BRYAN HAS A CHANCE.

In his last weekly financial review,
Henry Clews, the veteran Wall street
banker, in analyzing the commercial
situation and the speculative markets,
advances the confident statement that
Bryan's candidacy has ceased to alarm
the financial interests of the country.
Mr. Clews thinks investors can view
the future with complacency, because
the gold standard is written so
thoroughly into the laws that even Mr.
Bryan's election could not menace it.

Enough of that sort of statement,
coming from that and similar sources,
would elect Bryan. Because the air is
charged with the elements of a great
national revolt against McKinley,
Hanna and monopoly. Another source
of danger to the McKinley administra-
tion is its imperialistic treatment of
our new possessions. This has become
offensive to large numbers of earnest
supporters of national expansion, to
say nothing of the millions of voters
who are conscientiously opposed to any
sort of expansion over-seas.

If the commercial and industrial
interests of the country were convinced
that Bryan's election would not exert
a disturbing influence, he would beat
McKinley hands down. Because the
heart of the nation is with him in his
masterful fight against monopoly,
bottle and offensive bossism of the re-
publican leaders in all parts of the
country.—Spokanean-Review.

Ex-President Cleveland warns the
