LEHMAN BLUM'S ESTATE.

After Eight Years of Nursing, Quite a Showing is Made.

The final report of Mr. Tolbenheimer, the assignee of the estate of Lehman Blum, an insolvent debtor, was filed in the equity department of the circuit court at Portland Thursday, says The Telegram, and will be examined and passed upon by Judge Cleland later. The estate has been in the hands of the assignee for nearly eight years, and has required a great deal of attention and labor.

The immediate cause of Mr. Blum's financial failure was the non-success of an enterprise called the Northwest Syrup company, in which he was the principal stockholder. His assets were valued at something over \$40,000, consisting largely of property in Unadilla county, partly in Pendleton, all of which was mortgaged, however, for more than it would sell for during the succeeding years of hard times. One business building in Pendleton was kept rented, by which means the rest of the property was kept in hand and not sacrificed. Some of the property was finally sold, and the mortgages paid off. One piece of real estate, on which there was a mortgage of \$11,000, was sold for \$14,500, and a surplus of over \$4000 was also received from the sale of another tract, so that finally besides one dividend of 10 per cent that has been paid to the general creditors, there will be, after paying all expenses and the fees of the assignee and attorneys, enough money to pay 20-1-3 per cent more, which will be entirely satisfactory to the creditors, whose claims now amount to about \$20,000.

All the local creditors representing about \$15,000 of the claims, join in the statement that a reasonable compensation for the assignee is \$2000, and for the attorneys, Messrs. Calk & Calk, \$1000. The principal creditors are A. Wing, Ben Selling, L. Thunbatter, M. and L. Fried, Leo Selling and the First National bank.

L. Blum was a prosperous merchant in Pendleton for years, doing business where the "Boston Store" now is. Afterwards he engaged in banking, being the largest stockholder in the Pendleton National bank, which did business in the association in Pendleton. Mr. Blum moved to Portland and became identified with the Northwest Syrup company, in which he lost money. From that time on he made a brave fight against adversity, and at present holds a position in some San Francisco store.

DEATH OF JOSEPH AIKEN.

Was Sick With Pneumonia at Sumpter. To Be Buried in Salem.

Word was received here Thursday night of the sudden death at Sumpter of Joseph S. Aiken. He died of pneumonia, after an illness of only twelve hours, and his death is a great shock to his wife, who has been stopping with her sister, Mrs. Homer H. Hallcock, in this city, and was not aware of his illness. The deceased was a man of genial, kindly disposition and had many friends.

His brother, John C. Aiken, a capitalist of Roseburg, Oregon, was with him at his death, and will take his remains to Salem, where he will be buried by the side of his parents, who were old and highly respected pioneers of Southern Oregon. Mrs. Aiken will accompany the body from here on No. 1 tomorrow, and will take with her the sympathy of a large number of friends to whom she has endeared herself during her stay in Pendleton.
