REGISTER, VOTERS.

Time Rapidly Passing—May 15 is the Last Day.

Up to 3 o'clock today, the total registration of voters for the June election was 2334. This represents a gain during seven registration days last past, from Friday afternoon of last week, of 2.

This is but little more than one-half the voters of the county. Six weeks, up to May 15, remain in which voters may register. At the rate of increase of the week past the close on May 15 will not bring in all who may register.

Voters should remember this and attend at once to their duty in the matter.

Jacob Clemmer made an exhibition of commendable nerve today, just at noon, and hung onto the reins of a runaway team during a dash across the entire town. Mr. Clemmer was at the planing mill on West street with a team belonging to C. B. Wade. The mill whistle blew at 12 o'clock and frightened the horses which started wildly down the street and made the run to the west end of that thoroughfare. Several times onlookers thought Mr. Clemmer would be thrown out and badly injured, but he fortunately remained safely in the wagon until bringing the horses under control.

The United States has sued Myron H. Savage, Henry John Minthorn and Benjamin S. Cook, for \$8023.21, and Deputy United States Marshal Morse, who is here today, has just served the complaint on them. Savage was a special distributing agent at the Indian Industrial school at Ferris, Calif., and had \$15,000 entrusted to him to disburse, which the government claims he did not, and therefore sues him for the balance. Minthorn and Cook were Savage's bondsmen. Savage now runs the Hot Lake, Union county, hotel. He will have 30 days in which to answer.

A WALLA WALLA SAMARITAN

Rather Than Mortgage His Home He Preferred to Die Alone.

In the Walla Walla hospital is an old and worthy pioneer from Shelton, Mason county, Wash., who is almost helpless and sadly crippled up with rheumatism, says the Union. Being a brother Old Fellow some of the members here made the old man frequent and indeed welcome visits. Being informed that the ailing brother might return to his long home at any time, they asked him whether he would not like to see his wife once more. He gazed up at the ceiling for a moment and then said:

"God knows I would like to see her, but to do that she would have to mortgage her little home in order to raise the money necessary, and rather than to see her with a mortgaged home, I prefer to die here alone."

DEATH OF MRS. H. B. GRIFFIN.

She Died at Sumpter—Was a Pioneer of the County.

Mrs. H. B. Griffin, mother of Mrs. Frank B. Clifton, died at Sumpter on Friday of pneumonia. Mrs. Clifton has been there for a week or two attending her mother during her illness, and Mr. Clifton left this morning for Sumpter. The funeral will be in Pendleton on Monday at the church of the Redeemer.

Mrs. Griffin formerly lived in this county, she and her husband having gone to Weston in the early 80's, and residing there for several years. Later, they removed to Cold Spring and still later to Birch creek, going to Sumpter a year or two ago.

Mrs. Griffin was known to a majority of pioneers of the county, and was highly respected by all of them.

BRYAN IN WASHINGTON.

Had Immense Audiences at Numerous Meetings in that State.

A Spokane dispatch says that Mr. Bryan made six addresses in Whitman and Spokane counties and spoke to a total of 35,000 people on Friday. At Colfax he spoke to 7000, and at Garfield to 2000.

At Tekoa he spoke for 35 minutes to 4000. At Farmington 1500 people heard him for 10 minutes and at Spokane he addressed two audiences of 10,000 each, speaking afternoon and evening in a monster tent of the exposition. He was met at the depot there by 4000 people and escorted over the principal business streets through banks of cheering humanity. With Bryan were Governor Rogers and a party of other state officials and they were entertained between speeches at the residence of United States Senator Turner.

Democrats are bringing considerable pressure to bear upon G. A. Hartman, of Pendleton, to accept the nomination for county judge. He is regarded as the strongest possible man for the place, on account of his unquestioned business capacity and his personal high character. It is not known whether Mr. Hartman will accept, as his private business is remunerative and requires his attention. Henry Frazier, of Milton, the prohibition nominee, is also mentioned. R. Laing and W. H. H. Scott are regarded as possible timber in the people's party ranks.

Charcoal injures wool.

L. L. Haines, a Western Washington sheep man, writes the Portland Oregonian and asks if charcoal injures the fibers of wool. He says the first thing the merchant asks who buys his wool is: "Have you a burnt range?" and if the reply is in the affirmative the merchant refuses to give but half-price for it.

