INCREASE OF LAMBS.

Seems to Be About 110 Per Cent in Umatilla and Morrow Counties.

Ex-congressman W. R. Elliot, representative candidate for the judgeship of the sixth judicial district, spent Friday night in Pendleton, en route home from a trip to the state of Washington.

Mr. Elliot says the sheepmen of Morrow county are enjoying a degree of prosperity beyond anything previously experienced. The weather, so far as it has been so favorable during the winter that the wool has grown without any of the breaks in the fibre that were caused by severe cold spells during the winter. The increase in lambs is something like 108 to 110, about the same as in Umatilla county.

Mr. Beetcher, who has returned from his ranch on the Columbia river, says his band of sheep has completed lambing. The increase in lambs born was 120 per cent, and enough lambs lived to make the permanent increase 110 per cent. Mr. Beetcher says this rate of increase, 110, is maintained generally in most of the bands of which he has learned.

MALIGNANT DISEASES.

Smallpox, Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever in Several Towns.

Dr. W. G. Cole, who was called to Athena to make examination of a case of supposed diphtheria, has subjected specimens to microscopic test, and finds the diphtheria bacilli unmistakably present. There are several cases of the same disease in Athena, and the doctor was called there to render expert testimony. The Athena physicians agree with the conclusions of Dr. Cole.

Scarlet fever is present in the East End in a few cases. It has been in Weston, but is lately being eradicated by the care taken by physicians.

Smallpox has again disappeared from Pendleton. Ed Morehead, who was in the pest house, has been discharged as completely cured, and Ralph Ward has been convalescent for a week. No other cases are here. So far as known, no case can be found at the present time in Umatilla county.

CITY AHEAD FOR FIRST QUARTER.

Statement of Receipts and Expenditures Made by the Recorder.

A statement has been prepared by the city recorder of the business of the city of Pendleton during the first three months of 1900, ending March 31, which shows up excellently for the administration. The gist of the statement is that a balance of receipts over expenses, apart from taxes and the interest on outstanding bonds, is \$1080.30; or, in other words, the city has been run on current income and that amount remains as a surplus.

The income has been as follows:

From licenses, \$3163.50.

From dog taxes, \$121.10.

From fines, \$667.50.

Total, \$3952.10.

Expenses have been:

Fire department (including the purchase of considerable appliances which are permanent assets of the department), \$274.59.

Police department, \$667.53.

Lights, \$570.

Health, \$114.

Police department, \$195.08.

Streets, \$750.

Total, \$2871.80.

Balance of receipts over expenditures, \$1080.30.

The revenue from taxes is not included in the above stated receipts. The taxes were levied only to meet interest on the outstanding bonds, but the tax levy is not enough to pay all the charges on the bonds. A portion of these charges will be met from the current income surplus. If there were no bonds, the city would now be running on current receipts, with a surplus remaining for permanent improvements. The bonds are:

\$75,000 5 per cent levee bonds, and \$75,000 5 per cent bonds took up the floating indebtedness which was in the form of warrants at 8 per cent; and \$45,000 of 5 per cent bonds, which represent the old water bonds, and the new ones issued for the recent improvements. The waterworks take care of themselves, paying the interest and providing for the future payment of the principal.

The waterworks statement for the three months is:

Income from monthly rates, \$2487.29.

Expenses—Wood, waste and oil, \$546.85.

Labor, \$450.

Office expenses, \$16.70.

Monthly payments to W. S. Byers, at 25 per month, \$75.

Repairs, \$349.76.

Interest, \$562.25.

Total, \$1994.29.

Net profit of waterworks system for three months, \$493.03.

These figures are indicative of a healthy condition of the city affairs, and prove that the system of management now in force will in a few years bring the city out of debt. The surplus of \$1080.30 for the first quarter of 1900 will be used in permanent improvements. The street department has had set aside for maintenance and improvement during 1900 the sum of \$3000. The expenditures for the first three months under the supervision of Chairman Edwin Switzer has been just one-fourth of the year's allowance. The street work has been in the direction of great improvement. Main and Court streets have been put into fine condition. They are now better than at any time in the history of the city.

AMONG THE PENDLETON CLUBS.

Federation Plan Promises Success—Club Year to End in May.

The active work of the Pendleton clubs will come to an end for the season of 1899-1900 in the latter end of May, most of the clubs holding their closing meetings about that time.

