AFTER THIRTEEN YEARS' SUFFERING.
George Hislop Was Found Dead by His
Father This Morning.

George Hislop, son of A. J. Hislop
of this city, died this morning between
the hours of 9 and 10 o'clock. Droopy,
induced by an injury to the back, sus-
tained 13 years ago, was the cause of
death.

Only a few deaths in Pendleton have
been more pathetic. George Hislop had
lived here for about four years. He
came from Wapello, Iowa, with his
father. He was 21 years old last
February.

When he was 8 years of age, while
playing with some other children in
a boy sprang on George's back and in
the fall which followed injured the
spinal column. From the accident he
never recovered. All the resources of

science were resorted to, but nothing
could be done to effect a cure.
During all the thirteen years that
have followed, George has been a
sufferer, a sufferer of constant pain. It
was not occasional pain, nor occasional
illness. Every waking moment of his
life he felt deep pains from the in-
jury, until long ago he had forgotten
what it was to be free from suffering.
And few were the nights when sleep
came to relieve him.

And yet he was cheerful, loving,
kindly disposed towards all, devoted to
his parents. In all the places in
which he had been was or is no one
who is not a friend to George Hislop.
His character, tried in the fires of ad-
versity, had been made of the sort
that wins admiration. He was one of
the "unbroke heroes" who are found
in real life and who elude the ob-
servation of all but the great
fictionists.

Complaining for several weeks of un-
usual distress, he was sent to Duncan
McLeod's place near Adair, for
recreation. Former life in the
country had benefited him. It was
hoped it would this time. But after
about ten days, Friday evening Mr.
Hislop received a message to meet
George at the train, and he was
brought home. Dr. C. J. Smith was
called and at once said there was prac-
tically no hope of recovery. This
morning the boy was apparently asleep
under the influence of an opiate, and
his father waited until the son had
rested and called to him at about half
past nine. Hearing no response, he
made quick examination and found
that the boy was dead.

There is very deep and genuine sym-
pathy in Pendleton for the bereaved
father, and a very respectful memory
of George Hislop will long endure in
this community.
