TUTULLA REFLECTIONS.

Echoes from the Irish Duke's Encampment come from the South Suburb. Tutulla, May 1.—The latest dispatches from North Tutulla intimate that that place has at last succeeded in securing an attraction after that suburb's own heart. "The Irish Duke" being played to a crowded house on Tuesday night. The editors were un-animously present, but their emotional natures were so affected by the brilliance these co-workers of Irving, Terry, Mansfield, Jefferson, Langtry, etc., they were obliged to seek the open air to give vent to their feelings while the second act was yet in progress.

The New York World, a paper with a large and growing reputation for brilliant ability for erecting towering pyramids of fiction on very slight basis of fact, wishing to point a moral against America's entering on a colonial policy, cites the present famine in India as an example of England's failure along this same line. The Portland Oregonian calls attention to another side of the matter, which the World and its disciples through the country strangely overlook, and that is there were famines in India and much more destructive ones than they present long before England ever went there. Several years ago, when another famine was raging out there, the Cosmopolitan magazine sent an American commissioner, Julian Hawthorne, to investigate the causes, attribute the blame, and incidentally put England in as bad a hole as possible. The commissioner arrived in India, and with every facility for thorough investigation at his disposal, including the testimony of the natives themselves, reached the following conclusion, that, while the relief measures under English government were inadequate, they at least furnished means for a large number to keep soul and body together and tide over the emergency; while, in former years, under native government, the Rajahs and native rulers looked up their noses and the multitudes that starved without any relief whatever. Mr. Hawthorne discovered another fact which may be interesting in this connection, that the people of India, or the Fellahs of Egypt, under English rule, if he considers himself aggrieved by his landlord or other official, can carry his case into the courts and win it, something which in the wildest flight of his imagination he never dreamt of doing under native rule.

Up at Colfax, a warehouseman named Clifford had been tried for stealing some barley which a farmer had stored in his warehouse. The farmer was two carloads of barley short and Mr. Clifford said two carloads of good barley at the same time. He explained to the jury that every "properly conducted" warehouse gives such weights to the owner as allows itself a margin. WYOMING LAWS FORNIST TRAILING.

E. Boettcher Says Sheep Must Be Shipped East. E. Boettcher arrived from Chicago Sunday night. He said to the East Oregonian in talking concerning the sheep market in Chicago, that prices have ruled strong during the entire past winter and spring. For a week past the market has been slightly off, the drop being from 20 to 25 cents a head. Prices remain strong, however, and fat mutton sheep are good stuff to sell.

According to Mr. Boettcher, the year 1900 will mark the beginning of a new epoch in the sheep industry of this region. Heretofore, vast numbers of sheep have been purchased in Eastern Oregon and Washington, have been driven east, and disposed of in the fall. This business of trailing sheep was followed recently by a large number of men, who drove across this state and the other intervening states of Idaho and Wyoming to Colorado and Nebraska, sometimes shipping a portion of the distance, but always driving on this end of the route. For twenty years this has been the custom.

"The trailing of sheep is the custom," said Mr. Boettcher, "and henceforth they must be transported by rail to the east, and the trailer go out of business. There are two causes contributing to this result, one of which is the leasing of immense quantities of range lands in the state of Wyoming, which are now mostly in the control of large corporations. The lands leased from the government passed into the control of these companies, and apparently the leasing was manipulated in such a manner as to control the avenues of ingress into the state, at the very borders of the state one is confronted with the holders of leases from the government under the desert land act, and then is further handicapped by the passage of such quarantine laws by this state as to control the ingress of sheep across that state. One may ship across the state, but not into the state for stopping there, except under the strictest quarantine regulations, which operate practically to prevent in the future, any sheep being driven into the state. This leaves the only border quarantine laws in the state of Wyoming have erected a barrier, practically impassible, hence the trailing of sheep must stop."

