BRYAN WANTS CLUBS ORGANIZED.
Form of Enrollment Prepared Which Col. Bryan Endorses.

During the tour through the state of Washington, Col. W. J. Bryan and United States Senator Turner of Spokane prepared a form of enrollment for Bryan clubs which it is his desire to have organized throughout the Pacific coast states for the present campaign. The form is as follows:

"We, the undersigned citizens and voters of the United States, believing in and loving every sentiment expressed in the Declaration of Independence and the constitution of our country, and having an abiding faith in, and love for, our republic and its maintenance, deploring the tendency toward militarism and imperialism as manifested by the leaders of the republican party of today, hereby solemnly pledge ourselves to the principles enunciated by the immortal Jefferson and advocated by William Jennings Bryan for the betterment of mankind, and hereby band ourselves together for the purpose of maintaining inviolate the declaration of independence, the financial independence of the nation and the industrial independence of the citizen."

Local supporters of Mr. Bryan are planning for the organization of such a club, and the matter will be taken up when the delegates to the democratic and populist state conventions return from Portland.

NO WEEVIL IN THIS COUNTY.

Pest Kept Out from Warehouses Raised from the Ground.

Recently it was discovered that the weevil pest had been found in wheat stored in Portland, and had caused considerable damage to the grain. The cause of the pest was traced to a warehouse from the ground, and that it will never appear in any warehouse built in this manner. He says that it has been his experience that any warehouse in which weevil have been present for sometime, the pest may be eliminated by raising the warehouse from the ground, and setting it up on posts. Scarcely a bushel of wheat in this county is stored in any private

warehouse, agent of the Pacific Cleaver company, states, in explanation, that the reason why the weevil has not appeared in this county is because the wheat is all stored in warehouses which are raised considerably from the ground, and that it will never appear in any warehouse built in this manner. 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TO THE METROPOLIS.

Delegates and Politicians Springing Out for Portland Tuesday and Today.

Tuesday night at 8 o'clock, when the W. & C. R. R. train pulled out from the passenger station, on board were G. A. Hartman, democratic nominee for county clerk and a delegate to the state convention; A. D. Stillman, democratic candidate for the circuit court nomination; J. W. Maloney, incumbent of the office of county recorder and democratic nominee for re-election; W. M. Pierce, state delegate and candidate for a place on the democratic electoral ticket; M. L. Teutsch, the merchant; D. B. Watson, a democratic state delegate; T. F. Howard, a democratic state delegate.

These went to the W. & C. R. R. to Wallula, and thence on the R. & N. to Portland, to attend the democratic state convention in that city. One or two of the democratic state delegates went on Tuesday, and of those who were in town today some left on the morning overland and others leave this evening via Wallula.

On the overland this morning went Dr. C. J. Smith, C. A. Chapman, Col. E. D. Boyd, T. G. Hailey, democratic candidate for the district attorneyship; C. M. Pierce, J. W. Minnis, G. P. Rosenberg, democratic candidate for justice of the peace in Pendleton; of the democratic contingent; J. T. Hinkle, populist, and Judge J. A. Fee, republican, candidate for the republican nomination of district attorney. Col. Raley leaves tonight.

From Baker county, on the train were John T. Engle, of the Colosia mine, republican candidate for representative, Peter Basche, Henry Rust, W. G. Ayre, Dr. O. M. Dodson, Geo. Chandler, republican state delegates, and Judge James, J. E. McKinnon, Asa L. Brown, democratic state delegates.

The judge, clerk, treasurer, school superintendent and coroner were re-nominated.

