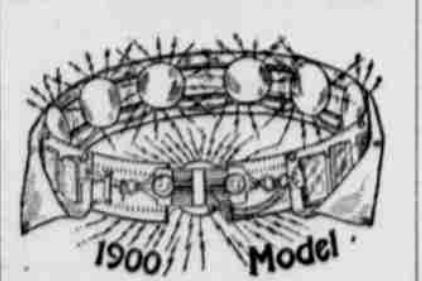
## GENERAL NEWS.

Nine hundred men, women and  
children are playing at fasting this  
week in Philadelphia, in order to raise  
a \$20,000 mortgage on a local church.It is estimated in Washington diplo-  
matic circles that the stories of fric-  
tion between Russia and Japan were  
invented by England to distract atten-  
tion from South Africa.Admiral Dewey for president is be-  
ing backed by W. C. Whitney, Daniel  
Lamont, Richard Olney and John R.  
McLean. It is stated that Senator  
Gorman has the management of the  
Dewey boom.Hiram S. Utley, the inventor of  
many improvements in artificial  
marble, is dead at his home in  
Chicago. He was a veteran of the civil  
war, and was born in Manchester, Vt.,  
August 18, 1844.Judge Brown, of the United States  
district court at New York, refused a  
warrant of removal in the case of Cap-  
tain Carter's contractors, B. D. Green  
and the Gaynors. He ordered the dis-  
charge of the prisoners.A test is to be made by the treasury  
department in the case of Archibald  
D. Buchanan, arrested by government  
officers on the charge of having in his  
possession plates and counterfeit  
stamps of foreign countries.General John Bidwell, prohibition  
candidate for president in 1892, died  
at his home near Chico, Calif., Wed-  
nesday, from heart failure. General  
Bidwell was a pioneer of 1841 and the  
founder of Chico. He was 80 years of  
age and a native of Chautauque county,  
New York. He leaves an estate valued  
at \$1,000,000.

## PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Bank of Ontario announces that  
it will take advantage of the new bank-  
ing laws, and organize a national bank.William Mackintosh, manager of the  
Portland branch of the London & San  
Francisco bank, has been made man-  
ager of that institution at San Fran-  
cisco.When asked in Portland for his  
opinion on the candidacy of Admiral  
Dewey for the presidency, William J.  
Bryan said: "I do not wish to discuss  
the subject."A. B. Moss, of Genesee, Idaho, com-  
mitted suicide recently, one week  
after insuring his life in the Woodmen  
of the World. In spite of his delibera-  
tion the policy will be paid in full.At Butte, Montana, William Weuke,  
a 16-year-old boy, in trying to put a  
belt on a moving pulley, was caught  
and whirled around the shaft. Every  
shred of flesh was torn from his body  
and his feet and legs were severed from  
the body.The members of the Oregon delega-  
tion in congress are trying to secure a  
provision in some appropriation bill  
for deepening the mouth of the Col-  
umbia river to 40 feet, under the  
recommendation of engineers, which  
will cost \$2,531,140.At Colville, Idaho, the old Catholic  
church on Church flat, a mile east of  
town, was burned to the ground. The  
building was erected in 1890 at a cost  
of \$3000, by soldiers at the garrison,  
and donated to the church. It was  
built of logs, and all the furnishings and  
furniture was made by hand.Adjutant Hawkes, of the Salvation  
Army, states that a person is going  
about soliciting funds for a "Salva-  
tion Army Bazaar" Home, and repre-  
senting himself to be a member of the  
Salvation Army. Adjutant Hawkes  
declares that the man is an impostor,  
is not a member of the Salvation  
Army, and that that organization has  
no intention of establishing a babies' home.

## NEWS FROM WASHINGTON

House Passes the Hawaiian Bill With-  
out Division.

SULLIVAN SUPPORTS QUAY'S CLAIM

Indian Appropriation Bill in the Senate—Ar-  
gument in the Clark Case—Coeur  
d'Alene Investigation.Washington, April 6.—The house  
this morning resumed consideration  
of the bill to provide a territorial  
form of government for Hawaii, and  
after a few short speeches in support  
of the measure the bill was passed  
without division.

In the Senate.

Sullivan addressed the senate in sup-  
port of Quay's claim to a seat. He  
maintained that the governor should  
exercise his authority to name a sen-  
ator in the event the legislature, for  
any reason, should fail to elect. At  
the conclusion of Sullivan's speech,  
consideration of the Indian appropria-  
tion bill was begun.

A Protest to Turkey.

