HAND IN YOUR HORSES' NAMES.

Owners of Horses. Animals Should Co-operate in the Parade for May 6.

It is a pleasure to take considerable interest in the horse parade to be given in Pendleton on Saturday, April 15.

When the plan was first broached, and an approximate list secured by Frank Frazier, who has the matter in charge, it was thought that about 40 horses

would be available, and that the parade would be a fine horse breeding

show. But the list has grown steadily, until now the likelihood is that no less

than 100 racing and road horses will be in line on May 6.

It is urged that all owners of horses who intend to bring them out on that

occasion hand to Mr. Frazier the names and ages of their horses, with a

brief statement of the pedigree. As to pedigree, the family breeding name,

and the list has been made, and if it is to be a truly representative

show, it should be remembered that there is to be absolutely no entrance fee.

The horses will be assembled at some point in town to be decided on later, each horse to be led by a buggy or

carriage, and a procession formed for parading the principal streets of the

town. The line of march will be made known in advance, so that all places

may be known from where an advantageous view of the parading horses

may be obtained.

The parade is under the auspices of the Pendleton Commercial Association, and

is designed purely to demonstrate that Pendleton and this county have the

finest horse raising industry of any town on the north Pacific coast. If the owners

of good horses will lend co-operation, the demonstration will easily be made.

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LAWTON IS BOOMING.

Many Pendletonians Interested There and Some Establishing Branch Stores.

Lawton, Ore., April 15.—This place is going ahead at a rapid pace. New structures are going up and people are coming in from every direction.

C. E. Berkeley, an old employee of the engineering department of the O. R. & N. is here at Pendleton to complete the platting of the townsite. He arrived in the city on Tuesday.

Gus LaFontaine, of Pendleton, arrived here Wednesday to complete arrangements for establishing his large restaurant. Mr. LaFontaine's fame as a restaurateur has spread all abroad throughout the Northwest and Lawton is to be indeed fortunate in securing him.

Dr. Summerville, president of the Lawton townsite company, will make a business visit to Pendleton within the next few days.

Tom Ayers, of the firm of Tallman & Co., at Pendleton, came in Tuesday. Mr. Ayers is a first-class druggist and a good fellow besides, and will open up a large store in his new building on the corner of Spokane avenue and Bonanza street. Mr. Ayers' stock of goods will comprise everything in the line of drugs, medicines, toilet articles, paints, oils and glass, and the thousand and one articles found in a well regulated store of this nature. Mr. Ayers' store will be the largest west of Baker City.

Dr. D. W. Ward left Sumpter for Portland, where he will purchase all the material required for constructing and furnishing a hospital in Lawton. Dr. Ward expects to be absent a week or ten days and upon his return immediate work upon the building will begin.

The Baker City Democrat of a recent date says: James A. Howard, secretary and treasurer of the Lawton investment company, F. G. Hull, publisher of the Lawton Standard, Charles Berkeley, civil engineer; Gus LaFontaine, a stockraiser of Umatilla county and hotel man of Pendleton; and Charles Pinson, a sheepman of Umatilla county, came to the city yesterday from Pendleton en route to Lawton. The party left on the evening train.

Messrs. Howard and Hull are very enthusiastic over the future of Lawton and are confident that the town will be the largest town in the Granite section. The town has already taken on rapid strides in building and this activity will increase as the weather and roads permit.

Mr. Berkeley goes to Lawton to do surveying for the investment company.

Mr. Pinson has made investments in the town and will erect a number of business houses there.

The Idaho Statesman in a recent issue, speaking of the O. R. & N. mine, in which Sam Wilson is one of the principal owners, adjoining Lawton, says:

