Against the War, For the Soldiers. And so I think my friend the judge, is equally at fault when he charges me at the time I was in congress of having opposed our soldiers who were fighting in the Mexican war.

No man was ever created good enough to own another. The Scourge of War. Fondly do we hope, fervently do we pray, that this mighty scourge of war may speedily pass away.

The chief magistrate derives all his authority from the people, and they have conferred none upon him to fix the term for the separation of the states. The people themselves can do this also if they choose, by the exercise of a simple and rightful right as God gives us to see the right, let us strive to finish the work we are in; to bind up the nation's wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow and his orphan, to see that justice is done to all men, to see that the nation is united and at peace with all nations.

Supporting the Constitution. What do you understand by supporting the constitution of a state or of the United States? Is it not to give such constitutional help to the rights established by that constitution as may be practically needed? Can you, if you swear to support the constitution and believe that the constitution establishes a right, resist your oath, without giving it your support? Do you support the constitution, if knowing or believing there is a right established under it which needs specific legislation, you withhold that legislation? Do you not violate and disregard your oath? I can conceive of nothing plainer in the world.

Test of the Truth of Doctrine. It is the true test of the soundness of a doctrine to apply it to the facts of the world. Do you think it is? Is that the way to test the truth of any doctrine?

Surrender their Liberties. Jefferson said that "judges are as honest as other men and not more so." And he said, substantially, that "whenever a few people should give up in absolute submission to any department of government, retain the right for themselves to appeal from it, their liberties were gone."

The Doctrine of Suppression. It is the true test of the soundness of a doctrine to apply it to the facts of the world. Do you think it is? Is that the way to test the truth of any doctrine?

On War With Mexico. Let the President answer the interrogatories I proposed, as before mentioned, or some other similar ones. Let him answer fully, fairly, and candidly. Let him answer the facts, and not with arguments. Let him remember he sits where Washington sat, and that he is representing a nation, not a man.

The Arguments of Kings. These arguments that are made, that the inferior race are to be treated with as much allowance as they are capable of enjoying; that as much is to be done for them as their condition will allow—what are these arguments? They are the arguments that kings have made for enslaving the people in all ages of the world. You will find that all the arguments in favor of kingship were of this class; they were bestrode the necks of slaves, and they were better off for being ridden.

Lincoln's Proverbs. Do not worry. Eat three square meals a day. Say your prayers. Think of your wife. Be courteous to your creditors. Steer clear of billiards. Exercise. Go slow and easy. Keep your digestion good. Maybe there are other things that your special case requires to make you happy, but, my friend, these, I reckon, will give you a lift.

A Pertinent Warning. In my present position I could scarcely be justified were I to omit raising a warning voice against this approach of returning despotism. It is the effort to place capital on an equal footing with, if not above, labor, in the structure of government. Labor is to be independent of capital. Capital is to be independent of labor and could never have existed if labor had not first existed. Labor is the superior of capital and deserves much the higher consideration.

For the Constitution. It was in the oath I took that I would, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect, and defend the constitution of the United States. Nor was it my view that I might take an oath to get power, and break the oath in my next power. I did understand that my oath imposed upon me the duty of preserving to the best of my ability, by every indispensable means, that government, the nation, of which the constitution was the organic law.

Lincoln and Freedom. Our reliance is in the love of liberty which God has planted in us; our defense is in the spirit which prizes liberty as the heritage of all men in all lands, everywhere. Those who deny freedom to others, deserve it not for themselves, and, under a just God, can not long retain it.

Sovereign of a Free People. A majority held in constraint by constitutional checks and limitations, and always changing easily with deliberate changes of popular opinion and sentiment, is the only true sovereign of a free people. Whoever rejects it does, of necessity, fly to anarchy or despotism.

Lincoln on Despotism. No man is good enough to govern another man without that other's consent. When the white man governs himself that is self-government; but when he governs himself and also governs another man, that is more than self-government—that is despotism.

The Man and the Dollar. When I am asked a question between a man and a dollar, I am on the side of the man every time.

The People. The people themselves, and not their servants, can safely reverse their own deliberate decisions.

Gold and Men. Gold is good in its place, but living, brave, patriotic men are better than gold.