Washington, April 6.—Secretary Hay  
has addressed a vigorous protest to  
the Turkish government against the  
proposed edict excluding American pork  
from Turkey.

Argument in the Clark Case.

Washington, April 6.—Foster con-  
tinued his argument today in the case  
of Senator Clark of Montana. Foster  
was followed by ex-Senator Faulkner,  
who charged corrupt motives in the  
prosecution.

Non-Union Miner on the Stand.

Washington, April 6.—Wm. M.  
Pickens, a non-union miner, was a  
witness today at the Coeur d'Alene  
investigation. He told of threats and  
intimidation against him and others  
because of refusal to join the miners'  
union.

Democratic Executive Committee.

Washington, April 6.—The democrat-  
ic congressional campaign committee  
have chosen Representative McRae,  
of Arkansas, and Norton of Ohio, vice  
chairmen, and the following executive  
committee: Senator Cockrell, chair-  
man; Representatives Hall, Rupert,  
Turner, Daly, Fitzgerald and Denny.

Hawaii Form of Government.

The house has under discussion a  
bill to provide a territorial form of  
government for Hawaii. Several im-  
portant amendments have been agreed  
to, among them the following:To nullify all labor contracts in the  
islands; to extend the alien contract  
labor laws to the islands; to prohibit  
the sale of intoxicating liquors in  
saloons; to limit land holdings of cor-  
porations to 1000 acres and to substi-  
tute for the house provision relating to  
appointment of judges and other  
officers of the islands, the senate pro-  
vision; the house provision lodged the  
appointing power in the governor, the  
senate placed it in the president.

Seven Republicans.

The seven republicans who opposed  
the original Puerto Rican bill in the  
house, McCall of Massachusetts,  
Littlefield of Maine, and representa-  
tives of Illinois, Crumpacker of Indiana, Heat-  
wole of Minnesota, Lane of Iowa and  
Warner of Illinois, held a conference  
and decided not to recede from their  
former position.

The Naval Appropriation Bill.

The naval appropriation bill as re-  
ported to the house provides for two  
battleships of about 13,500 tons and to  
have the highest practicable speed and  
to cost exclusive of armor and arma-  
ment not exceeding \$3,600,000 each;  
three armored cruisers of about 13,000  
tons, to cost, exclusive of armor and  
armament, not exceeding \$4,250,000  
each, and three protected cruisers of  
about 8000 tons, to cost exclusive of  
armor and armament, not exceeding  
\$2,800,000 each. The maximum of ships herein  
authorized, exclusive of armor and  
armament, will be \$28,350,000. This  
is the largest naval program ever sub-  
mitted.

Puget Sound Naval Station.

Two hundred and six thousand one  
hundred and sixty-five dollars is re-  
commended for the Puget Sound naval  
station.

HANGED AT TACOMA.

Albert Michael Executed for the Murder  
of His Divorced Wife.Tacoma, April 6.—Albert Michael  
was hanged at 7:10 this morning from  
the fifth floor of the court house. The  
execution was complete in every detail.  
He died in twelve minutes, his neck  
being broken by the fall. On the  
scaffold Michael said:"Friends, I am here to die. I am  
face to face with death. All I want to  
say is, after murder the best method is  
capital punishment. I have committed  
many errors and my hair is very gray,  
but I have good solid reason to have  
gray hair. That's all. Good bye to  
you all."Albert Michael shot and killed Mrs.  
John Ambler, his former wife, Septem-  
ber 2, 1899. He went into the house,  
which is located on the "Nigger  
Tract," when no one but the woman  
was at home. When he entered the  
door she started to run but the back  
way and he sent a shot after her. See-  
ing that escape was impossible through  
the back yard, Mrs. Ambler ran out  
into the street, the murderer following  
closely behind and shooting all the  
time. She was shot in the back as she  
came out the gate, and running a few  
steps further, fell on her knees,  
begging for mercy. For answer,  
Michael walked up to the prostrate  
woman and fired a shot into her left  
side that put an end to her struggles.Placing the pistol in his own mouth,  
Michael pulled the trigger, but there  
was no cartridge in the gun. He had  
just been released from the Walla  
Walla penitentiary after serving a  
four-year term for attempting to  
murder the same woman while she was  
employed at the Fanny Paddock hospi-  
tal. She bore a scar on her forehead  
where the bullet grazed that time.Michael after the murder expressed  
no regret for the crime. He wanted to  
be hung, and that quickly. Both were  
of French-Canadian stock, and Michael  
said he shot his wife because she was  
untrue to him. After the first attempt  
on her life, Mrs. Michael got a di-  
vorce and soon afterward married JohnAmbler, a hardworking, respectable  
man.

