ECHE NEWS.

Delegates Elected—Feeding Cattle in Transit—Deputy Assessors at Work.

Echo, Ore., April 3.—Frank Spikes, who has been to Tacoma and Portland, a business connected with his black and seal cures, has returned home. The delegates to the precinct at their primaries held Saturday, the 31st of March, elected J. B. Saylor, Frank Spikes, Ralph Standfield, R. N. Standfield, W. W. Whitworth, and A. J. Utanilla as delegates to the county convention to be held at Pendleton.

The populists at their primary, held immediately following that of the democrats, elected O. Teel, Twig Teel, J. T. Spikes and M. T. Allen as delegates to the populist county convention at Pendleton.

John Dorn and Elmer Spikes were chosen as justice of the peace and constable, respectively, of Echo precinct at the primaries held here.

F. A. Phillips, buyer for Carstens Bros., cattle buyers of Seattle, has been feeding in transit 15 carloads of beef cattle, of these seven carloads having been fed at the Temple ranch at Echo, for several weeks. Shipment was made Wednesday, the 4th.

Miller and Zeeno, the Klondike cattle shippers, have shipped out several carloads of cattle this week. They bought the O. F. Thomson and the R. N. Standfield cattle, which were contracted early in the season. They made the best sales of the season, having sold at 5 and 5 1/2.

Jaron Wilson and family, who have been spending the winter at Echo, will leave in a few days for the new mining towns of Lawton and Granite. Frank Whitworth, of Burns, Harney county, has recently located at Echo, having bought part of the W. W. Whitworth ranch.

The deputy assessors are now at work, and Frank Rack and Charles Lisle are extracting gold and other precious metals from everyone.

"CROP MORTGAGE" STAMPS.

Decision That Will Save Many Farmers Money and Trouble.

A decision just made by the commissioner of internal revenue, which will be of interest to a great number of farmers in Whitman county, Washington, and elsewhere, has been received. Internal Revenue Agent Towne, stationed in Portland, says the Oregonian. The commissioner has heretofore held that "crop mortgages," as they are commonly called—hundreds of which are given by farmers of the Columbia river basin—which contain a provision that in case of failure to pay the note secured by such mortgage, a mortgagee is invested with a power of attorney to harvest the crop and sell it to pay himself—must, in addition to the stamp required for a mortgage, also have a 25-cent stamp for the power of attorney.

The records of Whitman county have been searched and many hundreds of such instruments found, none of which have affixed the 25-cent stamp required by the law, and the makers of these mortgages have been notified that these stamps must be put

THE MARKETS.

Fair Export Demand for Wheat—The Wool Market Depressed.

Portland, April 5.—The Commercial Review in its issue of the day, reviewing the market for the past week, says: "Our market during the past week has been comparatively steady. There has been a fair export inquiry, and on the whole a fair business was accomplished. The shipping demand is not so much for prompt delivery as for later on, there being plenty of wheat on hand to meet the wants of tonnage now in berth. The buoyant tone displayed at other grain centers was generally looked upon as a forerunner of some improvement, and has almost disappeared. Prices at home and abroad have been scaled down again. In Europe wheat has steadily followed the course of American advances, yet at the moment of writing values are about as low as they were before the late rise. During the past week we have heard little or nothing about the discouraging aspect of growing crops, and what ever element of uncertainty is involved in this direction will only be developed as the season progresses. The situation abroad cannot by any stretch of the imagination be considered as promising any material improvement. Wheat is arriving off the English coast, and the amount on passage grows larger from week to week, and as the continental demand is far from important the bulk of the en route wheat must look to the United Kingdom for an outlet.

A general survey of the present statistical position of the cereal, not considering crop prospects, must lead the impartial observer to the conclusion that the outlook does not warrant holders in expecting any material enhancement in prices within the near future. The continued fine weather here on the coast has been of great benefit to the farmer. Spring seeding is going on rapidly, and the few rainy days during the week have been of great benefit to the growing crops. Reports from the interior are that the fall-sown is doing very well, and where seed was sown for spring grain a fortnight ago, the ground is principally covered with green, showing that the same is also in a good condition. In the valley it is reported that a great many farmers will not put in as much acreage as heretofore, but we are unable to fully confirm this as yet. Sales are made daily at this market, and there is no doubt a great amount of wheat will be sold in the next thirty days as the season advances. Prices for Club, 54c; Bluestem, 57c; Valley, 53c to 54c per bushel. Sales have been made from 1c to 2c per bushel above these figures, principally to millers for No. 1 wheat over 58 pounds.

Wheat in San Francisco.

San Francisco, April 5.—A slight advance, amounting to not more than 1 1/2c per cent, was about all that has been done in the market. Owing to the local conditions buyers did not feel justified in bidding up the price simply to get wheat which might either remain on their hands or be marketed at a loss. Exporters have a small amount of tonnage to hand, and the market practically provided for. Freight rates are too high, and with present quotations from London on prompt-shipment cargoes, there is not much of a margin for profit on California wheat at 90c per cent on spot. Rather than take risks on waiting for wheat cargoes on expectations of future advance, shippers prefer to remain on the safe side and work carefully. On the call board a fair amount of trading transpired. Quotations are for shipping, 91c; milling, 91c to 91.02c per cent.