Freedom Rather than Slavery. So I say in relation to the principle that all men are created equal, let it be as nearly reached as we can. If we can get freedom to every creature, let us do nothing that will impose slavery upon any other creature. Let us turn this government back into the channel in which the framers of the constitution originally placed it.

All Men are Created Equal. Let us discard all this quibbling about this man and the other man—this race and that race and the other race, being inferior, and therefore they must be placed in an inferior position, discarding our standard that we have left us; let us discard all these things and unite as one people throughout this land until we shall once more stand as declared that all men are created equal, and that we are created equal.

Let us create Liberty, Happiness. I have said that I do not understand the declaration to mean that all men were created equal in all respects. They are not our equal in color; but I suppose

assuming that the whole labor of our community exists within that relation. No men living are more worthy to be trusted than those who toil up from poverty—none less inclined to the touch of aught which they have not honestly earned. Let them beware of surrendering a political power which they already possess, and which, if surrendered, will surely be used to close the door of advancement against such as they, and to fix new disabilities and burdens upon the till all liberty shall be lost.

President Lincoln to His Friend Ekkins in Illinois in 1864. "Yes, we may congratulate ourselves that this cruel war is nearing its close. It has cost a vast amount of treasure and blood. The best blood of the flower of the American youth has been freely shed for our country, and it has been indeed a trying hour for the republic; but I see in the near future a crisis approaching that unnerves me and causes me to tremble for the safety of my country."

As a result of war, corporations have been wrung from our country, and corruption in high places will follow and the money power of the country will endeavor to prolong its reign by working upon the prejudices of the people until all wealth is aggregated in a few hands and the republic is destroyed.

I feel at this moment more anxiety for the safety of my country than ever before, even in the midst of war. God grant that my suspicion may prove groundless."

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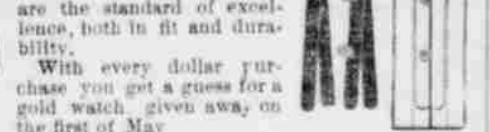

The New York World declares that with the audacity which history shows us is characteristic of weak men who drift, President McKinley is surrendering constitutional government, betraying the basic principles of the republic, making a mockery of its most sacred traditions and professions. With hesitating yet fatal steps he is advancing, not along the road of commercial expansion and aggrandizement of the power and influence of the republic, but along that blood-stained, corpse-strewn highway of war and ever more war, of grinding taxation and tyranny and slaughter and sorrow.

The Captain Carter scandal is at last ended, by the doors of the penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, closing behind this thief in a high place. The newspapers brought deserved punishment upon this man, in spite of the influence of his powerful political friends, some of whom were more or less as guilty as he. The man would never have gone to prison had it not been for the newspapers, as when they took up the fight even the president of the United States was being influenced to shield him, and already the department of justice had been "worked" in his behalf. In this country every man is supposed to be equal before the law, but this is only true in theory because of the fact that those in high places who are entrusted by the people to see that justice is done are prone to allow their sympathies and acquaintanceship to avert them from the path of duty.

Matthew Stanley Quay will make another desperate attempt to break into the United States senate. The Pennsylvania machine, of which he is the boss, is to take up the fight in his behalf. A hue and cry is already being raised in Washington by Quay's friends over the defections among senators who had been confidently counted to vote for Quay.

Remember once being much amused at seeing two partially intoxicated men engaged in a fight with their great coats on, which fight after a long and rather harmless contest, ended in each having fought himself out of his own coat and into that of the other. If the two leading parties of this day are really identical with the two in the days of Jefferson and Adams, they have performed the same feat as the two drunken men.

But, soberly, it is now no child's play to save the principles of Jefferson from total overthrow in this nation. This is a world of compensations; and he who would be no slave must consent to have no slaves. Those who deny freedom to others, deserve it not for themselves, and, under a just God, cannot long retain it.

All honor to Jefferson; to a man who in the concrete pressure of a struggle for national independence by a single people, had the coolness, forecast, and capacity to introduce into a merely revolutionary document an abstract truth applicable to all men and all times, and so to entwine it there, that today and all coming days it shall be a rebuke and a stumbling block to the harbingers of repining tyranny and oppression.

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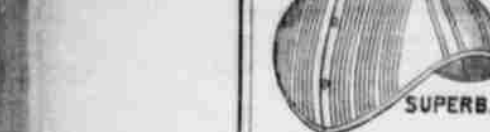
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
