BYRAN TO VISIT PENDLETON.

Arrangements Are Partially Completed by Local Democrats.

W. J. Bryan will visit in Pendleton on Thursday, March 29, next week. The local arrangements have not yet been completed, but are being considered by the county chairman, W. M. Pierce, and the state committee-man for Umatilla county, A. D. Stillman. The present expectation is that Mr. Bryan will arrive in Pendleton from Portland on the morning of Thursday, and speak here at 1 o'clock in the afternoon. He will then be taken to the Walla Walla on the train, which leaves at 2 p. m., but which will probably be held on that day to depart at about 4 o'clock. These arrangements are likely to be carried out without change, and further announcements will be made, giving more particularly the program for the day.

M'DONALD-HUSON CASE.

Is on Trial in Justice West's Court This Afternoon.

In Justice Peter West's court this afternoon, the case of J. H. McDonald vs. L. M. Huson is on trial again. Five months ago, the case was begun in West's court by McDonald, who sued for \$47.50 alleged to be due for wages. The case was in both West's and Reubenberg's courts and finally resulted in a judgment being secured against Huson. Costs were paid up until they amounted to \$45. Attorney J. T. Hinkle for Huson secured the re-opening of the case to the justice court on a writ of review in the circuit court, on trial again this afternoon. Thomas Fitzgerald represents Mr. McDonald, Col. Parsons having had the care of his interests when the case was begun.

Political Notes.

The democratic county central committee of Yamhill county has fixed Saturday, March 31, as the date for primaries, and April 7 as the date for county convention, to elect delegates to the state convention.

A. Noltner, editor of the Portland Weekly Dispatch, and a representative old-line democrat, who refuses to fuse with populists and other disgruntled politicians, does not favor the nomination of Colonel William J. Bryan by the democratic national convention. While recognizing Colonel Bryan's ability and purity, he thinks such a step unwise and impolitic.

Jack Record, who is familiarly known in nearly every town in Eastern Oregon, is reported as having died recently at the post house at Sumpter from an attack of smallpox.

CATTLE DROPPED IN PRICE.

Growers Not Inclined to Sell at Prevailing Figures.

Umatilla county cattlegrowers appear to demand more than buyers are willing to pay just now, and as a consequence, sales are not being made very frequently at this time. Some time ago, five cents per pound was paid and the stuff was even then not too promptly offered by the growers, who in many instances thought the market would go higher. Cattle have now dropped in value and any sales which are made will have to be at considerably less than five cents.

Growers here being so loath to sell, a sound buyer, W. H. Daughtry, representing the Pacific Meat Company of Tacoma, so the East Oregonian was informed today, has shipped from Nevada 28 cars of cattle bought in Reno, and for which he paid 4 cents for steers and 3 1/2 cents for heifers.

Wm. Gibson has bought from John Boyce an extra fine lot of cattle at 4 1/2 cents for steers; a very fine lot from O. Teal at 4 cents for steers and 3 1/2 cents for cows; and a lot from Spicer, the Stockman, for which he paid 4 1/4 for top steers and 3 1/2 for others of the land.

L. E. West, of Tacoma, has bought from Perard, the sheep man, 900 mutton wethers, paying 4 1/2 a pound for them. Since they average 110 pounds to the sheep, the average price is about 45 a head. They were very fine mutton sheep.

CHICAGO MARKET.