Lawton, Grant County, Oregon, April 8.—The growth of this place is phenomenal. Thirty days ago it was a "hole in the ground," so to speak, today it is a town of several hundred and more coming in daily. It is scarcely a month since the promoters of this new town made up their minds that geographically they were right, and went to work to put their thoughts into action, and the result is that today Lawton is assuming the airs of a thriving city. No spot on earth could be more favored by Nature than is Lawton. Situated as it is in a beautiful valley, in what is known as Granite basin, surrounded by majestic mountains and having a beautiful stream of water running through the very heart of the city, thus assuring health to its residents, a beautiful lake (or natural reservoir) at an elevation of about 300 feet above the town which can and will supply a town of 5000 inhabitants, or larger, with an abundance of good, pure, mountain water, which also will be used for fire purposes; good roads leading to all the prominent mines adjacent; level streets, good-sized building lots, and many other natural advantages not enjoyed by any town in Eastern Oregon, the building of a town where Lawton stands was a necessity. who realized that a town near their property was a necessity.

The first steps taken were to secure the site and perfect the title, which has been done, and then the engineer was put to work platting the townsite, and today they are selling lots and giving warranty deeds for same. Indeed so great was the rush for business property in Lawton that men came in and camped on the ground several days before the plat had been recorded, so that they were the first to build and begin business.

Today there are more than 25 business houses in course of erection, and contract, and were it not for the fact that lumber is scarce and hard to get, it is likely that many more buildings would be started before now, but this serious drawback has kept several persons from coming in that otherwise would have done so, but who are now awaiting until they will be able to get lumber as fast as they want it. It is to be hoped that the saw mills will increase their capacity as soon as possible.

Lawton is the gateway to all of the heavy producing mines, being within one mile of the famous Red Boy and May Queen mines, and only about three miles from the Cougar and Mag-nolia mines, each of which produce from \$20,000 to \$40,000 worth of ore a natural water grade from each of these properties to the town. Besides those named, there are several others which will become producers with the next year, among which are the Concord (a property which promises to outstrip the Red Boy), the O. K., adjoining the townsite of Lawton, the Red Mountain group; the South Cougar group, and many others up Clear Creek toward the Greenhorn mountains, all of which are tributary to Lawton, and it will be necessary to pass through the town to reach any of the properties named.

It is only a question of a short time until a railroad will penetrate this section of country, and there is no question but that Lawton will be the objective point.

BRYAN AND PATTISON.

This May Be the Ticket Nominated at Kansas City.
Robert E. Pattison of Pennsylvania, for vice president, is the very latest thing in democratic national slate-making. William Jennings Bryan's staunchest supporters in the party's national organization make the suggestion. The first hint heard here of the Bryan-Pattison combination came from a recent visitor to Washington. Highest sources of democratic information available in Chicago treat it in a way that is tantamount to confirmation. Pennsylvania's former democratic governor has been classed since 1896 as one of the gold democrats, although not one of the aggressive type. Last week he was chosen to head Pennsylvania's delegation to the national convention and the delegation was instructed for Bryan. That made the western democrats open their eyes and commence to ask questions. The consequence is the leaking out of information that "Pattison for vice president" is an exceedingly live wire. Nothing stands in the way of con-

summation of the Bryan-Pattison combination except the unqualified consent of the party of the second part. No man could be picked for second place on the democratic ticket, it is figured, whose nomination would more nearly cement the eastern and western wings of the party in this year of reorganization of platform, in which silver will be subordinate. He has the confidence and respect of eastern men who have been "gold bugs" and is not offensive to the western silver democrats.

W. E. Haldeman of the Courier-Journal, who in 1896 was one of the most prominent leaders of the national democratic movement and represented Kentucky on the national committee, says of the announcement of the candidacy of Dewey for president:

"In my opinion the Dewey candidacy is an over night affair and I do not believe at this late day the admiral, conspicuous though his naval achievements be, will be able to figure prominently in the race for the presidency. I feel quite sure that the democrats will not take him up. Mr. Bryan is as good as nominated. The party is solidly for him, in my belief, and I look forward with pleasure to supporting him this fall. Mr. Bryan is more than an able politician. He is an honest politician. His hold upon the democracy of the country is secure. I do not see how admiral Dewey or any other man can hope to compete with him for the democratic nomination."
