GENERAL NEWS.

A bridge in course of construction at
Paris, France, fell and killed nine
people who were passing under it.William J. Bryan visited Chicago
Sunday and remained there twelve
hours without the newspapers discover-
ing it.General Allen Rutherford, clerk of
the Maryland court of appeals, died
in Washington city of consumption,
aged 60 years.Mrs. M. I. Wardell Clay, the di-
vorcee wife of Hon. Cassius M. Clay,
age of Whitehall, died at Frankfort,
Kentucky, 80 years old. She was the
mother of Brutus J. Clay.There is one way, and apparently
only one, in which Matthew Stanley
Quay can get back into the United
States senate. This is through the
resignation of his friend Senator Pen-
rose. It is rumored that Penrose will
make this sacrifice for Quay's sake.Governor Pingree, of Michigan, sta-
tes publicly that the hope of the
people in this year's general elections
is in the democratic party. The gov-
ernor has always hitherto been an in-
dependent republican. Speaking of the
increasing power of trusts, Governor
Pingree said: "There is no use in
hoping that the republican party will
do anything with them."Wednesday, May 2, the great inter-
national council of the Methodist Epis-
copal church, commonly known as the
general conference, will begin its
twenty-third annual session in
Chicago. It will be composed of about
700 delegates from all the states and
territories of the United States and
from Mexico, South America, Japan,
China, Philippine Islands, India,
Italy, Africa and Germany.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The first steamer for Nome, Alaska,
leaves Seattle today.J. H. Putnam, of Wheeler county,
has recently sold 20 head of draft
horses in Portland at prices ranging
from \$200 to \$300.Martha Moody, an aged Nez Perce
squaw, lost three fingers of her left
hand by falling under a moving train
on the bridge at Alasakha near Oro
Fino, Idaho.W. W. Hoyle, a carpenter and
builder of The Dalles, has filed a
petition in bankruptcy in the United
States court in Portland. His liabilities
amount to \$2915.50 and his assets to
\$425.B. D. Crocker announces that he had
sold the Daily Union and Weekly
Union-Journal and would retire from
the management. J. Howard Watson
has taken charge of the paper and will
conduct it in the future.Work on the Central Navigation and
Construction Co.'s line is progressing.
The road around the obstructions in
the Columbia river at Celilo will soon
be finished. The line is expected to
be ready for business by July 4.George Mapes is gathering his
cattle near Plush, Lake county, to take
them south. He will take about 1200
head. He has wagons arranged like
hay racks upon which to haul the
calves that are not able to make the
trip on foot.The shingle trust, composed of nearly
300 shingle mills in western Wash-
ington, has been broken by the refusal
of the big mills to continue shut down.
All mills will accordingly resume
business at once. Prices have slumped
10 to 15 per cent per 1000.Thomas McKay, proprietor of the
woolen mills at Salem, died at St.
Vincent's hospital, Portland, Friday
night, aged 63 years. On the 12th inst.
a surgical operation was performed and
from that time he steadily grew

ALLEN IS NOW GOVERNOR

Executive Head of Puerto Rico Inducted
Into Office.

TEXT OF HIS INAUGURAL ADDRESS

First Step in the Establishment of Civil Gov-
ernment Under the Flag of the
United States.San Juan de Puerto Rico, May 1.—
The inauguration of Chas. H. Allen,
as American civil governor of Puerto
Rico, took place today. The ceremony
was most impressive. In his inaugural
address Governor Allen said:"At this impressive ceremony I
bring to you—the inhabitants of the
ever faithful Island of Puerto Rico—the
congratulations and good wishes of
the people of the United States."Imposing as the occasion is in it-
self, and reaching as its effect may
be upon the future of your beautiful
island, it is especially significant be-
cause it marks the first step in the es-
tablishment here of civil government
under the flag of the United States of
America, and with the blessings and
opportunities that go with it."A new page has been turned in the
volume of your history and a new era
inaugurated in the development of
your island. Whether it shall turn out
well or ill now depends largely upon
yourselves. The greatest constitution
makers can only lay the foundation.The building of the superstructure,
whether or not it shall be stately,
beautiful and enduring—must rest
upon the industry and wisdom of the
people themselves."The governmental plan presented
in act of congress is only the founda-
tion. To your care it is committed,
and you today assume a great trust.
No greater work ever confronted a peo-
ple than that of building their own
fortunes. It will stimulate you also
to bear in mind that a great nation of
seventy millions of people across the
water, yet close at hand in community
of thought and interest, is watching
your every effort, ready to help you
and to assist you to help yourselves."Fellow-citizens of Puerto Rico—
for, as I have taken the oath of office
here today, so from this time I become
one of you in my endeavor to work
with you and for you in all that tends
to the true interests of the island—I
bring this message from the president,
and I place myself in full accord with
it, that it is his intention to give to
you, so far as all officers are concerned,
several select men from your own num-
bers or from the United States, men
of character and standing, who are en-
thusiastic and diligent and industri-
ous—men of high sense of honor, who
will not seek to advance their own
fortunes at your expense, and who will
aid others to do so; men who will
see that justice and straightfor-
ward honesty will be meted out to all,
and who will have a sole regard for the
welfare of Puerto Rico and the honor
of the American government in its re-
lations to it."If in working out the provisions of
the act of congress which enables you
to participate in the government and
to provide your own legislative as-
sembly you are actuated by the same
purpose to elect men who are devoted
to the general interests of the island
and the people of Puerto Rico, we may
confidently expect that, standing to-
gether, we shall make this island,
so richly blessed by a Divine
Providence in its wonderful natural
resources, not only another gem of the
Antilles in respect to natural beauty,
but an example of what an industrious
and honest people may accomplish
when properly directed by a wise
policy of civil government."I bring you also the assurance that
every man, be he high or low, rich or
poor, under the administration of this
form of government and under the
cooperation of the United States,
shall be justly treated, and that his
rights shall be respected."Henceforth we are under one flag.
We are under the same institutions of
freedom, equality and education.
Together we move on in the great
American current of advancing civiliza-
tion, loving our country, and united by
a high sense of honor, devoted to a
common humanity, we take our place
before the world, and invoke on our
progress the blessing of Almighty
God."

