Ten Young Men Petition for Authority to Organize.

Jack Lyette, W. P. Felt, W. G. Sutherland, Anton Bollerma, P. A. Anderson, E. M. Meach, E. E. Battimore, E. B. Wadde, F. M. Murphy and D. D. Phelps have petitioned the mayor and council for authority to organize a fire company in East Pendleton precinct. The petition will be acted on by the fire and water committee. It is to be one of the four ward companies which are called for under the reorganization plan which has been adopted.

The council has also authorized the fire committee to enter into a contract with the Boston Woven Hose & Rubber Co., to furnish 1400 feet of hose at 55 cents a foot, free on board Pendleton.

MISS YOUNG REPORTED SAFE.

Telegram from Walla Walla Allays Fears of Friends in Pendleton.

People in Pendleton will learn gladly that no further fear need be felt for Miss Leola Young's safety. At least, at a late hour this afternoon the East Oregonian received a telegram from Hugh S. Young, of Walla Walla, saying that everything is all right, and it had not been supposed that Miss Young was in any danger, but had merely been temporarily from the home of her uncle in Walla Walla.

Upon learning the facts which were current here regarding Miss Young's disappearance, many friends were alarmed, and her family in Athens, where she lived, and relatives in

Walla Walla, where she was visiting, were much alarmed. The facts which were known are:

On Saturday morning last, March 31, Miss Young left Pendleton on the 9:40 train and went home to Athens. There she stopped until the mixed train from Pendleton came along at 3 o'clock, when she boarded the cars and went on to Walla Walla. There Miss Young went to the home of her uncle, Hugh Young, assistant warden of the penitentiary, remaining over Sunday night.

Sunday morning she left the house, saying she would walk up town. She left at the house of her uncle her umbrella, coat and the valise she had taken from Athens, and to all appearances had no intention of remaining away from her uncle's house for more than an hour or two.

When she did not return for some time, later in the day Mr. Young's family caused search to be made, but the whereabouts of the young lady could not be discovered. Continued search failed to reveal any clue as to where she had gone, and few knew that she had met some serious mishap.

Although the telegram of Mr. Hugh Young contained no explanation, it allayed fears of friends here that Miss Young had met with a mishap.

OFFICERS REPORTED CITY BUSINESS.

Transactions for March at the City Hall During the Month.

The council on Wednesday evening received reports from the city officers for March. Treasurer Charles Hamilton reported: Balance, February 28, \$18,310.62; received during March, \$2637.30; total, \$20,947.92.

Paid out, general fund, warrants, \$683.08; water fund, \$4513; called warrant fund, \$24,57; balance of cash on hand March 31, \$18,410.37.

The cash on hand is thus distributed: General fund, \$15,104.41; called warrant fund, \$2767.40; levee sinking fund, \$1331.40; interest fund, \$140; water fund, overdrawn, \$2810.90; leaving balance on hand, \$18,410.37.

Recorder Beck reported total receipts for March \$555.50, fines, dog tax, cemetery lots and street poll tax. On receipts issued by the treasurer, licenses were issued aggregating \$1262.

An ordinance was introduced amending the one controlling the running at large of animals, the new measure providing that the old ordinance shall not apply to the portions of the city included within the following limits: All that portion lying south of Eluff street and west of Aurora street; the amount to take effect so soon as the ordinance be passed.

J. W. Kimbrell's bill, formerly rendered for \$225, for engineering work done for the city, was up again and no action taken.

The salary list for March was passed. It aggregates \$409.35.

An ordinance was presented regulating the storing of oils, powder and dynamite or any other explosives within the city limits.

THE NEW TOWN OF LAWTON.

It is Rapidly Becoming an Important Point in That Great Mining Section.

Lawton, Ore., April 3.—Eight buildings have been completed at Lawton and five more are under construction. They are all business buildings with the exception of two residences, and are constructed in a substantial manner. All the buildings were put up by people who intend to start in business, and are not for rent.

The demand for building materials is greater than the supply on account of the present condition of the roads. This obstacle will be removed, however, with another week of fine weather.

Dr. D. W. Ward, formerly of Sumpter, will build a hospital here. The site for the building will be located by the Lawton Investment company. It is believed that the institution would be a paying one from the start.

The stockholders have commenced buying their stocks of goods, which will be forwarded to the city as soon as possible. There is yet quite a little snow on the hills but it is melting fast.

A water system will be constructed in the course of a month. The water will be taken from a large spring on the hillside west of the town, and will furnish ample protection against fire besides supplying water for general purposes.

The Red Boy mine is running with a steady force of 20 men, and the owners are making preparation to put up hoisting works and sink a shaft. The ultimate object being to attain a depth of about 2000 feet. The Concord mine, just above the Red Boy, is getting in a shipment of sacks to sack the ore for shipment. The machinery for the May Queen mine is nearly all in place and active work will be resumed on the 15th instant. A stamp mill has been put in. The Magnolia and Cougar mines are in operation and are running a full force of men.

Mr. Wilson, the discoverer of the O. K. property, which lies adjacent to Lawton, has gone to Boise to consult his partners concerning development work, and it is probable that a large mill will be put in this season. A tunnel has been driven in the mountain to a distance of 125 feet and is through solid ore the entire distance. There is no doubt but what the property is immensely valuable, although no assays are made public. The ore carries both gold and native copper. There is a splendid mill site at the mouth of the tunnel and an abundance of water for milling purposes within easy access.

W. C. Calder, secretary of the Sumpter townsite company, who was here last week, tells a Sumpter Miner reporter that it is his belief that Lawton is destined to be a great camp. So say we all of it, but we think Mr. Calder for honestly expressing his good opinion, just the same.
