GENERAL NEWS.

George C. Tod, formerly of Kentucky,
a brother-in-law of President Lincoln,
died at Danwell, South Carolina,
Saturday.The Union Pacific railway company
has begun suit against the Montana
Union railway company to collect
\$800,000 alleged to be due as rental
under a lease.On Franklin field, under the aus-
pices of the university of Pennsylv-
ania, a new world's record was made
by M. Princeton, the marvellous jumper
of Syracuse university, who jumped
24 feet 7 1/2 inches in the broad jump.
The former record was held by A. C.
Kraenzlein, of Pennsylvania, at 24
feet 4 1/2 inches.Mrs. Susan Wynan, the first white
child born at Fort Dearborn, the site
of the City of Chicago, is dead in her
80th year at Santa Ana, Cal. Her
father, Corporal John Simmons, was a
victim of the Indian massacre at the
fort in 1812, when Mrs. Wynan was but
a baby. She was the last survivor of
that bloody event.A dispatch to the World from Hong
Kong says it is reported there that
Roosevelt's Wildman, the American
consul-general, is leaving for the
United States on a political mission.
Mr. Wildman, it is said, has been
asked by republican leaders in the
West to become a candidate for the
vice-presidential nomination.In anticipation of the final enact-
ment of the Hawaiian government bill,
the president is devoting some at-
tention to the selection of the various
officials of the new government who
are subject to executive appointment.
It is the intention to make these ap-
pointments very soon. There are four
candidates for the governorship, with
ex-President Dole in the lead.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The prune crop in the Willamette
valley and Southern Oregon will be a
failure, largely on account of the con-
tinued cold weather of the past few
weeks.At a meeting held in Seattle, Satur-
day, the Puget Sound Timbermen's As-
sociation resolved upon a six-week's
shutdown of all logging camps in the
state within its jurisdiction.Frank Gowey, only son of the late
Consul-General John F. Gowey, has
written from Yokohama that Mrs.
Gowey would arrive in Olympia with
her husband's remains on or about
May 10.John W. Hume, ex-Mayor of Astoria,
and for a number of years one of the
best known residents of the Lower
Columbia river district, died at his
residence in Astoria Saturday, after an
extended illness, from paralysis.Miss Maud Bryant, of Clatskanie,
Columbia county, has been nomi-
nated for county school superin-
tendent on the democratic-people's-
union ticket, vice W. L. Kyser, who
expects to remove from the state.According to the latest estimate of
Secretary O. L. Miller, of the Chamber
of Commerce, the output of the East-
ern Oregon gold fields, present and
prospective, is put at \$4,975,000 an-
nually. The actual output is \$2,225,-
000.P. B. Gifford and Mrs. W. B. Ayer,
both of Portland, are the champion
golf players of Pacific Northwest. They
won the honor Saturday, by defeating
their competitors in the finals of the
men's and women's open championship
contest.The total enrollment at the agricul-
tural college is now 405. Of the 33
counties in Oregon, 27 have students
at the institution. Inquiries for cata-
logues and other information indicate
that next year's attendance will be
very large.The residence of S. N. Steele at
Albany, was partially destroyed by fire
Saturday evening, causing a loss to
house and furniture of about \$1000.
The fire started from a defective flue.
Mr. Steele is in Sumpter. The loss is
fully covered by insurance.The university of California will
send an expedition into Oregon this
summer to gather fossils in the
famous John Day beds. The party

NO SYMPATHY FOR BOERS

Senate Defeats the Resolution by a
Vote of 29 to 20.

M'BRIDE AND SIMON NOT PRESENT

Resolution in the House Disqualifying Po-
lygamists for Election to Congress.
Other Washington News.Washington, April 30.—By a vote of
20 to 29 the senate refused to consider
the resolution of sympathy with the
Boers. The defeated vote was:

Stewart, Sullivan, Warren, Wolcott.To Disqualify Polygamists.
Washington, April 30.—Corlies of
Michigan, called up the joint resolution
for a constitutional amendment to
disqualify polygamists for election as
senators and representatives and pro-
hibiting polygamy and polygamous co-
habitation between the sexes. It was
referred to the committee on judiciary.Conferees Failed to Agree.
Washington, April 30.—Conferees on
the Puerto Rico bill providing for the
appointment of temporary officers in the
island are unable to agree and have
determined to report a complete
disagreement.A Scheme on Foot.
Washington, April 30.—Senator
Foraker of Ohio is charged by members
of the house committee on insular
affairs with blocking the franchise re-
form amendments in the interests of
corporation exploitation in Puerto
Rico. If there is a real scandal under
American rule in that island responsi-
bility therefore, it is charged by re-
publicans of the lower house, will rest
upon the junior senator from Ohio.The Nicaragua Canal.
Washington, April 30.—International
complications are threatened anew over
the Nicaragua canal bill. This week
the house of representatives will pass
the measure providing for construction
of the isthmian canal by the American
government, and the friends of the
canal in the senate are now threaten-
ing to pass the bill through that body also.Up to this time it has not been be-
lieved they could muster enough votes
to do so, but it is undeniable that they
have gained strength during the last
ten days, and there is now serious
danger that they may pass the bill. If
this be done the administration will
be in a most delicate position. Presi-
dent McKinley will have either to
veto a measure which under normal
conditions he would be heartily in
favor of, and which is favored by a
vast majority of the people of the
country, or he will have to lay the
American nation open to the charge of
having violated a solemn treaty com-
pact with Great Britain.Although the Nicaragua canal bill
now pending in the house has been
modified as to the provisions for fortifi-
cations, these modifications do not
prevent the measure from being passed.
The United States shall do the very
thing which in the Clayton-Bulwer
treaty it covenanted with England
not to do. And the Clayton-Bulwer
treaty is still in force, its validity
having recently been recognized, not
only by the president and the secretary
of state but by the foreign relations
committee of the senate.England Will Protest.
If the United States congress passes
the Nicaragua bill now in hand Great
Britain will energetically protest
against executive sanction thereof.
Moreover, the protest will be morally
supported by Germany, France and
other maritime powers. As long as the
proposition to build a canal in defiance
of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty is in leg-
islative stage Great Britain is deterred
from entering formal protest, for it is
a well-recognized rule of international
courtesy that parliamentary pro-
ceedings are not proper subjects of di-
plomatic negotiation or criticism. But
if the canal measure be presented to
the American executive for his signa-
ture, then the interested powers will
have the right to come forward with
their objections.There is now a thorough understand-
ing between Great Britain, Germany
and France as to the matter. The En-
glish government, as the only one hav-
ing direct or treaty rights in the
premises, will probably make formal
protest alone. But the other powers,
if they do not protest formally, will
certainly do so informally, and the
meaning of this is that they will,
through diplomatic intercourse, ex-
press their grave displeasure.Tendered His Resignation.
Washington, April 30.—Claude M.
Johnson, chief of the bureau of grav-
ing and printing, has tendered his
resignation.President Signs Hawaiian Bill.
Washington, April 30.—The presi-
dent signed the Hawaiian bill today.

RAVAGES OF THE WAR.

Hundreds of Sick and Wounded British
Invalided Home.London, April 30.—Latest news from
the Orange Free State indicates that
though the Boers vacated Tlhabancho,
they had only done so in order to
occupy stronger positions.Yesterday General Dewit made an
effort to turn French's eastern flank,
which was only foiled by the cavalry
after vigorous maneuvers.British casualties during the
Tlhabancho fighting were slight. From
Biera, Portuguese East Africa, comes
news of the arrival there of the Cana-
dian battery. Sir Frederick Carrington,
who is to command the British
troops going to Rhodesia has been
officially welcomed by Portuguese
officials. A conception of the contin-
uous ravages of the war can be gathered
from a Cape Town dispatch briefly an-
nouncing the arrival from Natal of 25
officers and 250 men invalided home
and the sailing of the Auraria forEngland with 400 sick and wounded
soldiers.

MANY CONFLAGRATIONS.

