DEATH OF LEHMAN BLUM.

Died at Waldeck Sanitarium, San Francisco, of Surgical Operation.

Lehman Blum, who for many years was a resident of Pendleton and prominent in business here, died Tuesday in San Francisco, at the Waldeck Sanitarium, having submitted to a surgical operation.

Mr. Blum had been in business at Redding, Calif., for several years. Mr. Blum was in the mercantile business in Pendleton, his location being on the corner of Main and Court streets where the Boston Store now stands. Mr. Blum himself built the store building now standing there and occupied by the Boston Store, erecting it in 1883. When Mr. Blum was conducting the store in those days, Leon Cohen and More Baruh were members of the force of clerks, both of whom later went into business here. Mr. Cohen being now standing there and Mr. Baruh recently having removed to Portland.

Mr. Blum was active not only in business, but was also quite a figure in local politics. He was a member of the common council and was once a candidate for the mayoralty. Mr. Blum came to the coast from New Orleans when a boy, and remained in Portland for a number of years, coming to Pendleton and entering business. Later he returned to Portland and engaged in manufacturing of grapes and jellies.

Surviving him are his wife and one daughter.

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THE MARKETS.

Wheat Market Still Displays Inactivity.

Livestock and Wool.

Portland, April 26.—The Commercial Review in today's issue, in its review of the wheat market for the past week, says:

The wheat market here has again sagged, and the inactivity displayed by both buyers and sellers causes a very dull feeling throughout the wheat belt. Fewer sellers have appeared on spot than at any previous time this year, and it looks as though holders have made up their minds to obtain a radical advance on present quotations or carry their stocks over into the new season. It must be admitted that the prospects of the former contingency arising are not very flattering, and there being nothing in late foreign advices to cause exporters to work business at anything above current figures; indeed, shippers appear indifferent as to whether they do anything or not. They certainly will not without seeing a profit in sight.

Vessels nearly and quartered rates are so high that shippers will not make any concessions, and prefer to work other business than wheat, to secure immediate business. As a result, exporters are between two fires—to pay above ruling prices for wheat, or to advance on weight values would surely cause a loss before the cargo left the river, and quite an advance abroad would be necessary to make the shipper whole, to say nothing of a profit. It is not surprising, therefore, that our shippers are not anxious to work new business at all scaled conditions. Quotations are all scaled down since our last, and Club is quoted at 51 to 52c; Valley, 51 to 52c; Bluestem, 51 to 54c per bushel.

Wheat in San Francisco.

San Francisco, April 26.—Holders continue to offer sparingly, and there is very little vim to the market. Transactions are small. Exporters have wants so well under control that their immediate requirements are now comparatively small. Trading, consequently, is quite unimportant, and mostly confined to filling the needs of millers. The present condition of the growing crop throughout the most important sections of the wheat belt is excellent, and the prospects for a very large crop are so flattering that buyers have reduced their limits to 100,000 bushels for No. 1 shipping grade. Milling, 97½ to 98.

New York, April 26.—Bradstreet's reports the following changes in the wheat supply for the past week:

Wheat, United States and Canada, east of the Rockies, decrease, 1,000,000 bushels; Europe, increase, 300,000 bushels. Total supply, decrease, 700,000 bushels.

The aggregate stocks of wheat held at Portland, Tacoma, and Seattle decreased 189,000 bushels last week.

Wheat in Pendleton.

Pendleton, April 26.—The local market has been stagnant for several days, with no known sales. The nominal Pendleton quotation is 40 cents for No. 1 club, the standard grade. Today better foreign advices came from the west, and local holders are trading more in the news. Consequently, L. L. Ray, of Ray & McCasas, local brokers and members of the Chicago board of trade, said today that for many weeks the sole cause for local activity in wheat, whenever such activity has occurred, has been milling demand.

"I look for no improvement in the wheat situation during the present year," said Mr. Ray today. "I notice that a ship owner has refused in Portland 30 shillings 6 pence for December loading, which is close to the present quoted rate of 40 shillings. The world's ships seem to be busy with more carrying than they can do, and there is no reason to hope for cheaper ocean freights for a long time to come."

All the crop reports of Oregon and Washington are bull features, inasmuch as they indicate large yields in all localities.

Wool in Boston.

Boston, April 26.—Territory wools continue to take the lead, and the larger part of the business is in wools grown west of the Mississippi river. The quotations are:

PAUL KRUGER'S PRO-BORER EFFORTS.

Works in State of Washington for the Relief Fund.

Rev. Paul Kruger, who was pastor of the Ukiah United Brethren church in the Southern end of this county, is a member of the general committee of the National Borer Relief Fund Association of New York. He is working in the state of Washington with his new home, Huntsville, as headquarters, and he is an authorized custodian of money raised for the benefit of the Borer widows and orphans of men killed in the present war in South Africa. J. H. Hofmeyr, president of the Afrikaner bond and former premier of Cape Colony, thus writes in a letter:

"Of Red Cross societies we already have quite enough. Only the other day a wire was received here from Pretoria, via Delagoa bay, declining the help of an ambulance corps, worthy South African medical students and doctors sent from Edinburgh, as so many ambulance parties had already arrived from Europe and elsewhere."

"Whatever the result of the war may be, thousands of Borer widows and orphans will be left in a state of destitution. Hundreds of thousands of dollars will be required to render them some effective aid. But when the stirring events of the war are over, the lot of these poor, sorrowing ones will not appeal to the public imagination, and unless the public purse strings be untied now, they will be left to starve."

Dr. Leyds, under date of March 24, 1900, has written that the Red Cross societies have among their funds and that the provision must now be made for the widows and orphans, and urging united action throughout the United States as most effectual.

"Kindly send a contribution, no matter how small or large, and the same will be gratefully acknowledged by the immediate return of our official souvenir receipt," is the way the association invites contributions from the people of the Pacific northwest.

The National Borer Relief Fund association was organized upon the wish of Dr. W. J. Leyds, the European envoy and representative of the republic of South Africa; Dr. Hendrik Muller, the envoy extraordinary of the Orange Free State to the Netherlands, and J. H. Hofmeyr of Cape Town, president of the Afrikaner bond and former premier of Cape Colony.

This association is the central body with which all smaller organizations throughout the country is co-operating. In this way waste is prevented and united action on the part of all pro-Borer sympathizers in the United States is accomplished.

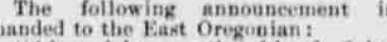

DIPPING WOOL IN LIME.

American Woolen Company Will Discriminate Against Them.

Sheep and wool men will find the following