The local club women are now working on a plan for federation here of all the women's organizations. It is now thought the federation will be accomplished in a manner entirely satisfactory. It is believed the efficiency of the clubs will be increased by the federation. Mrs. Wade, president of the state federation, and the president of the club, Mrs. Lane of the Parliament, C. M. Smith of the Woman's club, Mrs. Starkweather of the Current Literature, and Mrs. Marshall of the Thursday Afternoon, are interested in the federation plan, and the members are quite generally enthusiastic for it.

Household Economic Association.

Of all the congresses formed at the time of the World's Columbian exposition, the only one that remains a permanent organization is the Household Economic Association. Its objects are to interest women in all that pertains to the home, the conditions of the home, and the individuals that compose the home; to disseminate a knowledge of the science of housekeeping; to improve the professions and trades that underlie the home. It teaches how to select food and prepare it for health and economy. It teaches the artistic, comfortable, and sanitary furnishings of the house, the intelligent care of children, and that infant mortality may be decreased. In a word it improves the average conditions of home life, which is of vast importance, for out of the home is founded the nation and the commonwealth.

Local Club Notes.

The Thursday Afternoon club will hold the next meeting with Mrs. C. E. Wade on Thursday, April 26. Work on next year's "Calendar" has been outlined and promises to be the very best so far arranged. The departments, three in number, are domestic science, education, which will include the scientific investigation of child study and miscellaneous work in literature, government and current events, some attention being given to life about us and its social problems, which is one of the most encouraging phases of club work since it promises so much for the future. In the field of education, the work of the past year has been of a practical nature. It has brought mothers and teachers in closer sympathy through the visiting committee. It has given the club members an increased knowledge of school conditions and a desire to improve them, thus creating a sentiment in favor of better educational facilities, and assuring teachers and school board of the moral support of the club. A "fund" for library purposes has been created and small sums are being continually added.

The Current Literature club met at the home of Mrs. F. W. Vines on A. A. study of Rudyard Kipling and some of the late novels was given. Selections from Kipling's poems were read, and a discussion which was quite general on popular novels as permanent litera-

ture. "David Harum" was reviewed and discussed.

The Woman's club held a meeting at the home of Mrs. C. J. Smith this afternoon. The program was the "Life and Literary Work of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow." The Parliamentary club will have an "open meeting" Tuesday afternoon, April 24, at the home of Mrs. M. J. Lane.

TOURNAMENT AT DAYTON.

Eastern Oregon and Washington Association Compete on Second Tuesday in May.

Concerning the annual tournament of the regular association of firemen, the Walla Walla Union says:

"Final arrangements have been made for the firemen's tournament to be held in Dayton, beginning the second Tuesday in May and continuing three days. At present it appears that six horse teams will compete for the \$600 in cash prizes hung up by citizens. The matter is being managed by a general committee of seven, consisting of Captains C. F. Miller, H. E. Gilham, C. B. Woodruff, William handler, S. S. Moritz, E. W. Clark and N. B. Fishback.

"Last year the tournament was held at Walla Walla. In the wet test the Dayton team secured the first prize, a splendid silver cup which is highly prized by the victors. One or two teams will compete from Walla Walla."

Then follows an intimation that the Pendleton fire department on "several occasions" has attempted to break appointments. The latest move is to start a little tournament of their own. However, the balance of the association will hold a tournament at Dayton in June, and it will be made a success without Pendleton."

Pendleton's "Little Tournament of Its Own."

Considerable amusement has been caused here in Pendleton by showing the Union's item to the firemen, but no particular attention is paid to it. The plan which has been evolved here is prompted by a desire to bring the Pendleton department to the highest possible state of efficiency. Due consideration of the situation brought the decision to expend the energies of the local firemen in the line of tournament competition here in town. Such a local tournament as will be held here will afford ample opportunity for competition and will be comparatively inexpensive. It is the belief that it will produce better results than participation in the tournaments of the general association. Pendleton firemen have no desire to break up the association, and not one could be expected to do so if he could. Pendleton firemen, however, claim the right themselves to elect what action they shall take, and it will probably make little difference what others say on the subject.

Mayor Lynch is quite enthusiastic for the local tournament plan. He and the councilmen pledge that the council will put up the \$100 silver cup to be competed for each year in the wet test, and also the \$25 cash prizes for the dry and speed tests. It is likely that other prizes will be hung up and the home tournament be quite interesting to firemen and citizens generally.