The Oregonian says the best information it can obtain is to the effect that charcoal injures the fibers of wool by discoloration and also by affecting the texture. When badly discolored by charcoal, the original luster of the wool can never be restored. Wool clipped from sheep on burnt ranges sells in the market for about two-thirds the price of first-grade wool.

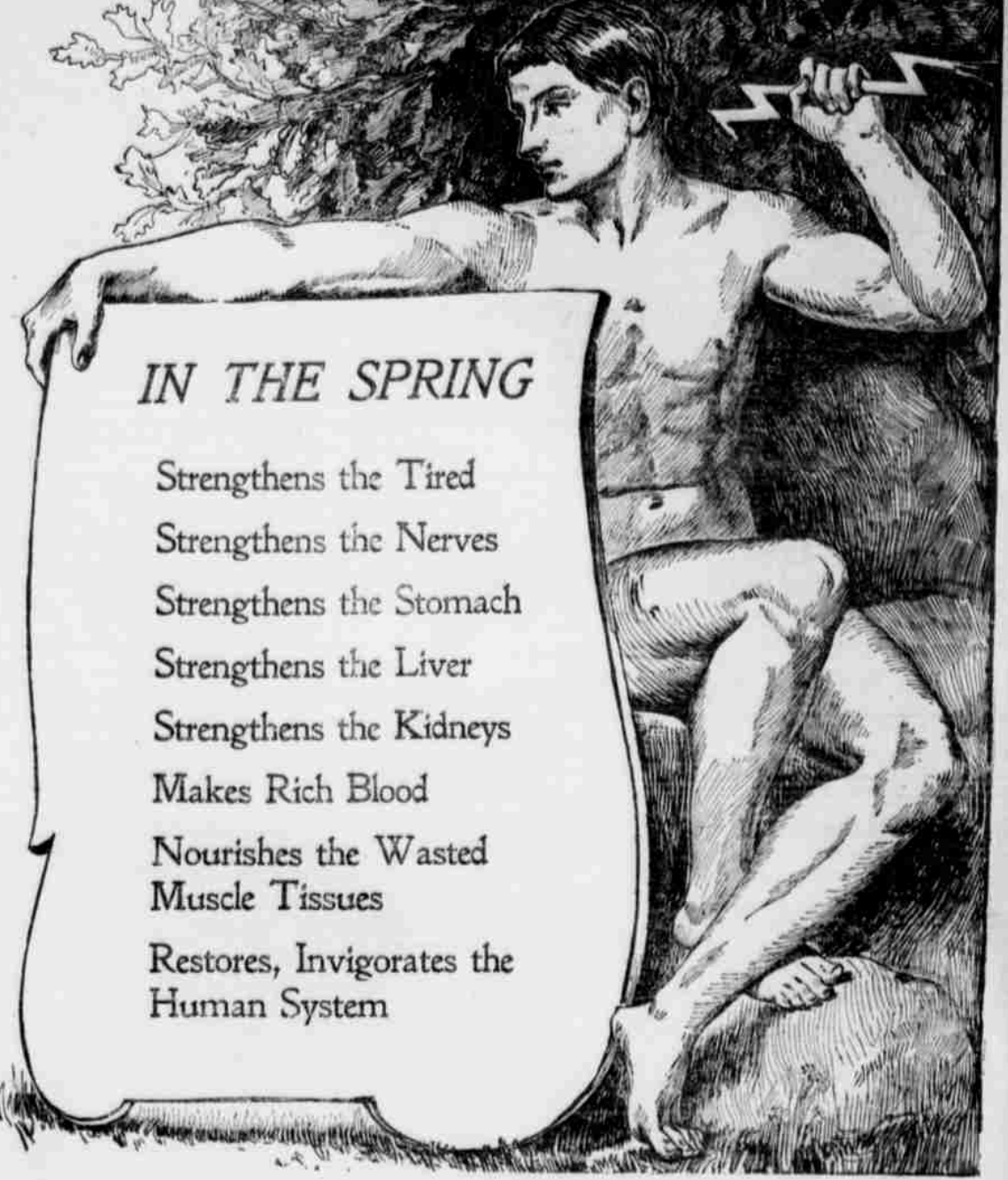
