PRESIDENT BRYAN CLUBS.

Democratic Committee to Rush Organiza-

tion Throughout the County.

The democratic committee central com-

mittee, as one of the features of the

campaign now being arranged for, will

organize a Bryan club in every precinct

in this county. The county has been

divided into five districts, and work-

ers have been appointed by the chair-

man, Col. Riley, to perfect the organ-

ization of voters vigorously. The

registration of voters which will be the

first of organization for each of the

clubs is in substance that which was

prepared by Mr. Bryan and Senator

Turner, of the state of Washington,

during Mr. Bryan's recent tour of the

northwest, and reads as follows:

"We, the undersigned, citizens and

residents of the precinct, Umatilla

county, Oregon, believing in and loving

every sentiment expressed in the

Declaration of Independence, and the

constitution of our country, and having

in addition faith in the fearless lead-

ership of W. J. Bryan to maintain

every principle expressed therein, do

hereby associate ourselves under the

name of the Bryan club, for the

purpose of organized assistance in the

coming campaign."

inserted in the blank spaces, the same

form being used in each precinct.

PLAN OF HOME TOURNAMENT.

Officials Will Encourage Efficiency in

the Fire Department.

The Pendleton fire department will

participate in the annual tourna-

ment of the Eastern Oregon and Wash-

ington Firemen's Association, now in

progress. Pendleton firemen, be-

longing to the reorganized depart-

ment, which will consist of seven com-

panies in the place of three companies

formerly constituting the department,

will engage in a tournament to be held

here in Pendleton, only Pendleton

companies competing.

Chief Greulich and the council com-

mittee on fire and water have perfected

a plan for reorganization, which is

embodied in an ordinance now before

the council for adoption. When this

plan shall have been put into effect, a

local tournament will be held, at

which a one hundred dollar silver cup

will be competed for in the wet test.

and 25 cash prizes for the speed and

dry tests. These prizes will be put

up by the city council as a means for

encouraging efficiency among local fire-

men. It is a plan somewhat unique

in the north Pacific country, but one

which it is thought will bring better

results than for local companies to en-

gage in competition with departments

from other towns, as formerly, in the

tournaments of the Firemen's Associa-

tion referred to.

REV. PAUL KRUGER.

He is on the National Committee to

Raise a Fund for the Boers.

Rev. Paul Kruger, formerly of

Umatilla, Umatilla county, but who at

present lives at Huntville, Wash.,

has been appointed a member of the

general committee of the National

Boer Relief Fund Association of New

York, and is preparing to enter upon

a tour of the state to organize the

work. This is the organization of

which Hon. Bourke Cockran is president

and G. W. Van Sieten is secretary-treasurer.

The purpose of the association is

to raise \$1,000,000 as a fund for the

widows and orphans of the Boer sol-

diers killed in the struggle with Eng-

land. It is said the mayors of 100 lead-

ing cities throughout the country are

on the committee, and are taking

active steps to build up the fund. In

addition, several United States sena-

tors and representatives, judges of

courts and prominent clergymen are

enlisted in the cause.

Rev. Kruger has received a com-

mmission authorizing him to receive

and forward funds, and has been

furnished a lot of handsome official

seal and receipts, which will be sent

to each contributor to the fund. Con-

tributions are asked for in any sum.

ROSS TRIED TO DO THE REVIEW.

Spokane Paper Had an Experience With

the Defaulting Solicitor.

It is now definitely known that F.

H. Ross, advertising solicitor of the

Pendleton Republican, is a fit subject

for arrest, if he can be found, for

fraudulently issuing checks on the

Pendleton Savings bank, and travel-

ing through this country in the interests of

the paper for which he was working,

soliciting advertisements and subscrip-

tions. Collecting \$250 due the paper,

and turning it in to the manager,

J. P. McManis, proceeded to Athens,

where he drew checks aggregating \$700

upon the Pendleton Savings bank, an

institution in which he had no ac-

count, nor at any previous time had he

had any money deposited. Having

cashied these checks at the First

National bank of Athens, and with

various persons living in that town,

Mr. Ross took the train and departed

for parts unknown. His present

whereabouts the officers are unable to

ascertain.

Mr. Ross came here from Spokane,

where he was for a time in the employ

of the Spokesman-Review. He left

that paper short in his accounts, ac-

cording to C. H. Reed, circulation

manager, but, having been required

to furnish a bond in the sum of \$100,

the Spokesman-Review was able to

make good the deficiency.

Ross has relatives in Spokane, his

wife being in this place, but ignorant

of the whereabouts of her husband.

Mr. Reed, of the Spokesman-Review

was in Pendleton today and stated that

Ross' record in other places was by

no means enviable, and that his de-

parture under a cloud was what might

have been expected.

A General Plan of Bilkings.

Athens, Ore., April 20.—F. E. Ross,

who has furnished the latest sensation

here and at other places in the county

by obtaining money under false pre-

texts, extended his operations into

the state of Washington, and appears

to have evolved and put in effect a

general plan of bilking everyone whom

he could work.

Ross came here from Pendleton by

train, put it up in the livery stable

and proceeded to do business. He drew

checks aggregating \$45 on the Pend-

leton Savings bank and offered them for

cashing at the bank and several stores.

He had no money at the Pendleton

bank, but succeeded in obtaining the

money on all the checks offered.

Ross resorted to a subterfuge to

strengthen his financial standing, by

hinting that he was out on a political

mission for some Pendleton leaders,

and therefore that he had unlimited

backing and credit.