Available Wheat.

New York, April 5.—Trade reports the following changes in the available supply of wheat for the week:

Wheat, United States and Canada, east of Rock, 1,532,000 bushels; west of Rock, 1,532,000 bushels; total supply, 3,064,000 bushels. The aggregate stocks of wheat held at Portland, Tacoma and Seattle decreased 93,000 bushels last week.

Wool in Boston.

Boston, April 5.—Wool is still in little demand. The market shows a tendency to be depressed. Prices though are not materially weaker. Quotations are: Unwashed medium, etc., Missouri quarterblood, combing, 25 to 25 1/2c; three-eighths blood, 25 to 25 1/2c; Georgia, 24 to 25c. Territory wools—Montana and Dakota, fine medium and fine, 22 to 23c; scored, 18 to 20c; staple, 63 to 65c; Utah, Wyoming, fine medium and fine, 19 to 20c; scored, 53 to 55c; staple, 63 to 65c; Idaho, fine medium and fine, 18 to 19c; scored, 58 to 60c; medium, 20 to 22c; scored, 53 to 54c. Australian, scored basis—Combing, superfine, nominal, 93 to 95c; good, 88 to 90c; average, 80 to 85c.

BUYERS WANT DRAFT HORSES.

Dakota Men at Echo Looking for 1200 to 1300 Pound Animals.

M. E. Smith and B. M. Brink, of Elkpoint, South Dakota, were in Pendleton yesterday and left for Echo, where they are today, looking up draft horses for shipment east. They want horses, unbroken, from 1200 to 1300 pounds in weight. They, of course, quoted no prices, and, having made no purchases yet, it is not known how much they regard Oregon unbroken draft horses worth.

Frank Spikes, an Echo horseman, was seen today in Pendleton and asked if there are any horses at or near Echo of the class asked for by the South Dakota buyers. He said in reply that there are comparatively few unbroken draft animals of the weight the Dakota men want, although there are plenty of range animals of somewhat lighter weight. Of broken work horses, said Mr. Spikes, plenty of good ones may be bought in the Echo neighborhood.

At Echo the roundup was completed a day or two ago and the buyers will have a good opportunity to see just what the horsemen of that region have to offer.

SHIPMENT OF CATTLE AND SHEEP.

Sound Houses Purchase Livestock—Some Fine Mutton Sold.

Over the W. & C. R. R. line to the Sound went five cars of sheep to Frye, Bruhn & Co., Seattle, and three cars of cattle owned by George Frohman. The cattle were from Caldwell, Idaho, and are destined for the Alaska trade. They will be taken from the cars at North Yakima and fed for six weeks and then sent on to Seattle for shipment north.

The sheep, were 750 wethers bought by H. A. Walker for Frye, Bruhn & Co., from Joe Connelly, and they brought \$5 each. The lot consisted of 2-year-old wethers, extra fine mutton, the average weight being 122 1/2 pounds. Wm. L. Gibson has sent out this week to the Sound the house and cars of cattle, which he bought from L. A. Spicer, of Pilot Rock, and other stockmen.

THE SHEEP AND WOOL MARKET.

Sluggishness Now Witnessed is Almost Unprecedented.

The present sluggishness of the sheep market is almost unprecedented. Practically no sales are taking place and just as much as ever applies the time-honored expression that "buyers and sellers are apart." A few sheep have changed hands, but comparatively only a few. Both sheep and wool are held by the growers on a basis of radical asking, and the majority of buyers have adopted a waiting policy.

S. B. Calderhead, general freight and passenger agent of the W. & C. R. R. Co., said to the Eastern Oregonian today that he had had no less than a dozen wool and sheep buyers at Walla Walla and Pendleton, looking at the situation and talking with growers. Without exception, the buyers returned with this remark:

"When the growers come down from the clouds I will again attempt to do some business with them."

The Bluffer Bluffed.

Appropos, the Happer correspondent of the Portland Oregonian relates a story which might be entitled: "The Bluffer Bluffed; or a Nervy Sheepman." The story will interest Unatilla county wool growers:

"For several weeks there has been considerable discussion here between buyers and growers as to the actual value of sheep, and they have been apart 25 to 50 cents above. Buyers have claimed that the asking price was too high, and more than the market would warrant, but growers have stood pretty firm, and on the ground that according to Chicago and Omaha quotations in the Oregonian, Happer asking prices were very reasonable. A few weeks ago Robert Foster, an extensive buyer, bought from another buyer 6000 head of yearling wethers at \$2.25 a head, after shearing. Recently he has been offering to sell them at the same price he paid. Yesterday O. E. Farnsworth, a prominent sheepgrower here, took up his proposition and also offered to buy his saddle horses and trail outfit that he has been accumulating, as they read of various deeds accomplished, while to others, the same message brings sorrow, when they note the death or capture of their loved ones.