PENNSYLVANIA DEMOCRATS.

They Nominate a Ticket and Instruct  
for Bryan for President.Harrisburg, April 6.—The demo-  
cratic state convention met here to  
nominate candidates for auditor gen-  
eral and congressmen-at-large and  
select eight delegates-at-large to the  
Kansas City convention.The 64 delegates from Pennsylvania  
were instructed by today's state con-  
vention to support W. J. Bryan for  
president. They are bound by the  
unit rule and cannot change to any  
other presidential aspirant unless it be  
so decided by a majority of the dele-  
gation. The following ticket was nomi-  
nated:Auditor general—P. Gray Meek.  
Congressmen-at-large—Harry E.  
Grimm, N. M. Edwards.On the money question the platform  
says:"Bimetallism is favored as tending  
to make permanent prosperity of a  
country and freeing us from the power  
of the money trust."

THE REPUBLICANS OF WASHINGTON.

Name Delegates to the National Con-  
vention With Levi Ankeny at the Head.Ellensburg, Wash., April 6.—The  
republican state convention, which  
convened here yesterday, named eight  
delegates and alternates to the national  
republican convention, and instructed  
them to vote for McKinley for pres-  
ident, adopted a platform and ad-  
dressed in the afternoon. The dele-  
gates and alternates elected were:Levi Ankeny, Walla Walla; Dr.  
Simms, Colville; E. C. Neufelder,  
King; G. H. Baker, Klickitat; J. M.  
Ashton, Pierce; N. B. Coffman, Lewis;  
H. S. Connor, Skagit; F. J. Hayfield,  
Whitman.Alternates—J. W. Bean, Kittitas; L.  
A. Koenig, Adams; C. E. Coon,  
Jefferson; J. S. Meirs, Ferry; S. G.  
Cosgrove, Garfield; E. Baumeister,  
Asotin; M. E. Hay, Lincoln; A. S.  
Lindsay, Chelan.

The Platform.

"We endorse the action of congress  
in having enacted into law the exist-  
ing gold standard and oppose the free  
coinage of silver. We congratulate  
the country upon the fact that the present  
republican congress has removed the  
monetary question from the realm of  
doubt and uncertainty into that of a  
settled law.""We adhere to the doctrine that the  
territory acquired as the result of the  
war with Spain is under complete con-  
trol of the government of the United  
States and subject to such laws as con-  
gress may from time to time enact.  
We favor the prompt establishment  
of such permanent government in this  
newly acquired territory as will pro-  
mote civilization, education and com-  
merce. In the formation of such gov-  
ernment we advocate home rule  
principles.""We oppose any backward step on  
the subject of expansion; favor the  
maintenance of effective national mili-  
tary reserve in the several states; favor  
the further upbuilding and perfecting  
of a splendid navy; favor the estab-  
lishment of a strong merchant marine,  
which as a naval reserve will aid com-  
merce and the navy in time of peace,  
it means the defense in time of war  
of humanity."The turn-down of ex-Senator John L.  
Wilson was the sensation and the only  
one of the convention.

UNION COUNTY DEMOCRATS.

Convention Held in La Grande Thursday  
and Ticket Nominated.La Grande, Or., April 6.—The demo-  
cratic Union county convention assem-  
bled in La Grande yesterday and nomi-  
nated the following ticket: D. A.  
McAlister, by acclamation, for repre-  
sentative; George Benson, by acclamation,  
for county clerk; Howard Campbell, by acclamation, for  
sheriff; W. L. Fugate, recorder; George  
Brown, commissioner; E. E. Bragg, for  
school superintendent; Justus Wright,  
assessor; no nomination was made for  
treasurer; Dr. W. H. Ewen, coroner.  
In every instance the office sought the  
man.The following were chosen delegates to  
the state convention:Thos. Ormond, La Grande; Henry  
Rinehart, Summerville; George Her-  
bert, Cornucopia; D. A. McAlister, La  
Grande; J. J. Turner, Big Creek; J. M.  
Carroll, Union; E. F. Owsley, La  
Grande; E. P. McDaniel, Cove; J. D.  
McKennon, La Grande; H. Rothschild,  
North Powder; E. P. Schow, La  
Grande; M. R. Woodard, Union.Convention voted to endorse nomi-  
nation of Justus Wade, of Summerville,  
for joint senator from Union and  
Walla Walla counties.Dr. E. R. Holmes, of Island City,  
was chairman and A. R. Tuttle, pub-  
lisher of the Elgin Recorder, secretary  
of the convention.

