DEMOCRATIC RAILROAD PLANK.

Corrected Text as Adopted by the State

In the state democratic platform as published immediately after the state convention of Oregon, the plank in question, which is carefully drawn in reasonable and just in every particular, should read as follows:

"We are opposed to government by injunction as applied to labor troubles and strikes, and the resulting deprivation of the right of trial by jury to men who are charged with criminal acts. We believe in the passage of an employers' liability act applicable to railroad companies similar to such acts now in force in other states by which the doctrine of fellow servants should not defeat his recovery. And we pledge our members of the legislature to favor legislation along these lines, and also repealing or extending the limit of recovery for the death of an employee."

"We further favor a reasonable supervision and limitation by the state of the operation of railroad trains, and of the number of cars which may be hauled in a train; and a limitation of the hours which employees shall work without rest. We further believe the legislature should pass laws by which the books of a railroad corporation should be open to inspection by the proper officials of the state, so that a reasonable rate law may be established, and reasonable wages be secured for employees."

George Light Arrives This Morning. Leaves Sunday for Cape Nome.

George Light, who came home from Alaska this morning, expects to leave on Sunday for a trip to Cape Nome. With two others, he has bought a number of miles at Grass Valley, near The Dalles, which is his intention.

The rush to Cape Nome will be immense."

THE REPUBLICAN IS SOLD.

Absorbed by the Tribune—Mr. McManus to Start Stock Journal.

A sale was consummated today in which the plant of the Pendleton Republican became the property of the proprietor of the Pendleton Tribune, E. P. Dodd. The Republican plant stood in the name of Mrs. Mary A. Murphy. The two publications will be combined and the Tribune will absorb the Republican.

Mr. McManus, who has edited the Republican for Mrs. Murphy states that he will go to Seattle and other towns on the coast, on a brief visit for recreation, and that it is his intention to begin the publication of a farm and stock journal. Mr. McManus has been in Pendleton since 1894, when with others he took control of the Pendleton Tribune which for a time ran as a daily, under that management. Later, the Tribune passed into the control of H. H. Hallock, and Mr. McManus established the Weekly Republican, which he has conducted up to this time. The Tribune suspended its daily editions and appeared as a weekly, mostly being issued on Thursdays. Mr. Dodd bought the Tribune from the corporation for which Mr. Hallock managed it.
