CANDIDATES COMPROMISED.

Democratic Primaries Held Today—Convention to Come One Week Later.

Throughout Umatilla county, the democratic primaries were held today for the election of delegates to the county convention. The interest was quite general, although not so general as at the republican primary elections held a couple of weeks ago. The explanation in part for this is that the various candidates had agreed to avoid trouble and the stirring of feeling, and go before the convention without having attempted to influence the primaries. This was true of the judicial candidates, whose interests were regarded as quite important and whose action in obviating primary trouble was appreciated.

The four wards in Pendleton held caucuses Friday evening and nominated delegates to be voted for at the primary elections today. The attendance was good at each caucus, and the meetings were evidence of the increasing strength of the democratic situation in this county.

The convention comes a week from today in Pendleton.

THE PRIZE FIGHT PICTURES.

What a Woman Reporter Thought of the Exhibition at the Fraser.

The East Oregonian on Friday

secured the services of a woman of

Pendleton who was to go to the Fraser

opera house and write her impressions

of the fight of which the biograph

pictures were representative. This she

did, submitting the following report

of the event:

With other guilty souls, I went to

the Fraser last night to see the pictures

of the Jeffries-Sharkey fight, as shown

by the biograph. Everybody else who

happened to be there. "Was passing,

you know, and just ran in." Those

that "just ran in" stayed till the

finish, I noticed. There were lawyers,

doctors, councilmen, other city officials

and newspaper men in the audience

not to mention their wives and other

feminine relatives.

Mr. Sharkey was there, as was Mr.

Jeffries. Both were introduced by Mr.

Wm. A. Brady. A. Brady, who was

Sharkey came out and ducked his

head at the audience, and then Mr.

Jeffries, amid some applause, came

out and did likewise. Mr. Sharkey

looks a bit as if he had wandered

away from the Zoo. He has fan-like

ears and a pompous air. His shoulders

are so large that they look out of pro-

portion to the rest of his body. On

Sunday he wore a cutaway coat and

gray trousers. He did not wear so

much in the ring. Sharkey is not

what one would call a pretty man,

and I don't believe he is ever bothered

with brain fag.

Jeffries is taller and somewhat

better looking, but awkward. We all

gazed at them, probably with much

more interest than we would have had

if they had been intellectual giants instead

of physical giants. The pictures are truly

wonderful. People who saw the fight

say they saw the scenes all over again,

minus the frantic yells of the audience

and the thud of the blows. More than

seven miles of film were used in the

reproduction, which represents over 20-

000 pictures.

I cannot say that any of the women

present seemed to be shocked at what

they saw. They concealed it wonder-

fully well if they were shocked. Prob-

ably it does not shock, because the

shocking features—the sound of the

blows and the thud of the fists—I have

felt relieved since I went, because I

now understand some of the mysteri-

ous terms which come floating across

the corridor from the sporting depart-

ment of the paper.

I saw Jeffries get hit in the "break-

away." I used to think "break away"

was a vital sport. I saw Sharkey

receive a "hammer-blow" and an

"upper-cut." I saw Sharkey deliver a

"pivot-blow." Pivot-blows have kept

me awake nights, wondering what they

were. Jeffries received a punch which

an authority behind me said was "a

nasty jab in the slats." Nasty jab in

the slats, indeed! I should think it

was. It is a wonder it did not break

his ribs.

They pummeled each other and

ducked and feinted, and they hammered

each other again through 25 rounds.

Jeffries gave Sharkey what the man

in the seat behind said was "a jolt on

the point of the jaw." In a few more

seconds it was over, and the people

went to the doors and perked out to see

if there was anybody going by. They

knew them. It was interesting, but I

think the biograph pictures are near

enough to the real thing to satisfy me.

be put in, with a capacity of 28 horse

power. This improvement shows that

management, and deserves the com-