Mr. Boettcher has himself, for many years, trailed sheep to the east, but in anticipation of the conditions now existing, a season or two ago he gave up trailing, and now handles sheep like any other Oregon sheep man. He has large sheep interests here, together with his son, Otto Boettcher, who is personally in charge of the business. Mr. Boettcher expects to remain in Pendleton no longer than two weeks. It has formerly been his custom to remain here the entire season, but, unless something transpire to alter his plans, he will return home to Chicago sometime during May. Mr. Boettcher is currently quartered at the Hotel Pendleton, which has been his home now for many years during the summer season, and he will be in Pendleton for a greater portion of the time he spends in Oregon.

The Building Boom is Now on and Many People Coming in. The Lawton Standard furnishes the East Oregonian with the following items:

With the advent of pleasant weather Lawton is forging ahead with her building boom and a scene of great activity reigns everywhere throughout the city. Mechanics of all kinds may be seen plying their different vocations as if their very lives depended on completing that particular job in a given length of time.

A. D. Stillman, democratic candidate for circuit judge of the sixth district, is a native Oregonian, and was born at Robinsonville, this county.

The "Yankee" of Lawton will soon organize a baseball team to compete for the championship of Eastern Oregon. We have material here for a crack team, the greater portion being old knights of the diamond.

J. H. Robbins and Roy Miller came over from Sampson today to inspect their mining interests in this district. Mr. Robbins is one of the principal owners of the famous Concord property.

James A. Howard, secretary of the Lawton townsite company, has sold to W. E. Hurd, the Hobson fractional quartz mining claim. This fraction joins the Clelan, the property of Mr. Hurd, on the east.

Ed C. Allen and E. Malcolm, of Pendleton, who arrived in the city last Friday evening, started on their return home Monday. While here Mr. Allen invested in a corner lot on Spokane avenue, and as soon as suitable arrangements can be made will begin the construction of a large business house on his purchase. He is seriously considering the proposition of embarking in the butcher business here. A representative of the Standard, in company with Ed C. Allen, of Pendleton, visited the great Cougar mine two miles north of Lawton Sunday and was amply repaid for the trip. The Cougar is one of the best paying properties in the district—just about rich nobody but the owners seem to know, and they refuse to give out the desired information, but it is safe to say from samples seen that the parties most interested are in little danger for the present of becoming public chaff.

J. W. Larkin, one of the principal owners and superintendent of the property hospitably entertained the visitors as only a miner can perform these offices, but lack of time prevented a trip through the mine and plant.

The mill is a cyanide of 250 tons capacity, almost new, having been erected about a year ago, and is driven by a 150 horse-power Corliss engine. Mr. C. J. Carlson, of Pendleton, has charge of the motive power.

enthusiastic over the climate and scenery of Camas valley, and in his descriptions, tells in an interesting manner the varied charms of one of the most favored localities in Oregon. Camas Prairie boasts of natural scenery, enhanced and never marred by the comfortable homes and thrifty farms and busy dairies of the prosperous people living there, are a subject which draws from Mr. Wolverson a eulogy most fervid.

"People living here are not fully appreciative of the beautiful region in which are their homes. And the people here in Pendleton and in other nearby places certainly do not know how favored a spot can be found out there in Camas valley. There, one experiences all the freshness of a mountain altitude, with the sunny brightness of cloudless skies. The air is invigorating and would play havoc with any lurking disease germs that ever invaded a human body. One feels the strength of youth as the breeze blows fresh from the mountains surrounding. And life takes on a new aspect to the one going there from any other region.

"Does one want variety of climate, he may remain in the sheltered valley where now he will be safe from the suggestion of roughness of wind or temperature, enjoying a summer almost ideal. Or, he can go out upon mountains and perhaps find a feeling yet vigorous winter, come belated and yet none the less a winter.

"If one can find anywhere a more beautiful carpet of green than that with which nature covers the Camas Valley at this time, I hope he will tell me, that I may go and search it out. Mile after mile it extends, from hill to hill. The prospect before the observer from any of the hillsides is unrivalled in any country in which I have been.

"I have traveled far and wide and been in many places, but have found no spot more beautiful. Were I asked to name it, I would call Camas valley the 'Italy of Oregon,' and think the name well chosen."

Mr. and Mrs. Wolverson have been throughout the west, and have very much enjoyed their visit at Ukiah, as may be judged from Mr. Wolverson's enthusiastic description of that locality.
