Rather Usual Procedure for a Pendleton Theatre Audience.

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The house was crowded, the boxes being filled in addition to the entire lower floor. The incidents of the evening, with the egg throwing, the angry rebuke given by Mr. Smith, the occasional hissing given that gentleman by the gallery, and the general impossibility for him to induce the audience to take him seriously in his attempt at Celtic comedy, (which last observation is no attempted criticism) will doubtless discourage amateur dramatic performances in Pendleton for some time to come.

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"I consider that I have been outrageously treated, and that the lack of respect was due to the fact that I am a poor man. Had I been the possessor of wealth, the audience throughout would have maintained a respectful attitude and applauded my stage work. I never thought of an actor's performance as not endorsed by the people of this town, and that they will meet me in the future any such things."

Mr. Smith was assured by many

that hurling eggs was by no means the conventional method of criticizing the performers who appear before Pendleton audiences. He was generally consoled with, and found much sympathy wherever he went.

All attempts to ferret out the one who hurled the egg have proven fruitless, and it is apparent that no detective work will be skillful enough to convict anyone of this deed of extraordinary disrespect. Should the discovery be made, however, Mr. Smith and others will see that the severest punishment prescribed by law is inflicted on the one who is guilty.
