—We read this criticism by Professor E. Krausse, Musical Critic of

interest in these concerts rests with
the rendering of the slave melodies; the effect was simply overwhelming,
not only by their pathos but also by
the masterly manner in which they were sung. The crowning effect, how-
ever, was produced by the perfect
blending and shading of voices. Al-
though the songs contain a number of
startling contrasts, yet they were
graduated in such a manner as to ap-
pear perfectly natural and not ex-
aggerated. The rendering of pianissimo
passages was simply exquisite; it is
hard to believe that these voices, which
appeared to be at a great dis-
tance, could be the same voices which
only a moment before had rendered
