### DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN ORGANIZATION

County Chairman Riley Perfects a Plan.  
Committees Are Named.

Col. J. H. Riley, chairman of the democratic county central committee, has called to his assistance a general executive committee consisting of Dr. C. J. Smith, Leon Cohen, C. S. Jackson, W. D. Hanford, T. D. Taylor, and the chairman together with the executive committee will have the general direction of the campaign. A plan of organization has been effected which, upon submission to various leaders in the party, was declared the very best that could be devised. It involves the thorough organization of the county by precincts. Competent men have been assigned to the work of organization, which divides the county into five divisions as follows:

First division—Comprising Albia, Albia, Gilliland, Logan, Ukiah, Vinson and Willow Springs precincts—G. A. Hartman, T. G. Hailey, Geo. D. Peckler.

Second division—Comprising Adams, Adams, north, Adams, south, Bingham Springs, Encampment, Reservation and McKay precincts—William H. Blakey, D. B. Watson, W. D. Chamberlain.

Third division—Cottonwood, Milton, north, Milton, south, Valley, Mountain, Weston and East Weston precincts—W. M. Pierce, E. D. Boyd, R. M. O'Brien.

Fourth division—Echo, Umatilla, Yonkers, Union, Juniper, Helix, Vandyke and Fulton precincts—G. A. Hartman, T. G. Hailey, Geo. D. Peckler.

Fifth division—Pendleton, North Pendleton, East Pendleton, and South Pendleton—J. E. Lathrop, William Hillton, Geo. P. Rosenberg.

The various committees will at once proceed to the work assigned and inaugurate a thorough and effective campaign.

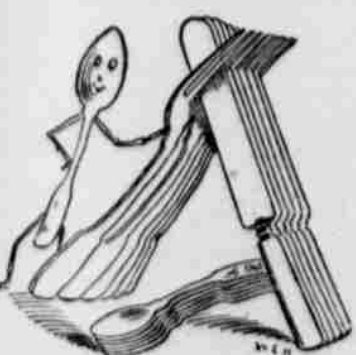

### WYOMING LIVESTOCK RULES.

How Sheep Driven Into the State Must Be Handled.

The law regulating the handling of sheep driven into the state of Wyoming has been compiled and sent out by the officials of this state. The provisions are of interest to Oregon sheepmen. The main points are:

It shall be unlawful for any person to bring into this state any sheep infected with scab or other infectious or contagious disease. If any person shall violate the provisions of this section, he shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by imprisonment in a county jail for a term of not exceeding sixty days or a fine of not less than five hundred nor more than one thousand dollars, or by both.

Any person, company or corporation intending to bring sheep or calves to be brought from any other state or territory any sheep into the state of Wyoming, in any manner, except by shipping the same through the state by railroad train, whether any proclamation shall have been issued by the governor as provided in the last preceding section or not, shall before crossing the state line, notify the board of sheep commissioners of such proposed action, which notice shall set forth the number of sheep, the brand thereon, the name of the owner thereof and the locality from which such sheep came and through which they have been driven.

Any person, company or corporation notifying the board of sheep commissioners of their intention to drive sheep into the state shall send with such notification the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars for each and every band of six thousand or less, to cover the cost of investigation and inspection. Any sum remaining after the cost of such investigation and inspection is paid shall be returned to such person, company or corporation. Whenever the person notified to make such investigation or inspection has completed his labors he shall immediately make in duplicate an itemized bill of expenses, one copy to be sent to the president and the other to the secretary of the board. If said bill is found to be correct, the same shall be paid at once.

On the arrival of any band of sheep at the state line, the investigator shall examine said sheep and if he find them diseased or that they may have been exposed to contagion or that they come from an infected locality, he shall place the said sheep with quarantine limits to be designated by him, and shall cause them to be dipped immediately in some of the dips prescribed by the regulations of the department of agriculture, concerning the dipping of sheep affected with scabies. He shall also place a printed notice in charge of said sheep, whose duty it shall be to see that said sheep do not leave said quarantine ground.

All hucks entering the state from points west of the Missouri river shall be dipped twice, the second dipping to be within a period of not less than two days nor more than fifteen days immediately succeeding said first dipping.

The fees for making the investigation provided for shall be five dollars per day and all necessary traveling expenses to and fro.

### HORSES IN GREATER DEMAND.

Prices Have Been Stiffened Throughout the United States.

Horse owners are finding an improved demand for their time, and both driving and draft animals are gradually bringing better prices. The day has passed when horses were asked for only to go upon the butcher's block at the cannery at Linnton. Buyers come here very frequently nowadays, and numerous sales are being made.

It is noticeable that draft horses are saleable now, and the entire supply of horses of that class fit for use in cities can be sold readily at any time.

Pendleton driving horses enjoy such high reputation abroad that breeders should reap benefits from it. Of late, inquiry has been made from all towns for Pendleton roadsters and the prospect is good for the establishment of a gilt-edged market.

The reason why horses are in improved demand is simply that the supply is not equal to the demand. In the East, the horse market is still strong. An illustration of this is found in the report that in New York a contract to buy 30,000 to 35,000 horses for the British government was completed. The horses are for cavalry regiments and the artillery service in South Africa, and will cost between \$60,000,000 and \$7,000,000. This is the largest single order of the kind ever placed in this country.

