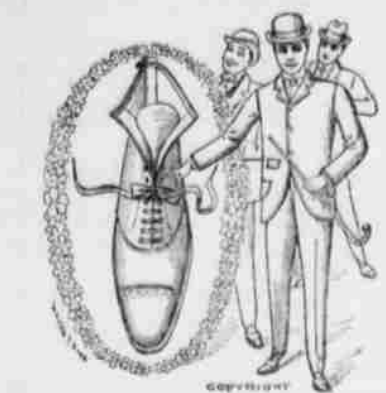

DIED AT BROWNSVILLE.
Father of Mrs. W. M. Blakeley, W. C.
Baird, was a Pioneer of the Coast.
Mrs. W. M. Blakeley received word
this afternoon that her father, W. C.
Baird, died in Brownsville, Oregon, at
about noon today. He had been sick
for about a month. Mrs. Blakeley
leaves this evening for Brownsville, to
attend the funeral, which occurs on
Wednesday at that place.
Mr. Baird was a native of the state
of Ohio. He crossed the plains in 1853,
settling in Brownsville, where he lived
until ten years ago, when he moved to
the Grande Ronde valley. Last fall he
returned again to Brownsville.
Six of the nine children born to Mr.
and Mrs. Baird are living, five daugh-
ters and one son.
Mr. Baird was a man of sterling
worth. He was one of the men who
assisted in the great work of develop-
ing the western country and was uni-
versally respected wherever he lived.
He was very favorably known in Pen-
dleton, many of the older residents be-
lieving among his friends. Each one will
regret his demise and sympathize with
the family who are bereaved by his
death.
