ASSOCIATION AFFAIRS THRIVING.

Many New Members and Some Progressive Plans.

Saturday evening the Pendleton Commercial Association held a special meeting and transacted several important items of business. One was the election of sixty business men to membership. The other was the proposition and its partial consideration to build a town hall and home of the association combined.

Judging from the proceedings of the last three meetings, the association has been aroused to renewed life and will exhibit considerable life and energy under the vigorous and efficient leadership of the president, Judge Fee.

Besides the taking in of new members and the discussion of plans for the erection of a town hall, there was an expression of opinion as to the general lines along which the association should work. The discussion brought common agreement that the association can best work through committees. It is the belief that by the appointment of committees to take into various subjects which come up and the return of exhaustive and interesting reports by the committees, the association can be kept interested and will back any legitimate plan or project which may be proposed.

The Town Hall Plan.

The plan referring to the town hall was proposed by Mayor W. W. Hoyt, who, although a member of the association, attended this time in the capacity of a representative of the city government. He spoke of the need for a town hall in which the business of the city could be transacted and all payment of taxes stopped. His idea was that the city and the association could together contribute the money to erect the hall and both thereby in the future avoid payment of any rent.

The proposition was received with general enthusiasm and appeared to meet with approval. At the present time, the plans are necessarily crude and incomplete, but in brief involve the purchase of a suitable site and the erection thereon of a building in which the city officers would find room and the association as well have comfortable quarters. To mature at the present time rests with a committee, the members of which are:

C. B. Wade, Dr. C. J. Smith, Mayor Forester and C. C. Taylor. Robert Vincent who was appointed to membership has since declined to serve on the ground that he should represent the city only in the matter.

Irrigation in Malheur.

The northern end of Malheur county as shortly to be supplied with a water system, which will render fertile some 60,000 acres of what is now a sagebrush patch, according to W. G. Whitney, a fruitgrower, who resides near Payette, Idaho, just across Snake river from the land to be reclaimed, which is known as Dead Ox flat. Mr. Whitney says a Boston company is now engaged in damming the Payette river 35 miles above the town of Payette, and that electric power will be transmitted to the Oregon bank of the Snake, where pumps will be worked to raise the water for irrigating purposes on Dead Ox flat.

"HALL OF FAME."

A Mysterious \$100,000 Subscription Doubtless Came from Miss Gould.

The American Pantheon, the completion of which is now assured by the gift of \$100,000 from an unknown donor (generally supposed to be Miss Helen Gould) will, when finished, present a semicircular colonnade 500 feet long, and 100 feet high, facing the Hudson. As Miss Gould refuses either to deny or affirm that it is she who has given the \$100,000, nobody entertains any doubt as to the identity of the benefactor. The Pantheon is to be called "The Hall of Fame for Great Americans." It will contain, when all the niches shall have been filled, 150 panels inscribed with the names of Americans deemed great enough for the honor. Of this number fifty are to be selected during the year 1900, and thereafter five additional names are to be chosen every five years. Thus it will be seen that the last of the names will not have been inscribed until the year 2000. The conditions upon which the gift is made render it possible for any American born man or woman to have his or her name preserved in the hall so long as the judges pass upon his or her ability and apperance. One of the qualifications fixed by the donor is that the candidate shall have been dead at least ten years. The name must be approved first by the university senate, then passed upon by a jury of 100 learned men, and finally ratified by a two-thirds vote of the senate.

SEED FROM ENGLAND.

It Costs \$8 a Bushel but is Worth the Money.

The highest price ever paid for grain in Walla Walla was paid Friday by W. H. Reed, says the Union. He bought one bushel of barley and a bushel and a half of oats and they arrived from England yesterday, costing, delivered at Walla Walla, \$20 or \$25 a bushel. Mr. Reed bought them for seed and believes \$8 a bushel a low price provided they yield as many bushels per acre as is claimed for them. They have been bred up by years of crossing and selection so that the barley has a solid head, like wheat, instead of but four rows of grain. The barley head became so heavy that the straw had to be strengthened to carry it. The introduction of any new variety of grain which will increase the yield per acre adds to the wealth of the county not only in the annual crop returns but in the value of farm lands.