Forest Fires in Michigan and Wisconsin.
Blaze at Eugene.Eugene, Ore., April 30.—The saw-
mill of the Eugene Lumber company
caught fire this afternoon and will be a
total loss. Lumber in the yard is
burning. The fire department is al-
most helpless in its efforts to check
the flames, which are spreading by the
aid of gale breezes. The wagon bridge
across the Willamette is now on fire
and will probably be a total loss.A Michigan Town Scorching.
Gladwin, Mich., April 30.—Fire
last night destroyed 16 buildings,
causing a loss of \$50,000. Albert
Bergen is believed to have been burned
to death.Forest Fires in Michigan.
Marquette, Wis., April 30.—Forest
fires raged furiously north of Fish
Lake, Saturday and Sunday. There
was immense property damage. The
large town of Ames, Mich., was prac-
tically wiped out. All the inhabitants
of Ames and Nathan were taken to
Tomahawk for safety. Forest fires are
burning everywhere north of here.Fire at Niagara, Wisconsin.
Iron Mountain, Mich., April 30.—
A big fire is raging at Niagara, Wis.,
and assistance has been asked. The
town is in the region of forest fires.MERRIAM CROSS-EXAMINED.
Denies Statements that Had Been
Attributed to Him.Washington, April 30.—The cross-ex-
amination of General Merriam in the
Coeur d'Alene investigation was re-
sumed today. Merriam said he had not
interfered in labor affairs in any way
except for the purpose of maintaining
order. Merriam was questioned as to
the report that he had stated that con-
gress should just leave to deal with
labor organizations as criminal orga-
nizations. He had not, he said men-
tioned congress. What he had said
was in substance: "You ought to have
a conspiracy law which would make
the action of these people, narrated by
Sovereign in his paper, crimes punish-
able by law."He had never pronounced the unions
in the Coeur d'Alene district criminal
organizations.Killed by a Pipe Stem.
Norwalk, Ohio, April 30.—Patrick
Cahill of Chicago died last night in
this city, the result of a peculiar ac-
cident which befell him at Chicago, his
late home. Several weeks ago, while
smoking a pipe, he fell down and the
pipe was thrust so firmly into his
throat that the surgeon found it im-
possible to remove a portion of the
stem. He continued to grow worse and
died as stated.The Buffalo Strike.
Buffalo, April 30.—There are no
developments in the strike situation
here. It is stated by officials at the
Central and Lake Shore transfer
freight houses that the threatened
strike had not materialized and all the
men are working.Illinois Democrats for Bryan.
Chicago, April 30.—The Tribune
says: At a private conference between
W. J. Bryan and others, including
Mayor Harrison, the latter assuring
Bryan that Illinois would send a solid
Bryan delegation to the national con-
vention.

GOEBEL'S ALLEGED MURDERERS.

Frankfort, Ky., April 30.—Circuit
court convened today. Caleb Powers,
John Davis, Hariton Whittaker, W. H.
Culter and "Tallow Dick" Combs were
arraigned by the commonwealth. All
defendants entered pleas of not guilty.

GOVERNOR MCCONNELL'S EXPERIENCE.

Feet of Roasted Canine that Was En-
joyed Until It Was Learned that Some
of the Dogs Had Rabies.Not a great while ago ex-Governor
W. J. McConnell of Idaho, inspector
of Indian reservations, went to an
agency in a remote section of Wiscon-
sin to examine into the conditions
prevailing there respecting the govern-
ment's wards, says the Boise City
Statesman. When he arrived he found
the agency officials greatly perturbed.
It seems the Indians there are very
fond of dog, and no tribal feast is com-
plete without plenty of roasted canine.
A big feast had occurred just prior to
the inspector's visit. Dogs of all
shapes and sizes and colors were killed
and roasted for the occasion, and the
Indians devoured the sweet morsels
with all the exhibitions of delight
known to the tribesman who has never
known the pangs of dyspepsia.The echoes of the feast had scarcely
died away before some of the Indians
began to act queerly. They were first
taken sick and then became violent,
barking and biting. An investigation
was made, and it was learned that
some of the dogs that had been stuffed
and done to a brown had been afflicted
with rabies. The agency officials were
greatly alarmed, and had all Indians
who exhibited symptoms of the dis-
order tied down.The inspector did not tarry long. He
told the story to some friends after he
left the agency, and one of the gentle-
men has written here about it. Inspec-
tor McConnell said he would return
and complete his work whenever he
received word that the dog-filled reds
had quit barking.

