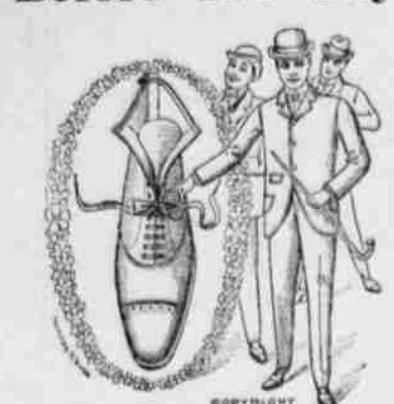

AURILLA SULLIVAN'S DEATH.

Had Suffered a Stroke of Paralysis
While Attending Her Sick Sister.

Miss Aurilla G. Sullivan, who was
for several months a guest in Pendleton
of Mrs. M. A. Butler before the re-
moval to Baker City of Mr. and Mrs.
Butler, died Saturday evening in
Baker City. Miss Sullivan and her
sister, Miss Alta Sullivan, had many
friends in Pendleton, who will learn
with deep regret of the death of the
former.

Regarding the sickness and death of
Miss Sullivan, the Baker City Demo-
crat says:

"Miss Aurilla G. Sullivan was the
eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. L.
Sullivan, of Baker City, her parents
and a younger sister surviving her.
She was born at Honey Grove, Iowa,
June 25, 1876, at which place she lived
until 8 years old when she removed
with her parents to Olympia, Wash.
About four years ago, the family re-
moved to Baker and have been re-
spected residents of the city ever
since.

"The circumstances attending the
sickness which caused Miss Sullivan's
death are somewhat pathetic. On the
23d of February last she went to St.
Elizabeth hospital to attend the be-
side of her sister, Alta, being then
seemingly in perfect health. On that
day, while standing in the hospital
hall talking with her mother, Miss
Sullivan fell to the floor caused by a
stroke of paralysis. Every device
known to medical skill was resorted to
but she gradually sank until the end
came Saturday last.

"On the 26th of April a consultation
of physicians was held as a last resort,
and Miss Sullivan was removed from
her parents' home and taken to the
hospital and had an operation per-
formed. She stood the operation well,
but no benefit resulted.

"Miss Sullivan had a wide circle of
friends who deeply regret her death.
She had many kindly traits of char-
acter which formed close and endur-
ing ties of friendship. She was a re-
spected member of the Eastern Star
and the funeral and burial in Masonic
cemetery was under the auspices of
that order."

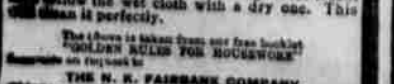

A BOOK—"WONDERLAND."

The Northern Pacific's Annual Number
Possesses Unusual Interest.

"Wonderland," for 1900, an annual
publication issued by the passenger de-
partment of the Northern Pacific rail-
way, is just out and will be ready for
distribution in a few days. The
present issue, which contains 124
magnificently illustrated pages is the
best of the many notable volumes
published in recent years. The sub-
ject matter which treats of the build-
ing of the Northern Pacific railway
and its close relation with the develop-
ment of the great northwest territory
is of unusual interest this year, giving
a complete historical sketch of the
expedition under command of Lewis
and Clarke in the year 1804. This ex-
ploring expedition was one of the
greatest ever sent out by the govern-
ment of the United States, being for
the purpose of obtaining data as to the
climate and resources of what was
then known as the Louisiana terri-
tory, and of making treaties with the
various Indian tribes. These explorers
followed the Missouri river to its
source in the Rockies, then crossed
the divide and descended the Clear-

water and Columbia rivers to the
Pacific ocean where they remained
during the winter of 1805-6 and then
returned to St. Louis, Missouri, cov-
ering almost 10,000 miles of travel by
boat, foot and on horseback through
a country uninhabited except by In-
dians and wild beasts. Two-thirds of
"Wonderland 1900" is devoted to this
fascinating subject. The important
incidents and points of the trip are
brought out and contrasts between
then and now are shown and some
new material published. Specially
prepared maps show the route of the
explorers, and reproductions of photo-
graphs of historic and interesting
places make the book of extreme in-
terest and value.

