In the Echo country, this country,

commonly known as the Butter creek

country, 3000 head of cattle have been

fed during the winter and are fit for

market. They are, like the cattle

usually turned out from that region,

first-class alfalfa-fed cattle.

Some of the growers contracted their

cattle many weeks ago, and are de-

livering now at prices above the mar-

ket now being quoted. The quotation

given by Portland buyers now is four

cents for fat beef, the sound being in-

clined to bid somewhat better than

that figure. Cattle have dropped dur-

ing the past few weeks, and those who

contracted earlier in the year are

looked upon as fortunate.

The extra price paid for the Berge-

vin corral lot will no doubt stimulate

the stockmen to attempt to develop the

industry of raising corn in this country,

an industry as yet only in the experi-

mental stage. Only one of the

localities has any corn been raised, and

there only a comparatively small

amount. One shipment of corn has

been made from Athena to the Sound,

which is the only shipment ever made

from Eastern Oregon.

TROUT STREAMS ARE MUDDY.

Catches Were Not Large on the First

Day of the Open Season.

Quite a number of anglers went out

on Sunday, the first day of the season

when fishing is allowed by the law.

The streams are yet muddy, and the

catches were light in most instances.

The Oregon Fish and Game Association

of Oregon has inaugurated an

effort to secure large number of eggs of

the early brook trout for the propaga-

tion of that variety in the streams of

this region.

It cannot be said, however, that no

good sized stories were brought in by

some of the sportsmen, for, in a few

instances, the reported catches were

calculated to open wide the eyes of the

listeners and make them admire the

skill of the anglers who related the

tales.

The streams will clear rapidly, and

soon afford fine fishing.