DYNAMITE EXPLODES.

Powder House on the Northern Pacific
Catches Fire.The powder house at Lind, on the
Northern Pacific, near Riverville, East-
ern Washington, caught fire on Sat-
urday. The little house contained some-
thing like 5000 pounds of dynamite.
The depot and little town is not very
far away from where the powder house
stood. When the powder house was
seen to be on fire the employees and
the towns people took a position of
safety. The explosion came soon after
the fire started. It was just awful!
Buildings for miles around were badly
shaken and injured, the depot and
freight house of the railroad company
was wrecked, telegraph poles were
knocked down and nearly every
window light in the town was broken.
A part of the stock of the drug store
was destroyed. The powder house is
supposed to have been set on fire by
sparks from an engine.A lodge of Elks was instituted at
Lincoln, Neb., last Saturday evening,
and among the new members was Wm.
J. Bryan.

GERMANY WANTS NO CRISIS

May Not Like Root's Speech, But Will
Let It Pass.

RECOGNIZES THE MONROE DOCTRINE

Has No Intention to Foreibly Enter the West-
ern Hemisphere—Diplomatic Com-
plications Not Likely.New York, April 30.—A special to
the Herald from Washington says:
Secretary Root's speech relative to the
Monroe doctrine is likely to be produc-
tive of diplomatic inquiries at the
state department.It is emphatically asserted at the
German embassy that there is no in-
tention on the part of Germany to
forcibly enter the western hemisphere.
The German government recognizes the
Monroe doctrine and does not propose
to violate it. Those close to Secretary
Root say it is hardly likely that Ger-
many, in the present undeveloped state
of her navy, would like a crisis to be
precipitated at this time.

THREE GREAT BATTLESHIPS.

The Greatest Fighting Ships in the
World for the Navy.Washington, April 30.—The three
new battleships to be constructed for
the United States will excel anything
in the world's navies in speed, arma-
ment and power combined.The naval board on construction has
finally approved the plans for the
ships authorized by the last congress,
and gave instructions to have the
specifications prepared at once prelimi-
nary to calling for bids from the ship-
builders.The ships will be enlarged Iowa in
type with the same rectangular super-
structure and the two turrets, bow and
stern, on the main deck. The turret
guns will be 12-inch caliber, like the
Iowa's guns; there will be a turret at
each corner of the superstructure carry-
ing two 8-inch guns and twelve 6-inch
rapid fireers will be disposed along the
sides of the central citadel. The ships
will make nineteen knots speed and
have a displacement of about 15,500
tons, making these new ships by far
the largest in the United States navy
and as big as the latest type of British
armored cruiser.As the constructors are limited in
the draft by our shallow harbors at a
little over twenty-five feet, and the
seventy-five feet represents about the
greatest beam consistent with speed,
it will be necessary to provide for
the weights by giving the ships more
length than the Iowa class, and they
will be almost 440 feet long. The
secondary batteries will be made up
largely of 14-pounders.Beautiful Young Lady Suicides.
Chicago, April 30.—Standing before
a mirror in her room at the Palmer
house, Minnie M. Wray, a beautiful
young woman, pressed a revolver to
her temple and sent a bullet crashing
through her brain. It is not known
what caused the act. Scraps of a torn
letter were found in the waste basket.America and the Porte.
Constantinople, April 30.—There are
no fresh developments regarding the
American indemnity question. If with-
in a week the porte does not answer
the United States legation note of
April 27, it is probable that the Ameri-
can charge d'affaires will renew the
demand.Killed by a Boiler Explosion.
Tipton, O., April 30.—Five men
were killed and three injured by a
boiler explosion in a mill. The dead
are: Luther Clair, Hugh Chambers,
Gus Nicholson, Jack Castle and Will
Houston (colored).After Two Years of Fighting.
San Francisco, April 30.—The first
battalion of the Fourteenth infantry
has landed at the Presidio, after two
years almost continuous fighting in the
Philippines.Japanese Battleship Ashore.
Portsmouth, April 30.—The Japanese
battleship Asahi is ashore off South
sea. Tugs have failed to move the
vessel and her position is liable to be-
