had practically visited every stock-raising section of Umatilla county and also the adjoining sections of Washington, but that stockmen absolutely refused to sell. "No matter what price is offered," said he, "stockmen shake their heads, and positively will not sell. As near as I can judge the bulk of stock in condition for beef was mostly bought up here last fall. There appears to be plenty of range stock, but in my opinion, from the chance I have had of observing the conditions, beef is a very scarce article. Then, the stockmen have been put to comparatively little expense in wintering, the majority not having fed at all, consequently they are in a position to hold for later markets and they can well afford to take the chance. The beef in this section Mr. Frost left for Huntington, where he believes he will be able to secure a sufficient number to make up his shipment.

ATHENAITES IN THE CITY. They Talk a Little Politics and Crop Conditions.

C. A. Barrett, a prominent merchant of Athens, and J. J. Kirk, a well known farmer of that place, were in Pendleton today. The gentlemen were seen this morning at the Hotel Pendleton by an East Oregonian reporter who was given some general and interesting information from that section. As the names of these two gentlemen have been mentioned lately in prospective candidates for political honors the conversation naturally drifted into political channels. Mr. Barrett, who has been mentioned as a possible candidate for the county clerkship, stated that he had not yet so declared himself, but that he would probably make an effort to secure the nomination from the republican convention. Mr. Kirk, who is talked of as a candidate for the legislature, was also more or less averse to making any statement regarding his reported candidacy, but he stated that he would probably be a candidate for the position of representative at the hands of the republican

convention. As yet, said the gentleman, there is but very little interest being taken in political matters, but there is no doubt that Athena will furnish her share of candidates for county positions when the proper time arrives. They stated that the Rev. E. Green, of that city, has announced his candidacy for the county recordership and would make a hard fight for the nomination.

According to these gentlemen, crops never did look better in that section than they do the present spring. "Grain is coming up in fine shape and the acreage yield this season will be much larger than the previous season by a great many thousand bushels," they said. "There may occur something later on in the season to spoil the present bright outlook, but it does not seem possible now. Business is rather quiet for the reason that farmers are busy on their farms and no wheat sales of any consequence have been made lately. It is estimated that the greater bulk of last season's wheat crop is still being held and we cannot argue for much activity in business circles until the surplus holdings are disposed of. Otherwise Athena is going ahead slowly and holding its own with the balance of the county."

"PAUL MOHR'S ROAD."

Three Hundred Men and 150 Horses at Work Near the Dalles.

The Dalles Times-Mountaineer says the Central Navigation & Construction company has 300 men and 150 horses employed in sight of the Wasco county court house; that the company has work contracts for about \$700,000; that it is paying out in The Dalles and vicinity \$40,000 a month and it will have its boats and trains running in and out of The Dalles by the first of June. The Central Navigation & Construction company is building what is known as "Paul Mohr's road," mostly on the Washington side of the Columbia river, with a view of overcoming the obstructions to navigation in the Columbia. By use of boats and trains it is proposed to compete with the O. R. & N. company in the traffic of the Inland Empire, so far as it can be reached by branch lines and wagon roads from river points.

Political Notes.

J. H. Townsend, democratic national committeeman for Oregon, has returned to Dallas, and reports business good there. He says that he has "found much opposition to the imperial policy of the administration." In his opinion many noted men are not so great as Westerners have been led to imagine them. The republicans of Jackson county will hold their county convention on March 31, and the primaries on the 24th. The basis of representation will be one delegate for every 25 votes cast for Governor Geer, one for each major fraction and two delegates at large for each precinct. This will make about 120 delegates to the county convention.

THE MODERN BATTLE.

It Does Not Have the Attractions of Those of Other Days.

Winston Churchill, writing from South Africa regarding the hard fighting that preceded Spionkop, says: "Modern action is very disappointing as a spectacle. There is no smoke except that of the bursting shells. The combatants are scattered, spread over a great expanse of ground, concealed wherever possible, clad in neutral tint. All the pomp and magnificence of Omdurman, the solid lines of infantry, the mighty Dervish array, bright with flashing spears and waving flags were excluded. Rows of tiny dots hurried forward a few yards and vanished into the brown of the earth. Bunches and clusters of brown things huddled among the rocks or in sheltered spots. The six batteries of artillery unlimbered and the horses hidden in some safe place were scarcely visible.