CONGRESSIONAL NEWS.

Nicaraguan Bill Taken Up in the House.
Alaskan Bill Passed.Washington, May 1.—The Nicaraguan
bill was taken up in the house today.
Hepburn made the opening argument

Washington, May 1.—The senate has
passed the Alaskan code bill. After

took up the army appropriation bill.The Boer Delegation.
Washington, May 1.—It can be
stated that the persons composing the
Boer delegation who are about to sail
from Europe for the United States this
week will not be denied access to the
secretary of state when they reach
Washington. They will be received as
individuals just as was Montague
White, but with a distinct understand-
ing that they are not recognized
officially as a Boer delegation.Amending the Puerto Rican Act.
Washington, May 1.—The conference
on the joint resolution amending the
Puerto Rican act reached a complete
agreement after a second session. The
original senate resolution extending
the tenure of military officers in
Puerto Rico until their successors are
appointed is retained intact. The sec-
tions added by the house relating to
corporations are considerably changed
and in their final form provide that
all railroad, street railway, telegraphand telephone franchises, privileges or
concessions granted under section 32
of said act shall be approved by the
president of the United States before
becoming operative.Kentucky Governorship.
Washington, May 1.—Argument in the
Kentucky governorship case was
begun in the United States supreme
court Monday.

INVITATION TO DEWEY.

Canadians Come to Chicago to Invite
Him to Visit Canada.Chicago, May 1.—A delegation of
Canadians has arrived in Chicago and
presented him with a formal invita-
tion to be present at a reception to
be given in his honor at Hill Terrace,
Port Stanley, Ont., on any day in July
convenient to the admiral. Admiral
Dewey thanked the Canadians very
cordially for the invitation in these
words:"Of all the evidences of good will
shown me since my arrival in New
York last October," said he, "none
has touched me more deeply than
this. We are of the same blood.
There is but slight difference between us
and I want to say that the one man
who stood at my back during those
trying days at Manila was an English-
man. But for his support and moral
courage that he inspired me with, I
don't know what would have happened.
I refer to Sir Charles Seymour.The admiral could not say whether
or not he would accept the invitation.

DEWEY AT CHICAGO

Large Crowds Give the Admiral a Cordial
Reception.Chicago, May 1.—The people of
Chicago and the western states saw
and cheered Admiral Dewey at the
head of a military and civic parade
through the business streets of the
city. From the grand stand on Jack-
son boulevard the admiral reviewed
the parade, in which nearly a hundred
different organizations participated.
Everywhere the admiral was greeted
cordially by a densely packed throng.
After the parade had passed Dewey
was escorted to the Union League Club,
where a luncheon and reception was
given.

The Puerto Rico Law.

Washington, May 1.—The customs
feature of the Puerto Rico tariff and
government bill went into operation
today.The war department has been in
receipt of many inquiries from per-
sons in different sections of the country
calling attention to the apparent dis-
crepancy in the Puerto Rico act.
The conclusion arrived at applies to
all of the affairs of the island, and the
war department retained complete con-
trol and direction there until today.

New York, May 1.—At the Hercules
Athletic club last night Bob Fitzsim-

Fitzsimmons showed that his wonderful
hitting powers have not forsaken him
and was as lively on his feet as ever.
The bout was booked to go 25 rounds.

Sheldon Sails for Europe.

New York, May 1.—Rev. Charles M.
Sheldon, who recently edited the
"Topeka Capital" for one week, sailed
for England today. He will devote
two months to speaking and organizing
the movement of practical Christianity
in that country and will then return
to the United States, where he will
establish headquarters in some eastern
city and continue the work of
speaking and organizing in every state
in the union.

The Rent Monopoly.

