ANKENY WON OUT.

Walla Walla Banker Captured the Primaries First Guns of Campaign.

According to the Walla Walla correspondent of the Spokesman-Review, Levi Ankeny won the primary fight at Walla Walla, and will have a walk-over in securing delegates favorable to him in the state convention. Inasmuch as the Walla Walla primaries were in a sense the opening of the campaign for the United States senatorial election, of 1901-2, the Walla Walla contest will interest politicians on this side of the line. The Walla Walla writer thus sizes the situation: "Walla Walla county will send a solid delegation to the Ellensburg republican convention, instructed to vote and work for the selection of Hon. Levi Ankeny as one of the eight delegates to the republican national convention at Philadelphia.

"That question was determined by the republican primaries in this county today. Returns are in from nearly every precinct, and so far only three opposition delegates are reported elected. The vote was heavy, and stood two to one in favor of Ankeny.

"The contest was one of the most spirited in the political history of the county. It was a battle between factions, and was, in fact, the opening gun in the senatorial contest that will culminate in the winter of 1902-3. It is well understood that Mr. Ankeny is a candidate to succeed United States Senator Turner, and the contest enters into the present campaign from the fact that state senators elected in Washington next November will hold office for four years, and vote for Senator Turner's successor.

"The fight here today was a struggle between the Ankeny and the Wilson forces. It has been repeatedly charged that the Wilson men formed an alliance with the Allen forces, with the purpose of defeating Ankeny and putting him in retirement in his home county. The result today is therefore a severe defeat for the combined supporters of John L. Wilson and John B. Allen.

"In the city precincts a bitter fight waged all day yesterday to get voters to attend the caucus meetings last night, and as a result the primaries were well attended.

"Today the active work of canvassing for the primaries was prosecuted earnestly and carefully. Every voter was urged to be present and do his duty. On the streets the scene was that usually witnessed on the day of a general election. Everywhere was activity and button-holing. The fight for life between the two wings of the republican party was on.

"The county convention will meet at the court house Saturday, at which time eight delegates will be elected to the state convention."

REPUBLICAN TICKET COMPLETE.

Nominees Who Will Stand for the Coming Election in June.

The complete ticket, county and legislative, with the delegation of thirteen who will go to the state and district convention named by the republican convention on Thursday, is:

The closing of the convention was marked with no incident of particular interest, the offices of lesser political importance having been left for the last, and the nomination being hurried through by the delegates who were becoming somewhat weary from the hours of sitting and hearing the votes counted by the tellers.

It is a Moody Delegation.

The state delegation chosen is a straight Moody delegation, and the vote of this county in the second district congressional convention will be cast solid for the Dallas man. This is one of the absolute conclusions that may be drawn from the result of the proceedings. The Moody interests had been entrusted to the care of W. J. Farish, and he will give a sign of relief. He's glad the other fellow has attended to the matter. And if he's a democrat, he will say, "Not by a d— sight. Our party will attend to all this next week in proper shape."

Also, the delegation will support Ex-Judge James A. Fee, of Pendleton, for the district attorneyship and W. R. Ellis, of Heppner, for the circuit court judgeship.

That the congressman, district attorney and judge were regarded as of prime importance was shown by the report of the order of business committee, which placed as the first nomination the state delegation and the representatives, but just what the representatives will do, whether support McBride or oppose him, is not so openly stated. Of that feature considerable speculation is current.

THE PASSING SHOW.

An East Oregonian Reader Writes Some Observations of Convention Day.

The streets of Pendleton were full of interesting studies last evening—the country delegates whose honors sat upon them like spick-span "store clothes;" the town delegates with their made-to-order affability; the aspirants who were nervously watching out of the corners of their eyes to miss nothing, while they paid a divided attention to the man who had them button-holed; the looker-on-in-Venice, who had no personal ambition or interest, and could therefore take all the by-plays in without cost.

