### CENSUS ENUMERATION DISTRICTS.

Umatilla County Divided into Twelve by Supervisor Geo. F. Telfer.

Supervisor George F. Telfer, of the second district of Oregon, has divided this county into twelve census districts, and sends to the East Oregonian official notification as to what precincts of the county will be in each of the twelve districts.

Supervisor Telfer has numbered the southern sub-divisions of the entire census district consecutively, the first number for this county being 105, and running up to 116 for the twelfth. The twelve districts will be as follows:

No. 105—Adams, Fulton, Helix and Vanvleet precincts.

No. 106—Albia, Ukiah, Vinson and Willow Springs precincts.

No. 107—Alta, Encampment and Gilliland precincts.

No. 108—Bingham Springs, Cottonwood, Mountain and Ruddock precincts.

No. 109—East Weston precinct (including part of Weston town) and Weston precinct (including part of Weston town).

No. 110—Echo, Juniper, Umatilla,

(including Umatilla town, and Union precincts.)

No. 112—Hogue, McKay and Yaoum precincts.

No. 113—North and South Athena (including Athena town,) and Valley precincts.

No. 114—North and South Milton precincts (including Milton town.)

No. 115—Pendleton town (part of,) all that part of the city east of Willow street and South of East as far as Vincent, and from that point all east of Vincent.

No. 116—Pendleton town (part of,) all that part of the city west of Willow street and south of Court street, and all north of Court street and west of Vincent street.

One enumerator will be appointed for each district.

### MONUMENT TO COMMEMORATE.

William Blakley and Others Will Select Site to Mark Kelly's Battleground.

William Blakley, of this city, has been appointed on the committee on Memorials by the Oregon Historical Society, the other members being L. B. Cox and Wm. Galloway. In a letter to Mr. Blakley, Mr. Cox details the ideas of the society with special reference to the battle fought by Col. Kelly and the volunteers against Pu-pu-mox-mox and the Indians in 1856.

Mr. Cox in his letter to Mr. Blakley writes some things which will interest all persons who resided in this section during the early days:

"Portland, April 4.—To Wm. Blakley, Pendleton, Or.—The president of the Oregon Historical Society has appointed L. B. Cox, William Galloway and W. M. Blakley a committee on Memorials. It is intended to erect monuments at various places of historical interest in the state and one of these spots is that of the battle which was fought by the pioneer regiment under the command of Col. Kelly against Pu-pu-mox-mox and the Indians in 1856. This fighting took place, as I understand, just south of the state line, and is consequently within the limits of our field of operations. I have been told that the fight was a general running contest which covered a great deal of territory; but, when I was last in Washington city, I met Col. Kelly on the subject and he said to me that he thought the center of the struggle could be fixed by the house of La Rovne, and he supposed that we would still be able to find the foundation of this house, although the building has long since disappeared. Col. Kelly told me that Mr. James McAuliff, of Walla Walla, would be the best person whom we could secure to aid in the location of the spot for this monument, as he was an officer and engaged in the whole of the fight. I believe there are also other persons about Walla Walla who also took part in the battle."

Mr. Blakley will go to Walla Walla in a few days and with Mr. McAuliff look out a site for the temporary monument.

### DOUBLE TRAIN SERVICE ANNOUNCED.

O. R. & N. and Allied Lines to Inaugurate it on April 22.

General Superintendent J. P. O'Brien, of the O. R. & N. Co., has attended the meeting at Salt Lake City at which the new train service to be given on the O. R. & N., Union Pacific and Short Line was arranged. Mr. O'Brien makes this announcement regarding the double service to commence on April 22:

It provides for two trains per day between Portland and Chicago, and becomes effective April 22. Mr. O'Brien said that the No. 1 fast train will leave Portland at 9:15 A. M. daily. It will be a limited train, stopping only at Pendleton and other principal stations. It will reach Huntington at 12:20, closely connecting at Pendleton with the Washington division train, leaving Spokane at 8 a. m.

The evening train will leave Portland at 6. It will handle all local business, as well as that of the Washington division connection, reaching Spokane 10 a. m., the day following. The returning westbound train from Chicago will arrive here at 4 p. m., and the train handling local business will arrive in Portland at 7:30 a. m. This will also take care of business

Walla Walla, April 6.—The Union of the presbytery of Walla Walla convened in the Presbyterian church at 7:30 Thursday evening. The synod was opened with prayer by Rev. Samuel A. George of Wallburg. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was celebrated at the close of service. The retiring moderator, Rev. E. N. Condit, presided.

### ENGINE DERAILED WHILE SWITCHING.

Overland Passenger Taken Via Walla Walla to Portland.

Overland Train No. 1 on the O. R. & N. was bound, due to leave here at 9:40 this morning, for Junction, on west via Walla Walla, on account of the engine of train No. 41 being derailed in the yards across the main line track.

The accident occurred while the No. 41 engine was switching. No. 41 is the mixed train from Walla Walla which arrives here at 9:35 a. m., and returns to Walla Walla as No. 42 at 2 p. m.

The switch in the west end of the yards had been left open, and as the engine was backing down the switch track which connects with the main line track it left the rails and ran a rod or two on the end of the ties.

No great damage was done, although the engine must go to the shop for repairing. The brakemen were broken and it is thought that parts of the engine are sprung.

### JIM IRWIN INJURED.

And Starkey, the Starkweather Pacer, is Also Hurt.

At the Simpson & Pringer track this forenoon, an accident occurred in which James Irwin had a shoulder sprained and Rob Starkweather's black Chelaha pacer, Starkey, also received quite an injury. Irwin was driving Starkey to a roadster, and in some manner the horse fell, turning a complete somersault, overthrowing the cart and throwing Mr. Irwin quite a distance. He fell on his shoulder, which was badly sprained.
