### PEO IS AFTER SUMPKIN.

Unatilla Chiefstain Wants Scalp of Agency Police Captain.

The Unatilla reservation Indians have a little politics of their own, which agitates the native mind just as much as primaries and conventions do to the whites. The appointment of delegations to visit the national capital, which has been going on of late, has many reasons besides those which are publicly assigned.

One of the reasons why Chief Peo, of the Unatilla reservation, is so anxious to get to Washington, was that he desires to have removed Captain Sumpkin, of the agency police. Peo has no love for Sumpkin, and has been after the captain's official scalp. Some time ago, he made an attempt to have Sumpkin ousted from the captaincy, but the efforts were futile.

Sumpkin, as the head of the police force of Agent Wilkins, has had frequent occasion to arrest Peo's braves for drunkenness, and the "skookum house" at the agency has often held prisoners the followers of the Unatilla chief. This Peo does not at all, and he therefore got out his scalping knife and went after Sumpkin.

Sumpkin is known to the whites as one of the bravest Indians in the country, and one who possesses cool judgment on all occasions. He never abuses his police power, but is just and fair to all. He is, in short, that rarest thing, an unskilled good Indian, and should hold his position. But there appears to be little likelihood that he will be removed, Peo to the contrary, notwithstanding.

### FUNDS FOR TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

Committeemen Procure Amount Asked for, in Two Hours.

T. G. Halley and R. Alexander this forenoon went among the business men and in two hours secured \$100 to defray local expenses of the Inland Empire Teachers' Association.

Buying Cattle. Dr. J. M. Wilson, a well known cattle-buyer of Rawlins, Wyo., has just purchased 100 head of yearling calves from G. C. Parsons, a drover, who has been gathering the stock in southeastern Oregon, for delivery at Ontario, in June. The price paid is not revealed, but it is understood to be in the neighborhood of the prevailing price for yearlings on Eastern Oregon ranges. Dr. Wilson will keep the stock until the calves become adults, when he will have them carried for Chicago markets.

Coming to Pendleton. A dispatch from Palouse City, Wash., in the Spokesman-Review says: "E. M. Lyons & Co. are preparing to close out their stock of general merchandise here, and will remove the store to Pendleton, Or. This is one of the oldest firms in Palouse, and has done an immense business in the past, but owing to the overcrowded condition of business in Palouse, it was decided to make the change. E. M. Lyons, manager of the business, recently returned from Pendleton, where he made arrangements for a store building.

President of Five Banks. Levi Ankey has secured a controlling interest in the stock of the First National bank at Pullman, Wash., and is now the president of the bank. J. W. Housley is cashier. This makes the fifth national bank of which Mr. Ankey is president, the First national of Walla Walla, Pendleton, and Baker City, the bank at Dayton, Wash., and the one at Pullman.

No More Passes. A resolution to put a question upon the indiscriminate issuance of railroad passes was adopted at the recent meeting of the western railroad presidents, held last week in New York, at the same time when action was taken in the matter of curtailing the commission to ticket agents throughout the states. Mr. Egleston, of the Union Pacific, says that the agreement arrived at in regard to "deadheads" would be strictly enforced in the west, the various roads being forced to protect themselves against the rapidly growing abuse of the customer. This makes a voyage which primarily arose from the indiscriminate scribble among the various lines for freight business.

Bank Robbery at Seattle. A daring bank robbery occurred at Seattle Monday afternoon. Two men entered the First National bank about 2 p. m., and seizing a package of currency estimated to contain \$500, made their escape. Employees of the bank pursued the thieves, but unsuccessfully. The robbers are supposed to be expert sneak thieves. One talked to the President of the bank while his accomplice passed quickly behind the counter and secured the money.

Ben Campbell, general traffic manager, and W. H. Hurlbert, general passenger agent, of the O. R. & N., were passengers on the overland today to Portland. Mr. Campbell had been in Omaha, and Mr. Hurlbert in Chicago and New York.

