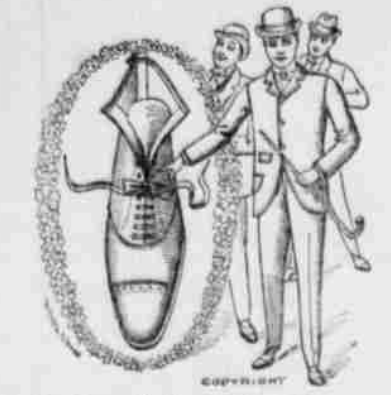

"On the Suwanee River" Monday Night Fisk Jubilee Singers Thursday.

The Fraser opera house offers the following two attractions of the coming week.

Monday night—"On the Suwanee River," a pretty Southern play with many fine musical features and character work.

It is a "home play," that is, one to which our mothers, wives and sisters are invited.

The action of the story is laid near the little village of Suwanee in Florida and hinges on the Clayton family, one of the oldest in the district.

Col. Clayton, an old planter, has given a mortgage on his estate, the day of the mortgage is due.

Col. Clayton and old Caleb Greer, a hard hearted miser, quarrel. The old planter is murdered in the mix-up by the miser, Dora Clayton, the colonel's adopted daughter returns from the north, whither she has been to consult an expert regarding her sight, and the excitement attending the struggle and her father's murder before her very eyes cause the complete loss of her sight. In the struggle the murderer is compelled to strike the colonel's son a blow on the head, leaving him in a comatose or imbecile state. After the murder the assassin manages to make away with the money which was to have discharged the mortgage.

The play then treats of the experiences of the blind girl and the foolish son, who thrown upon the mercies of heartless and designing relatives, fare badly, save for the kindly intervention of an old colored mammy, aided by a young neighboring planter.

Fisk Jubilee Singers. Thursday night—on them read this criticism by Professor E. Krause, Musical Critic of the Hamburger Fremdenblatt, Hamburg, Germany. The greatest point of interest in these concerts rests with the rendering of the slave melodies; the effect was simply overwhelming, not only by their pathos but also by the masterly manner in which they were sung. The crowning effect, however, was produced by the perfect blending and shading of voices. Although the songs contain a number of startling contrasts, yet they were graduated in such a manner as to appear perfectly natural and not exaggerated. The rendering of the plaintive passages was simply exquisite; it is hard to believe that those voices, which appeared to be at a great distance, could be the same voices which only a moment before had rendered the mezzo-forte passages.