"Sam Wilson, the discoverer of the O. R. & N. mine, near Lawton, Oregon, is a Boise visitor. Mr. Wilson is in partnership in the mining business with E. W. Johnson, of the Overland. He says the O. R. & N. is being systematically developed and that it is one of the best free milling gold properties he ever saw. The vein is about thirty feet wide and the ore runs from \$17 to \$28 a ton. He has driven a tunnel, on which he commenced work four months ago, 130 feet, doing the work unaided. The tunnel penetrates the base of a mountain, the apex of which is 2000 feet above Lawton, one of the very newest of Oregon's mining camps. It is 17 miles west of Sumpter and two and a half miles from Granite. It is an enterprising place, as is evidenced by the Lawton Standard, even in advance of the establishment of a postoffice in the place. Mr. Wilson says the future of the camp is very bright. With the present showing he prefers it to Cape Nome. Mr. Wilson is an old Wood River miner. He located the Tip Top mine on the Bailey gold belt and sold it for a song. Last year the owners of the property refused \$1,000,000 for it. E. T. Prescott, writes to the Salem Statesman from Lawton, as follows:

From letters received from Salem people, concerning this new town of Lawton, that I happened to find out here in the Blue mountains, I take it that a few facts published in your paper concerning this place would be of interest to your readers.

The town of Lawton is situated at the junction of Clear and Granite creeks, sixteen miles northwest of Sumpter, and two miles west of Granite. Lawton is but a little over a month old, yet there are eight buildings completed and as many more under construction. They are all business houses with the exception of three, and are constructed in a good substantial manner. All these buildings were put up by people who intend to start in business, and are not for rent.

The only store doing business at the present time is the general merchandise house owned by W. H. Hobson & Co. Two other general merchandise firms, a hardware store, general furnishing goods, and several other kinds of business houses will open up as soon as goods can be gotten in from Sumpter. Besides these, the new town has one public boarding house, two private boarding houses, two restaurants, two lodging houses, one steam laundry, one bakery, one livery stable, one sawmill, a weekly newspaper and, last but not least to a mining town, two saloons, and several more promised as soon as licenses can be secured.

Lawton is a typical new town. It is answer for buildings in many cases. Within thirty days the hum of business activity will take the place of the forest solitude which reigned supreme but a few short weeks ago.

Some of the richest mines in all this rich mineral belt are almost within a stone's throw of the principal part of town. The O. R. & N. mine lies adjoining on the south, and a few hundred yards further up Clear creek is the Bontridge & Bonson group, the Red Mountain and the Comstock. Above these a mile and a half from Lawton, is the Red Boy, now taking out gold bricks at the rate of \$30,000 per month, and running a steady force of seventy men. The owners are putting in hoisting works, the ultimate object being to attain a depth of 2000 feet. The Concord mine, just above the Red Boy, is preparing to sack the ore for shipment. The May Queen is only one and one-fourth miles from here, almost due south; it is at present cased down for repairs, but will start up on the 15th inst. with a ten-stamp mill in place. The Magnolia and Congar mines, two and three miles northeast of here, are in operation and are running a full force of men.

Lawton is the natural distributing point for all these mines and also for hundreds of prospects which may, and in all likelihood will, prove their merit when opened up. At the present

time there are no idle men in town. Experienced carpenters get \$4 per day, while those less experienced receive \$2.50 to \$3.50. Good wages are paid for all kinds of labor. Board costs \$5.25 per week and lodgings (in a tent), \$2.50 per week; saving 25 cents, and hair cutting 35 cents. Freight hauled from Sumpter costs one cent per pound. Rough lumber is \$14 per thousand.

JAPANESE LABORERS SENT OUT.

Pendleton Agency Handled 200 Since the First of January.

Torigoe, the Pendleton agent for the Japanese contractor, S. Ban, of Portland, sent a number of men up on the Spokane branch this morning to work in the sugar beet fields at Fairfield, Washington. He also sent some laborers to points on the main line.

Torigoe has had 200 Japanese men at the Pendleton agency since January first, the men having been sent out to various places on the O. R. & N. line.

Torigoe is a well dressed young Japanese who makes a comfortable living from handling these Japanese laborers in connection with the Portland contractor, S. Ban, who has agents in many places. He has a house in this place, at which the men stop while waiting to be sent out along the line of road. The Japanese men brought here are a very clean looking lot of men and are rather good customers of the clothing and furnishing goods stores. They buy a fine class of goods and appear on the streets clad as well as citizens of this country.

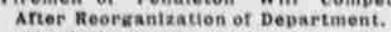
