COYOTE SCALP BOUNTY. Some 462 representing a value of \$924 in Two Months. County Clerk Burroughs has just completed the certifying of the certificates for coyote scalps in this county for three months ending March 1. The number of scalps received is 462, representing a bounty of \$924. The certificates have been forwarded to the secretary of state today. The largest amount brought in by any one individual was received from Henry Balkin of Elko, who turned in 35, for which he will be allowed the sum of \$70. This is the largest number of scalps that any one man has brought in since last July, the books in the clerk's office showing that in that month Charles Harrison a Pendleton man, received \$80 for coyote scalps. At the present rate of disposing of this destructive animal it will not be very long before the coyote in Umatilla county will cease to exist.

CLARK WOOD IN TOWN. Politics Have Not Yet Disturbed the Neighborhood, Says the Leader Man. Clark Wood, of the Western Leader, is in Pendleton today, having arrived here Friday night. Clark says the town of Weston is now very quiet, but attributes this to the fact that the farmers are all busy planting their spring crops, and have not the time to pay any attention to other matters.