### HOMESSEKERS COMING.

As Many as 20,000 Said to Be on Their Way.

St. Paul, March 21.—It has been estimated by officials of various Northwestern railways centering here, that the emigration movement now under way from the older states to the Northwestern states from Minnesota west to Washington, will exceed 20,000. This is said to be one of the largest emigration movements for several years and one of the most remarkable points about it is that it includes but a very small percentage of foreigners. Four hundred settlers went out on the Northern Pacific last night and as many more from Wisconsin and Iowa have gone through on that line to Montana and Washington.

The usual homeseekers' rates from this city to any point in the Dakotas has been announced by all railroads for today and March 28 and April 4, so that these days show the greatest number of colonists.

The largest movement comes next week when upwards of 5000 actual settlers have secured tickets, many of them having purchased their farm lands so that work can be started immediately.

### CHIEF JOSEPH'S DESIRES.

He Goes to Washington to Appeal to the Great Father.

Spokane, March 21.—Chief Joseph, chief of the Nez Percés, and staff, last night left here for Washington to have a personal interview with the president. Joseph wants his tribesmen, 175 of them, to hold land in severalty and desires that the tribe be removed to the old stamping grounds near Unatilla, Oregon.

Members of the Order of Red Men, of which Joseph is an honorary member, and of the Foresters, are said to be taking an active interest in the petition of the chief and petitions are being signed by officers and members of those orders, asking the Indian bureau to grant Joseph's desires.

Joseph usually in recent years has been making his home on the Colville reservation, but recently owing to the smallpox scare there moved temporarily to the Lapwai reserve. He and his friends came here expecting that R. B. Scott of this city, whom they trust implicitly and to whom they look for counsel in business matters, would accompany them east, but Mr. Scott could not go at present.

### FIRE AT RED LODGE.

The Loss is One Life and \$200,000 in Property.

Butte, Mont., March 21.—A special fire at Red Lodge, Carbon county, Mont., says: Fire started in Hall's general store at 5 o'clock Tuesday morning in the business center of the town and burned to the ground a two story brick block containing three stores on the ground floor and offices of the Red Lodge Picket and the Carbon County Democrat, and Business Men's club, besides a number of other offices; also Freeman's new brick block with its large stock of dry goods and clothing. John Davis, a farmer from Roberts, was killed to death. The loss is about \$200,000.

### Rat Bounty.

Astoria, March 21.—The city council tonight passed an ordinance providing that a bounty of five cents a head for all dead rats delivered to the chief of police. The ordinance will remain in force 30 days. The action was taken as a precautionary measure against the possible appearance of the bubonic plague in the city, arising from ships coming here from infested ports.

### GOOD MEASURE.

Bill Before Congress to Make Transmission of Money Easy.

Senator McMillan, in the senate, and Representative Lentz, in the house, have introduced bills designed to afford an easy and inexpensive means of transmitting money by mail. They provide that all United States and national bank notes, silver certificates and treasury notes of \$1, \$2 and \$5 denomination shall be replaced by new notes to be known as United States post check notes. Fifty million of United States notes of denominations above \$10 shall be replaced with a like amount of fractional post check notes from 5 to 50 cents. The face and back of the notes are to make them "payable to payee named herein" in place of the present "payable to bearer on demand," and the face of the notes shall have a same by mail to the designated payee with such space for receipt and stamp. The holder of any such post check, by inserting the name of a payee and fixing a postage stamp may forward the same by mail to the designated payee and it is redeemable at the postoffice named. The checks are then to be cancelled and new checks issued.

### The Portland Investigation.

J. W. Whalley has resigned as a member of the committee appointed to investigate the charges made against the district attorney's office by the Republican Bar Association, of Multnomah county, and the remaining members of the committee, G. W. Stapleton, R. T. Platt, E. G. Brown and J. F. Boothie are conducting the investigation without a fifth member. Judge Whalley, in a letter to Judge Calk, the president of the association, set forth his reasons at length for declining to