The Building of the Northern Pacific.

In the chapter devoted to an account
of the building of the Northern Pacific
railroad—the first transcontinental line
projected, is a brief history of the
Oriental trade together with some
ideas of the promotion and develop-
ment of foreign commerce which will
be read with interest. It says:

"On the shore of the Pacific a great
commerce has sprung up, and the
wheel of interior Oregon and Wash-
ington is carried to the Puget Sound
and Columbia river ports, from whence it
is shipped as flour to Australia,
Hawaii, Japan, China, South America
and other points.

Washington timber and shingles are
being shipped in trainloads across the
continent and also to foreign countries
and north Pacific coast canneries ship
their products in every direction.
From the inception of the enterprise
to the present time through all changes
of management the development of the
Pacific coast has been looked for-
ward to and fostered by the Northern
Pacific railway.

Trade With the Orient.

"Upon the completion of the North-
ern Pacific railroad immediate steps
were taken to stimulate trade with
the Orient and in 1892 the North-
ern Pacific steamship company was
organized. This was the first trans-
Pacific company operating between
Puget Sound ports and China and
Japan, and to its efforts is due almost
entirely the upbuilding of this com-
merce on the north Pacific coast.

From an eastbound tonnage of about
1,000 tons carried by the Northern
Pacific in 1892, this traffic has in-
creased to much more than double that
amount in recent and favorable years.
From 110 tons of westbound tonnage in
1895, the road now transports from 12-
000 to 20,000 tons per annum, depend-
ing upon the fluctuations of commerce.
It should be understood that this traf-
fic does not include the Oriental ship-
ments that originate on, and are destined
to, north Pacific coast points and which
constitute by far the larger part of the
steamships' cargoes. It covers simply
the overland Oriental tonnage."

AN EXCITING RUNAWAY.

A Team Driven by Miss App Make a Mad
Race of Several Miles.

This morning Miss Emma App, the
19-year-old daughter of August App,
started to drive a team of horses to
Henry Lorenzen's place, north of town,
to Pendleton, for the purpose of sum-
moning a doctor to attend Mr. Loren-
zen, who is quite ill. Without apparent
cause, at a point about nine miles
from town, the horses started from a
trot to a lively run and kept it up
for a distance of over two miles, when
they overtook C. F. Daniels and Wil-
liam Grayhall, two young men who
were on their way to Pendleton on
horseback. Young Daniels, realizing
the situation at once, gave instructions
to his companion to endeavor to catch
one of the horses by the bit, and he
would do the same for the other.

Miss App pluckily held onto the
reins and kept her scared team in the
middle of the road. The young men
succeeded in catching the bits and
stopping the runaways, after a race of
nearly a half-mile. Neither the
team nor the vehicle was injured, and
Miss App was very little frightened.
Mr. Daniels drove the team to a neigh-
boring ranch, where Miss App re-
mained, and came to town after the
doctor in her place. Miss App had
driven the horses frequently before,
but never had they shown a disposition
to run away until today.

SHE FELL ASLEEP.

An Autopsy Proved that the Cause Was
Hemorrhage of the Brain.

Mrs. D. M. Nichols, who was taken
to Portland from Bridgeport, Baker
county, to a Portland hospital died
that city Sunday night. While read-
ing a newspaper several weeks ago in
her home in Baker county she suddenly
fell asleep and could not be awakened,
only for a moment after which she was
said to be in a trance, but it was dis-
covered on performing an autopsy that,
instead of being in a trance, as was
supposed, she was in a state of coma,
brought on by a hemorrhage of the
brain. She had suffered from diabetes,

Although she had suffered the promi-

years, Mrs. Nichols never took treat-
