GENERAL NEWS.

A shipment of \$1,393,080 for the payment of soldiers in the Philippines left the sub-treasury in New York Wednesday.

Chief Joseph, head of the Nez Perces, and his staff are in Washington to have a personal interview with President McKinley. Chief Joseph wants the tribesmen to hold land in severalty and also wants the tribe removed to the old stamping ground at the foot of the Blue mountains, near Umatilla, Or.

Senator Morgan, of Alabama, is quoted in a flat-footed statement saying: "Six transcontinental railroads are trying to prevent my return to the senate. Huntington is also after the seat of Senator Chilton, of Texas." Morgan has for years been the most persistent man in the senate in fighting the Pacific railroads and what was generally known as the Huntington interest.

Albert Sledge, 17-year old, avenged the insults cast upon his mother, Mrs. Bridget Sledge, in Chicago, Tuesday morning, by William Hobson, a boarder, by dealing Hobson a fatal blow over the head with a barrel stove. Leaving his victim dead on the sidewalk in front of the house, the boy went to his room and was soon asleep. He was aroused an hour later by the arrival of the police.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Ankey forces won the battle in the republican primaries in Walla Walla county.

The registration in Linu county is only 2500, only about half the vote of the county, and it is thought May 15 will see the total considerably short of the usual vote.

Two brake beam tourists, one of whom was Max Dutge, formerly a Spokane gambler, and the other, who is unknown, were killed in a train wreck near Madison, King county, Wash., Monday night.

A serious difficulty between three men named Sutherland and W. Freyer occurred in Oakland Douglas county, resulting in Sutherland receiving two severe knife wounds, one in the neck and the other in the thigh. No arrests have yet been made.

F. L. Richmond, of Portland, who sued the Southern Pacific company for \$10,000 damages, is not satisfied with the verdict of the jury for \$925, and by his attorneys, Chamberlain & Thomas, has asked for 13 days' time to file a motion for a new trial, which was granted.

The Columbia River Packers' Association has completed arrangements for the cannulation of all the Oregon Coast salmon canneries, extending as far as Rogue River on the south, and Gray's Harbor on the Washington coast north. The capital of the salmon trust is \$5,000,000.

While spending in his garden last Thursday, says the Bandon Recorder, Robert Lowe dug up enough new potatoes to make a mess. The tubers had grown this winter, and the largest were larger than hen's eggs. The vines were a foot high and showed no signs of frost.

The first step toward what is believed will ultimately result in a coast bound passenger rate war between transcontinental lines, was taken Tuesday, when the Canadian Pacific accepted a large party destination for Washington through the Buffalo gateway at less than tariff rates.

KRUGER AND SALISBURY

Racy Correspondence Between the President and Premier.

THREAT TO HANG KRUGER AND STEYN

Salisbury is Told to Go Ahead With His Hanging, But to Keep His Eye on Lord Cecil at Mafeking.

New York, March 29.—The World correspondent interviewed President Kruger at Pretoria on February 7. "My burghers are fighting bravely," said Kruger, "and will continue until Great Britain asks for peace or withdraws her soldiers. We cannot expect to conquer several hundred thousand men in a day. Even as your forefathers fought against great odds in the revolutionary war, so are we struggling, and even as God was your people, so is He with us."

Secretary Rietz told of a series of communications between the president and Salisbury, concerning prisoners taken by the British at Douglas, and who, although citizens of the Free State, are being tried for high treason. The president would have Kruger directly to Salisbury demanding that the prisoners be treated only as prisoners of war and stated that if they were executed reprisals would be made. Salisbury replied that if Pretoria prisoners were injured both Kruger and Steyn would be hanged. Kruger replied, "Go ahead with your hanging, but remember that your son Lord Edward Cecil is in Mafeking."

Lord Roberts' Advance.

London, March 29.—April 2 is set by the various critics as the probable date of the departure of Lord Roberts' main army from Bloemfontein. The advance, when it occurs, will probably be made by parallel columns along a broad front. Movements of cavalry and part of the infantry towards Glen can scarcely be construed as an actual advance. Only a small part of Gatacre's forces have yet arrived at Bloemfontein and until that movement is completed, it is not likely that Roberts will start for Pretoria.

A correspondent of the Times says the Boer forces have been re-equipped and he is convinced 15,000 foreign troops have been landed to aid the republicans.

Clements at Fauresmith.

London, March 29.—The following has been received from Roberts: "General Clements occupied Fauresmith today without opposition. Colonel Hilder on leaving Lady Brand was attacked by the enemy. One man was wounded and five are missing."

Herbert Gladstone's Views.

London, March 29.—At Belfast today Herbert Gladstone declared it was the duty of the government to make recurrence of war impossible, and that the British flag must wave over the whole of South Africa.

WASHINGTON NOTES.

Beveridge Opposes Puerto Rico Tariff Bill—Army Bill in the House.

Washington, March 29.—The conference report on the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill was agreed to in the senate. Consideration of the Puerto Rican tariff and government bill was then resumed. Beveridge addressing the senate in support of the proposition for free trade between the United States and Puerto Rico.

Pettus moved to strike out the provision for a 15 per cent tariff. The motion was defeated 16 to 33.

Captain Cotton Promoted.

Washington, March 29.—The president has nominated Captain Chas. S. Cotton to be rear admiral.

Army Bill in the House.

Washington, March 29.—When consideration of the army appropriation bill was resumed in the house, McRae attempted to secure an amendment to the provision giving officers and men serving beyond the limits of the United States 10 and 20 per cent respectively extra pay. The paragraph to which the amendment would have been pertinent had been passed and Hull refused to return to it.

A Premature Explosion.

Spokane, Wash., March 29.—Five men were seriously injured by a premature explosion of a blast hole this morning. Twenty-five tons of rock were loosened by the blast and rolled upon them.
