INDIAN AGENT WILL CO-OPERATE.

Says Will Lend Assistance in Caring for

Menny Horses.

Charles Wilkins, agent at the Umatilla Indian reservation, was in town today, and stated that any efforts made through the intervention of Governor

to prevent the spread of the mumps disease among the horses of the reservation must meet with his hearty approval. He said that it had been

established by rulings in Washington, that the state authorities could not go upon the reservation and kill

diseased animals, and that orders to that effect were on file in his office at the agency. If, however, the matter is taken up, and satisfactorily adjusted, Mr. Wilkins also stated that there were not nearly so many diseased horses on the reservation as there were formerly. This is due, in a large measure, to the care exercised by the Indians, and their industry in applying curative means in the cases of their diseased horses. Many of the Indians have systematically pursued such a course, and have kept at it until their hands are practically free. There are, however, upon the reservation, quite a number of many horses, and, of course, these are a menace to the property of other horsemen.

It is hoped that the request of Governor Geer may not be overlooked in Washington, but that the Oregon congressional delegation will take up the matter and see that the department of the interior will take such action as will obviate further conflict between state and federal authorities. The need of attending to many horses is recognized by all, and it is believed that great injustice will have been done to owners of horses off the reservation if the disease on the reservation go unchecked. It is practically impossible to prevent the occasional mingling of the reservation range animals and those running on other ranges. If diseased reservation horses are found off the reserve, they may be killed.

The agency authority to kill diseased reservation horses, however, is already officially renounced and has been made the subject of representations from the department to that effect.

WHERE ARE THE SQUIRRELS?

Sale of Poison is Now Only Twenty Per

Cent of Former Years.

Messrs. Tallman & Co., Messrs.

Brock & McComas and Ula Slate,

druggists, were interviewed by the

East Oregonian and asked regarding

the sale of poison for killing squirrels.

Their replies to the questions asked in-

dicate that ground squirrels are not

much in evidence compared with years

ago. The years 1899 and 1900 have

been somewhat alike in that in neither

have any large quantities of poison

been sold.

All the druggists of Pendleton state

that during the last two seasons not

over twenty per cent of the squirrel

poison has been sold that was sold in

previous years. Inquiry among the

farmers establishes the fact that squir-

rels are doing practically no damage to

the grain this year, and in some sec-

tions they are almost completely ex-

terminated.

The question is being discussed here

as to whether or not some contagious

disease has appeared among the ground

squirrels, causing them to die in enor-

mous numbers, and leaving compara-

tively few in this section. In the

year 1897, and for several seasons

previous to that, squirrels did an enor-

mous amount of damage in all the

counties of Eastern Oregon, especially

in Umatilla and Morrow. Very large

amounts of poison were purchased by

the farmers, and the poisoning of
