IS HARRY WUKACH LOST?

Tailor Left Pendleton 16 Months Ago—No Word From Him Since Then.

Harry Wukach, a tailor, left Pendleton a year ago last Christmas, intending to go to Roseburg. Since that time he has not been heard from by his Pendleton friends, with one exception. He left his personal effects, to be sent to him as soon as he found a location in Western Oregon. Wukach was employed in the tailor shops here and was an industrious, sober man. When he left Pendleton in December, 1898, he had several hundred dollars, which he took with him. He owned a horse and lot in Roseburg, which he had purchased previously from a Roseburg tailor for whom he worked. Wukach complained that he had rather poor health here, and sought a location in Western Oregon for that reason. He left instructions for the forwarding of his trunk and other personal effects when he decided where in Western Oregon he would locate and sent back word to Pendleton.

Mr. Wukach's friends here have come to the conclusion that, with the lapse of 16 months and no word from him regarding the property left in Pendleton, he may have died somewhere west of here, his relatives not knowing of it. Anyone who can send them information on the subject will confer a favor on them.

Harry Wukach was about 45 years old, was short and thick-set, and had brown hair. He was a single man. Mr. Wukach's friends ask the East Oregonian to make the matter public and to suggest that papers in the Willamette valley and Western Oregon towns give attention to it.

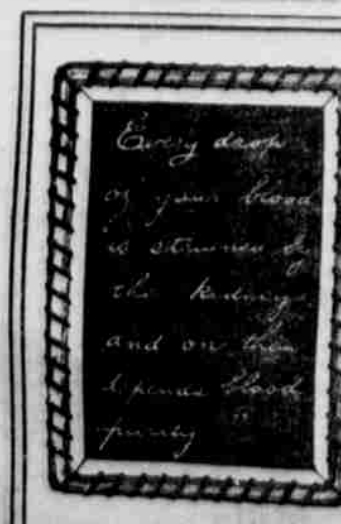

With very few exceptions if an Indian farms any land he does it on his own land. When the Indian rents his land he receives from one to three dollars an acre. All leases are subject to the approval of the agent; the rents are paid twice a year.

IS THERE COAL NEAR PENDLETON?

Expert Leaves Town Today to Make Investigation on Birch Creek.

George A. Wells, a surface expert, arrived this morning in Pendleton, and, accompanied by W. T. Rigby, went out on Birch creek to investigate the coal prospects, which several Pendleton men are interested. Senator T. C. Taylor, Mr. Rigby and others some time ago obtained the prospect location and some work of exploitation has already been done. It has been hoped that the result would

be to develop coal supply of considerable magnitude, the coal of a quality warranting its use. The present investigation is to determine the likelihood of the prospect showing up after development, and Mr. Wells will report on it to the railroad company. The prospect lies 20 miles south from Pendleton on Birch creek. Were a large supply of coal to be shown up, it would be immensely valuable at a point so close to the railroad. So far those who are interested make absolutely no predictions. "It is just now only a prospect," said Senator Taylor, "and no one knows what investigation will bring forth."

FLOATING IN THE RIVER.

Body of a Man Found at Portland Weighed Down With Iron.

Portland, April 27.—The body of an unknown man was found floating in the river just south of the railroad bridge. Around the neck there was twisted a wire to which was attached two brake shoes taken from a freight car and weighing about 50 pounds. It was thought the body was that of William Brannan of Ellensburg, N. Y., who has been missing from Seattle for three weeks, but word came this evening that he was safe in Seattle. It is evident the man was murdered and then thrown into the river.

Seattle, April 27.—Telegraphic advices of April 21 from Dawson to Skagway and brought to Seattle on the steamer Humboldt, state that the census of the Klondike has been completed. The population of Dawson is 5450 and of the Klondike 3397. The district has 2767 British subjects and 5530 citizens of the United States. The population of Dawson has increased 1500 since January.
