**YATES HAS NOT WITHDRAWN.**

Report to that Effect Gains Currency on Pendleton Streets.

A report gained currency today that S. K. Yates had withdrawn from the race for the county treasurer on the republican ticket. Inquiry failed to confirm the rumor, and those in a position to know positively stated that the report is without foundation.

The report came to Pendleton from the East End, today, and caused a great flurry for a few hours this afternoon. It was eagerly discussed on the streets, and, for the time, absorbed the attention of those interested in the political situation. As inquiry went on, however, failure to find substance in the report, caused the information to come from authoritative sources that Mr. Yates remains in the field as republican candidate for county treasurer.

**A Citizen at Last.**

His father had been here several years, having gone to California in "the days of gold," and was a naturalized citizen. After attaining majority, of course, Mr. Gould voted right along without question until the present, when the new restriction law in Oregon made it necessary for him to submit proof of citizenship or naturalization papers. Mr. Gould thought it would be the easier plan to take out papers, although to all intents and purposes he has been a citizen of the United States for over 40 years.