There was a tension in the air—not of candidatorial nervousness, for the candidates were puppets in the hands of the showmen behind the scenes. The tension was of another sort—because there was yet to come the grand duel of the bosses—the boss with the suave smile and open countenance, which shone above his federal star like a harvest moon; the lean-faced, silent, inscrutable boss, unsmiling, but alert. And it was to be a contest with all the elements which go to make up a good fight—diamond cut diamond, Greek pitted against Greek. Which would win? There's where the tension came in; and the puppets edged at the black in the wires hidden under their motley garb of "party loyalty," and patriotism, casting apprehensive glances at each other and then back into the shadows of the wings, where their bosses patched up the raveled ends of the numerous ad-

joined ropes. And the looker-on smiled and settled back expectantly for the show.

But all the tension was not with the party which was to have the stage on the morrow. The aspirants on the other side of the political fence were trying to size up the prospects, and their "It-let's-our-funeral!" air deceived not the looker-on. He was wise in his generation, and he beheld the studiously nonchalant faces he knew there were fervent prayers for a duel to the death.

Politics is a pleasant game, a modern, civilized out-cropping of the spirit which in the olden time, when men were not squeamish, found in the gladiatorial arenas of ancient Rome its satiating feast. There is no blood spilled, except perhaps in Kentucky; but there are fights to the death—of hopes of ambition, of manhood, of trust of honor. Ah! It's glorious, if you are high up, on a reserved seat and have sense enough to keep out of the arena. From this vantage you can take it all in, and it is better than a story-book—it is real, a living, breathing transcript of human passions, with its tragical comedy, its pathos and bathos, its curses and its joyous shoutings, its tears—unshed, because men do not cry—and its laughter, out of which the finer note has been drowned.

And the American citizen at the plow, or his desk, or behind his delegate, but the chief political business is "just to vote"—he will pick up his paper this evening, see that a "splendid, strong and thoroughly representative ticket has been chosen," that the country is saved, and the good government is assured—and if he is a republican he will give a sigh of relief. He's glad the other fellow has attended to the matter. And if he's a democrat, he will say, "Not by a d— sight. Our party will attend to all this next week in proper shape."

WHISKY SENT TO SEA.

It Improves the Liquor and at the Same Time Saves Money.

Large shipments of whisky in bond will be made from Baltimore to European ports within the next month or so, says the Baltimore Sun. A shipment of 1500 barrels is now nearly ready for export, and about 4000 barrels more will soon be ready.

While some of the whisky will be sent by Baltimore owners, the most of it will be from Cincinnati and other western cities. After being kept in European warehouses for six months or a year the greater part will then be brought back to this country for sale.

The whisky to be sent out is of the 1891 and 1892 distillation, which must be taken out of the bonded warehouses because the eight-year limit has expired. Whisky may be stored in a bonded warehouse eight years without being subject to the internal revenue tax of \$1.10 a gallon. At the expiration of eight years it must be taken out. Rather than pay the tax and lose the use of the money until the sale of the goods, some owners prefer to ship their surplus stock to the other side and store it there until needed, claiming that the cost of freight both ways and storage in Europe will be less than the cost of meeting internal revenue requirements at a time when there is no demand for the goods. The tax is only required to be paid when whisky is put on the market for consumption, so that goods shipped to Europe in bond are not taxed. They are brought back as required by the demands of the market here. Goods remaining in the country out of bond are supposed to be on the market.

He Tells It on Himself.

When William Jennings Bryan first went to Nebraska, says the Chicago Times-Herald, he was hired to take the stump against Thayer, who was running for governor, and said some hard things against the candidate. "Thayer was elected," Bryan said. "After he took the governor's chair, he was called to be toastmaster at a banquet at which I was set down for a speech. I did not wish to go to that banquet. I did not wish to meet the governor. I remembered all that I had said of him, and I felt cheap. But I went and sat there through the early proceedings quite uncomfortably. Finally it came time for the governor to call upon me. He rose from his seat with the program before him, and slowly said: 'Mr. Bryan—Bryan.' Then he slowly turned his eyes upon me and addressed me: 'Do you speak or sing?' That is all I ever heard from Governor Thayer as to what he thought of my campaign speeches against him."