Decided Against Taylor.

Frankfort, April 6.—The court of ap-  
peals today handed down a decision in  
the governorship case in favor of the  
democrats. The opinion is by six  
judges, four democrats and two republi-  
cans. One republican, Durrelle,  
dissented.The opinion holds that the action of  
the legislature in seating Beckham  
was final and the courts have no power  
to review it. The republicans will try  
to get a hearing before the United  
States supreme court. Meanwhile no  
radical change in the relative positions

## BRITISH TROOPS CAPTURED

Five Companies Near Bethany Made  
Prisoners by Boers.

GATACRE HURRIES TO THE RESCUE

Methuen Announces the Capture of Fifty Boers  
and the Killing of General Vil-  
lebois Marcell.London, April 6.—Lord Roberts re-  
ports that five companies of British  
troops were captured by the Boers near  
Bethany.The following is Roberts' dispatch:  
"Three companies of the Royal Irish  
fusiliers and two companies of the  
Ninth regiment mounted infantry were  
near Reddersburg, a little eastward of  
Bethany station, within a few miles of  
this place. They were surrounded by a  
strong force of the enemy with four  
or five guns. The detachment held out  
from noon on April 3 until April 4 at  
9 a. m., and then apparently surren-  
dered. I ordered Gatacre from Spring-  
fontein to Reddersburg and dispatched  
the Cameron Highlanders to Bethany.  
There is no doubt that the whole party  
were made prisoners."

Death of General Marcell.

London, April 6.—The war office  
has received the following from  
Roberts: "Methuen telegraphs from  
Bethany as follows: 'Surrounded Gen-  
eral Villebois Marcell and a body of  
Boers today. Villebois and seven Boers  
were killed, eight wounded and 50  
taken prisoners. Our losses were:  
Killed, Captains Boyle and Williams  
of the yeomanry and two men;  
wounded, seven men.'"  
Villebois Marcell was chief of staff  
of the Boer army. He went through  
a number of campaigns in the French  
army.

Boers Operating in Force.

London, April 6.—The war office  
posted a dispatch from Roberts an-  
nouncing Methuen's capture of fifty  
Boers and the killing of General  
Villebois Marcell only a few minutes  
before a second telegram was bulletin  
reporting the loss of five companies of  
British infantry. The lost companies  
are probably a part of the force  
guarding the railroad at Bethany, 30  
miles south of Bloemfontein. The  
Boers are evidently operating over the  
near the railroad. Villebois Marcell,  
as Joubert's chief of staff, devised the  
Boer defenses against Buller's ad-  
vance to the relief of Ladysmith. The  
Boers were in force yesterday five  
miles from Agersfontein, 60 miles  
from Bloemfontein.

Fear of a Water Famine.

The war office issued no news Thurs-  
day and little was allowed to come  
through from correspondents at Bloem-  
fontein. As usual whenever there is  
any check in progress in the Boer  
campaign, the war office is being  
severely censured for failing to main-  
tain the necessary supplies of remounts  
for the army.Much anxiety is felt as to the water  
supply, despite statements cabled  
home that there is no fear of a water  
famine. Considerable dissatisfaction  
is beginning to be expressed over the  
unaccountable delay at Bloemfontein  
and in Natal, which enables the Boers  
to recover from the demoralization  
caused by Lord Roberts' former rapid  
movements.

Ceil Rhodes in London.

London, April 6.—Ceil Rhodes ar-  
rived in this city today. Rhodes'  
reception was in marked contrast to  
his former ovation. The public did  
not show the slightest interest in him.

OUTRAGE ON A CONSUL.

Experience of Edward Gottfried at Hu-  
amacho, Peru.Chicago, April 6.—A special to the  
Record from Washington says: Edward  
Gottfried, late consular agent of this  
government at Truxillo, Peru, asserts  
that in the summer of 1898 at  
Huamacho, Peru, 50 or 60 Peruvian  
revolutionists dragged him half  
dressed to the public square and de-  
manded \$3000 and twenty-five rifles.  
Gottfried protested and was immedi-  
ately knocked down and strung up by  
the thumbs. The administration will  
demand restitution and an apology.

Two Cases of Plague.

Honolulu, March 30, via San Fran-  
cisco, April 6.—Two cases of plague  
were reported March 25. Since that  
date no new cases have appeared.  
Word has reached Honolulu that the  
disabled steamer
