DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION.

Declaration of Principles by the Convention in Portland.

The platform adopted by the democratic state convention in Portland was as follows:

We the democrats of Oregon, in convention assembled, do hereby reaffirm and endorse, in whole and in part, in letter and in spirit, the platform adopted by the democratic convention held in Chicago in 1896. (And the money pluck of the democratic people's party and silver republican parties of 1896.)

We favor amendments to the federal constitution, especially authorizing an income tax and providing for the election of United States senators by a direct vote of the people.

We oppose government by injunction and the blacklist, and favor arbitration as a means of settling disputes between corporations and their employees, and recognizing the fact that corporation is a creature of law, we believe in and favor a reasonable supervision by state inspection of mines, machinery, manufacturing and railways, to the end that injury to employees be avoided and life rendered secure; we favor the passage of a reasonable employers' liability act, similar to those enacted in other states.

We reaffirm our former declaration in favor of the initiative and referendum and pledge our candidates for the legislature to support the pending amendment to the constitution submitting the question of direct legislation to the people.

Constitution Follows the Flag.

We denounce the doctrine that an executive or a congress created and limited by the constitution, can exercise lawful authority beyond that constitution, and in violation of it, believing that a nation can not long endure half republic and half empire, we oppose wars of conquest and colonial possessions.

The Philippines can not be citizens without endangering our civilization;

they cannot be subjects without endangering our form of government, and as we are not willing to surrender our civilization or to convert a republic into an empire, we favor an immediate declaration of the nation's purpose to give to the Philippines, first, a stable form of government; second, independence, and, third, protection from outside interference, as it has for nearly a century given protection to the republics of Central and South America. We favor the expansion of trade by every legitimate and peaceful means, but we are opposed to purchasing trade at the cannon's mouth, with human blood, neither do we believe that trade secured and held by force is worth the price that must be paid for it. We are in favor of extending the nation's influence, but we believe that that influence should be extended, not by force and violence, but through the tremendous power of a high and honorable example.

Opposed to Militarism.

We oppose militarism. It imposes upon the people an unnecessary burden, and is a constant menace. A small standing army and a well-equipped state militia are sufficient in time of peace; in time of war the citizen-soldier should be a republic's defense, and as an example, we point with satisfaction to the brave and gallant services of the Second Oregon in the late Spanish-American war.

Condemns the Puerto Rican Tariff.

We condemn the present republican congress for obeying the demand of the trusts for a tariff upon goods imported to Puerto Rico, and inhibiting free intercourse between our people and the people of Puerto Rico in the matter of trade.

We condemn the Dingley tariff law as a trust-breeding and extortion-involving measure, skillfully devised for the purpose of giving to a few favored trusts which they do not deserve, and of placing upon the many burdens which they should not bear.

We demand that articles controlled by trusts be placed upon the free lists, and we favor the enactment and enforcement of such laws as will effectually suppress and destroy all trusts and all combinations of capital that control free intercourse and trade among our people.

We condemn the present financial legislation of congress of the United States as tending to the establishment of a money trust subversive of the liberties and rights of the American people.

Favors Nicaraguan Canal.

We favor the immediate construction ownership and fortification of the Nicaraguan canal by the United States. We are opposed to any and all proposed legislation providing for the leasing to corporations or individuals any portion of the public domain for grazing purposes to the detriment of actual settlers and homesteaders.

We favor government ownership of the telegraph as part of the postal system of the United States, and we observe with approval the movement throughout the country, looking toward the municipal ownership of municipal franchises.

We denounce the extravagance of the republican party of the state of Oregon in its management of state and municipal affairs.
