DEMAND FOR DRAFT ANIMALS.

Seattle Buyer Shows What is Wanted Now on the Coast.

O. H. Holcomb, the Seattle horse buyer, is here again today, taking in the horse parade. Mr. Holcomb is more especially interested in heavy draft animals than in fine racing and road horses, and yet he watched the parade here today with great interest, being much surprised at the remarkable showing.

Mr. Holcomb buys heavy draft animals for shipment to Seattle, where he disposes of many for use there, sending also many to the lumber camps and to Alaska and Cape Nome. He has bought large numbers this year in Unadilla county, in being escorted over the country by Geo. M. Froome of this city.

Mr. Holcomb says the farmers and horsemen of this county are making rapid strides in the right direction. Each year the showing of draft horses is better, until now many are raised which would do credit to centers of horse breeding in the East where the country is much older.

Mr. Holcomb gives the weights of a card of fine draft horses he recently shipped from Iowa to Seattle, which will indicate the character of the animals now in demand on the coast:

One gray horse, 4-year-old, Percheron and Shire crossed, weight, 2185.
One gray horse, 3-year-old, same breeding, weight 2010.
Two Belgians, weighing 3860 to the span, and two same weighing 3653.
One gray, cross of Percheron and Clyde, weight, 1760.
One brown, Percheron and Belgium cross, weight 1810.
Two bays, Shires, weight 3639 to the span.
Two bays, same breeding, weight 3640.
Two bays same breeding weight 3560.
Two gray mares, Percheron, weight 3060.
One brown, Shire, weight 2090.

CLOSE OF SCHOOL.

Events Which Will Mark the End of the Year.

At the close of the school year, the Pendleton public schools will give the opera "Golden Hair," in which the pupils will participate, a number of other singers assisting.

A physical culture entertainment will also be given, probably in the opera house, where the opera will be given. The entertainment will consist of dumbbell exercises, club swinging and other features of calisthenics.

This year no class will graduate. This is due to the plan to add a grade to the curriculum. The highest grade has heretofore been the tenth, but, if the plans are carried out, an eleventh grade will be organized, and the tenth grade class will remain in school another year.

The field day between the Pendleton schools and the Weston normal has been arranged for Saturday, May 19, at the Simpson & Peringer track. The program is to be as follows:
