At Athena there is possibly more interest centered on political matters than any other point in the county outside of Pendleton. Chicago opened 3/4 higher at 60, and after touching 60 7/8 held above 60 nearly all day, closing 67 1/2. There was a good demand for cash wheat for export both at Chicago and Duluth. The heavy shipments last week from Argentina is accounted for as some cargoes which were held back on account of the quarantine.

This morning when Pambrum entered the house where Joseph has been staying, he was horrified to find the body of the man who was the top of his head blown off. The investigation showed that Joseph had used a rifle of large calibre for the purpose of ending his life. The ball entered just over the right eye and the entire top of the unfortunate man's head was blown away. He had, so it appears, been dead several hours when the body was found.

Of late it has been noticed by those acquainted with him that he has been in a very despondent mood.

HAVE REACHED WASHINGTON.

Paul Showaway and Colonel Parsons, Attorneys, at the National Capital.

The Washington correspondent of the Portland Oregonian wires his paper as follows:

William Parsons, of Pendleton, is in Washington, accompanied by Showaway, chief of the Cause band of Indians on the Umatilla reservation. The chief of the Umatillas is expected in a few days. Parsons and the Indians came to Washington to secure some amendments to bills introduced by Senator Simon and Representative Moody, providing for the sale of certain Umatilla lands and for confirming the title of mixed-blood Indians to certain lands. Parsons and the chief will call at the Indian office soon, where the bills are now being considered.

Senator Simon and Representative Moody say that they have no desire to press any legislation which is not for the interests of all concerned. Representative Moody has been pressing these bills before the Indian office, but has finally secured a favorable report with minor amendments from the Indian commissioner on the bill for selling the unsold Umatilla lands. The commissioner, however, in line with action taken by his predecessor, has reported adversely on the mixed-blood bill, and there is little hopes of this bill passing.

The Indian appropriation bill, as reported to the senate, contains the amendments offered by Senator McBride, namely, \$7500 for water works, electric system, etc., at Klamath; \$20,000 for a brick dormitory at Salem and a provision that the Siletz and Alsea Indians receiving their share of treaty payment shall not pay interest on the remaining funds.

Washington, March 16.—Representative Wilson of Idaho has introduced a resolution requesting the secretary of the interior to inform the house as to the number of acres now included within the forest reserves belonging to the land grant railroad companies, the amount of forest reserve scrip issued therefor, market value of said scrip and the estimated value of land in lieu of which the said scrip was issued, together with a statement showing whether the request for the creation of the said forest reserves came from the people residing within the states where the said reserves are created or from land grant railroad companies who have thus been enabled to exchange lands of little value for forest reserve scrip worth many times the value of land in lieu of which it is issued.