Chicago, May 1.—Rents were ad-
vanced 15 per cent today by a combina-
tion of landlords which was recently
formed. Their agreement is said to
be the outcome of a supposed political
meeting "for landlords," which was
held recently. The meeting was at-
tended by many property owners, who
decided that a systematic raise in
rents was the only way in which they
could obtain recompense for what they
consider unusually high taxes this year.

Sheep-Shearing Festival.

Lafayette, Ind., May 1.—A sheep-
shearing festival is being held today,
under the auspices of Purdue uni-
versity, on the College Farm. The
purpose of this festival is to give ex-
hibitions of shearing, both with shears
and shearing machines and sheep-
dipping. Prizes have been offered to
amateur shearers over twenty-one
years of age, and also to boys under
twenty-one years.

A Bride With a Million.

Greenwich, Conn., May 1.—Miss
Helen Ripley Benedict, daughter of E.
C. Benedict, was married here to
Thomas Hastings of New York. The
ceremony was the most remarkable
in point of display that has ever been
recorded in New York. The bride's
gift from her father was a check for
\$1,000,000.

Corrigan Arrives at Rome.

Rome, May 1.—Archbishop Corrigan
arrived today to pay his usual ten
years' visit to the Pope. The arch-
bishop will present his official report
to the pope, and will accompany it
with an album containing photographs
of all the principal churches, chapels,
and religious buildings erected during
the past ten years.

American Trotting Congress.

Chicago, May 1.—The sixth biennial
congress of the American Trotting As-
sociation met at the Auditorium hotel
today. Officers of the association will
be elected. The board of appeals of the
association met at the same time.

Lee Commands Two Departments.

Havana, May 1.—The change where-
by the departments of Havana and
Pinar del Rio, Cuba, will in the
future be under the command of Gen.
Fitzhugh Lee, with headquarters at
Quemados, went into effect today.

To Practice Law.

New York, May 1.—Senator Lind-
say of Kentucky today entered upon
the practice of law here, as a member
of the firm of Lindsay, Kremer, Kalish
& Palmer.

broke on fire since Saturday. Four
miners perished.

FIGHTING AT THABANCHU

Boers Remarkably Aggressive, But Run-
dle Holds His Position.

MAPEKING CONTINUES TO HOLD OUT

Fever Rife in the City—Boers Busy Blowing
Up the Railway to the South.
Casualties at Hautey.London, May 1.—The following has
been received from Lord Roberts:
"Bloemfontein, April 30.—The
Boers made persistent attacks around
Thabanchu Saturday and Sunday, but
the position which Randle's division
holds is strong and he had the assist-
ance of Gordon's and Dickson's
brigades, the cavalry under French and
Smith Doreen's infantry."Roberts also reports additional
casualties during the fighting of April
27 around Thabanchu, consisting of
Lieutenant Geary and two men killed,
one officer and three men wounded.
Dispatches throw no light upon the
plans being adopted to oust the Boers
from the neighborhood of Thabanchu.
In the meantime the Boers are re-
markably aggressive, probably in view
of the large forces opposing them.

Boths Opposes Hamilton.

London, May 1.—The following has
been received from Lord Roberts:
"Bloemfontein, April 30.—Jan Hamilton
marched yesterday in a northerly direc-
tion from Thabanchu. At Hautey he
was opposed by a strong force, com-
manded by Gen. Buller. Reinforcements
reached his force during the day.
Hamilton's casualties yesterday were
about 30. Maxwell's brigade of the
seventh division yesterday occupied
Vlaaksfontein and Schwaaskraal without
opposition.

Conditions at Mafeking.

London, May 1.—A dispatch from
Mafeking, dated April 30, says: The
Boers have been busy several days
blowing up the railway southward.
The town will hold out for another
month. Fever is rife but otherwise the
health of the garrison is good.

Boers Are Active.

London, May 1.—The Boers are now
showing uncommon activity west of
Bloemfontein. They are in force be-
tween Fourteen Streams and Kimber-
ley. On Sunday they occupied Wind-
erton, west of the railway and now
threaten to interrupt communication of
the British force at Warrenton to the
north. This, too, at a time when Gen-
eral Buller is about to start on a 200-
mile march for Mafeking, probably
with 5000 men.To the east of Bloemfontein the
Boers on Sunday night were still hold-
ing the hills near Thabanchu, while be-
hind them long wagon trains, loaded
with wheat for the Boer army in the
north are moving through Ladybrand.The British captured a Boer convoy
Saturday but its size is not mentioned.
Wepener is deserted, General Buller
and Colonel Dalgely having moved
northward.According to information from
Maseru, the main body of the Boers
reached Leeuw river, due west of
Ladybrand, Sunday.African horse sickness has broken
out in General Buller's army. Bloem-
fontein correspondents point out that
deficiencies in the veterinary depart-
ment cause thousands of losses.The morning papers give special
prominence to the statement of the
news agency that Sir Redvers Buller
sent his resignation to Lord Roberts
after the Spionkop centures were pub-
lished and that Lord Roberts declined
to accept it.
