TOUGH TRY TO TAKE UNATILLA.

Leader, Ed. Clayton, is now in the County Jail.

A gang of toughs, with one Ed Clayton as the leader, took possession of the town of Unatilla at about 10 o'clock Tuesday night.

Clayton is a man of nerve, and proved it during the melee on Tuesday night.

With a 45-50 Winchester rifle pointed at his breast, the holder of the rifle standing a few feet only away.

Clayton sprang forward and tried to cut the rifle from the hand of the man.

Clayton, who asked in the jail, his name, replied promptly "Ed Clayton," and, when asked from where he came, replied rather scornfully, "Mexico."

A number of men who travel in a leisurely manner from place to place appeared in Unatilla during the evening, and, after surveying the situation and sizing up the town as somewhat slow, announced that they would run it for a small space of time.

They produced several rifles and procured some rocks and made a general attack. In trying to take the Coudon hotel, stones were thrown. One struck John Shockey, the O. R. & N. telegraph operator, on the arm and inflicted some injury.

The leader, Clayton, had charged one of the railroad men living there. The latter got a Winchester of 45-50 calibre and went after Clayton. It was when he found Clayton that the latter exhibited the unusual nerve.

Finally, and it was only a short time after the affair began, the men of Unatilla got their guns and were about to sweep down on the gang of toughs who had assumed title to the town.

Some blood would have flowed had not the cooler heads advised peaceful methods. These were resorted to, and the leader landed in the county jail here by James Means.

A GOLD SCORE.

The Export tide of Yellow Metal Fright-

ens the Gold Hoarders.

Washington, May 2.—Alarming state-

ments to the effect that the recent flow

of gold to Europe will be followed by

a steadily increasing export tide as a

sequel of the passage of the new gold

standard law are utterly discredited at

the treasury department.

Advices received by the treasury de-

partment officials go to disprove these

claims, and show that the exportation

of gold is due to England's enormous

and expensive demand for the metal

being made upon this country for sup-

plies to be forwarded to the seat of

action in the Transvaal. No signifi-

cant change whatever is attached to the

reversal of the gold tide.

Financial interests have been some-

what puzzled by the paradoxical ex-

portation of gold because of the econ-

omic trade balance to the credit of

this country from other nations of the

world. But so far the anxiety has

been confined to the memories of the

gold standard, who insist that a heavy

tax upon gold resources would serve as

an impediment to business relations

because this country is now committed to

the use of gold, and that specie may be

demanded as redemption for all securi-

ties and payment of debts.

An official at the treasury depart-

ment says: "It is utterly untrue to at-

tribute further exportation of gold.

It has no relation whatever to the

recently enacted gold standard. It is

due to the fact that England has

been making unusually heavy demands

for money on account of war expenses.

As a matter of fact, I do not antici-

pate any further exportation of gold.

In the place this country has a strong

hold upon the balance of trade and

the gold product. The enormous out-

put of gold in this country and in

Alaska annually removes all fears as

to the absence of sufficient gold to

transact business. There is no need

of the surplus products of wheat, cotton, steel

and other material, which bring the

balance this way. Indeed, there is

not the slightest cause for apprehen-

sion in business or banking circles be-

cause \$300,000 in gold has been shipped

abroad."