An army officer duly commissioned has been for two weeks arranging for heavy purchases. He has come to terms with a large New York firm, and the contract will be signed in a few days, upon the arrival of this officer's superior, who has been cabled to come over and ratify his acts.

The horses must conform practically to the United States army's strict requirements in size, breed and soundness. This bars the inferior breeds, and horses from the market and limits the choice practically to the breeds reared in the great producing centers of Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri and Iowa.

Buffalo has been selected as the point of inspection, where the horses will be bought by the contractors who will act as the British government's agents.

The average cost per head is estimated at about \$165. The cost of delivery at New York will add about \$15 a head to that, and the freight will pile on the cost so that at Cape Town or Durban each of these cattle will represent a fancy figure. The thirty-day voyage to the Cape, during which the animals cannot lie down for a minute, sends all but the most enduring animals over the side.

The British army's purchasing agent will go to Buffalo to inspect the delivery yards there. He hopes to get his horses at the rate of 5000 a week, but experienced dealers doubt that so many acceptable animals can be found at once.

Horsemen expect the announcement of this new demand to boom the market, which has languished for some years. The trolley, the bicycle, even the automobile, have reduced the current demand for all grades of horseflesh except for the few war breeds, which have risen steadily in cost.

It is said that a very prominent New Yorker, now in England, first directed the British government's attention to the superiority of the American market for the kind of animals required.

In addition, it is stated that the South African war is costing 5000 horses a month.

While the report says that Western horses are barred in the British con-

tract, nevertheless the removal of so many horses from the United States will reduce the general supply and improve the price correspondingly.

### WEBSTER DAVIS' ASSERTION.

Saw Dreadful Scenes on the Battle Fields in South Africa.

"We have seen many charges made by British officers and British newspaper correspondents that the Boers frequently outraged the white flag and the Red Cross flag. Upon investigation, not only among the Boers themselves but among the 4000 British prisoners, including the officers, who were at Pretoria when we were there, we learned that these charges were absolutely unfounded.

"On the contrary, we did learn that this was a set-up job to deceive not only the people of Great Britain at home, but to deceive the peoples of other civilized countries.

"The truth is—and a definite contradiction—that the British soldiers themselves are the parties who violated many of the rules of civilized warfare, and frequently ignored the white flag and also the Red Cross flag.

"It was my fortune to witness some of these scenes myself. On the top of a hill, when the Boers were attacking a British position, a young Boer soldier—not more than seventeen years of age—was passing by a wounded British soldier, and the British soldier asked him for a drink of water. As the tender-hearted Boer lad was kneeling by his side to let him drink from his own canteen, the British soldier thrust a bayonet into the poor boy's side. And I myself talked with him, and, kneeling by him, shed tears when he died.

"During the battle of Dundee there was a lull in the firing for a time on the part of the Boers, and a British officer, approaching them rapidly and waving a white flag, all awaited its arrival. At a distance of about six hundred yards from them the buggy stopped, wheeled about, dropped the white flag, and that innocent-looking buggy was suddenly transformed into a deadly Maxim gun, which felled nearly a dozen Boers.

"I talked with the man who captured that flag and saw it myself. It was a white flag with a small black stripe through the center, but a short distance away it seemed perfectly white. That flag is now in the possession of Col. Blake, the brave American officer who commands the Irish brigade, which is composed almost entirely of Irish-Americans, and no braver men are in the Boer army, said Gen. J. G. Thompson. England's acquisition of the diamond fields of Kimberley Mr. Davis characterized as a transaction without a parallel "for cupidity, dishonesty and injustice."

### POLICEMAN KILLED.

A Tragedy at Steveston, British Columbia in Which Chinese Are Involved.

Vancouver, B. C., April 18.—The mangled and mutilated remains of Alexander Main, chief of police of Steveston, were found this afternoon in a hastily made grave near a cluster of Chinese shacks, two miles from Steveston. Main had been missing since Saturday, when he went to the Chinese cabins to search for some missing tools believed to have been stolen. He was accompanied by a dog and neither man nor dog was seen from Saturday until this afternoon, when a rancher named T. Trites discovered some fresh turned earth. Poking with a stick he felt some resistance and hastily removing the earth most of the gruesome spectacle revealed. Main's head, which had been severed from the body, his arms and legs were broken in several places and the trunk hewed and hacked into small bits.

In the grave with his master was the body of the dog.

Excitement at Steveston over the ghastly find is intense.

Two Chinese in whose shacks were found stolen tools, are now under arrest, charged with the murder.

Steveston is a fishing village where are located 30 canneries, and during the canning season there is a floating population of 5000 or 6000 Chinese, Indians and Japanese.

### THOUSANDS OF FISH EGGS.

State Fish and Game Association Procures Them From Hatcheries.

A. E. Gebhart, secretary of the Oregon Fish & Game Association, writes to J. E. Krause, of this place, member of the executive board of the association, that he has received official communications from Washington, California and the superintendent of the Clackamas hatchery, to the effect that orders have already been issued for the forwarding of eggs from California and from the Bozeman station in Montana.

Twenty-five thousand Rainbows will come from California and 50,000 Graylings from the Bozeman station, Montana.

It will probably take several weeks to hatch these eggs, after which the young fry will be put in troughs until the food sack is absorbed. This will make the planting here about the latter part of June.

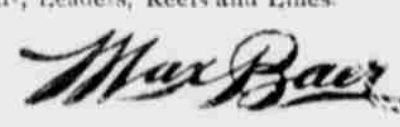
