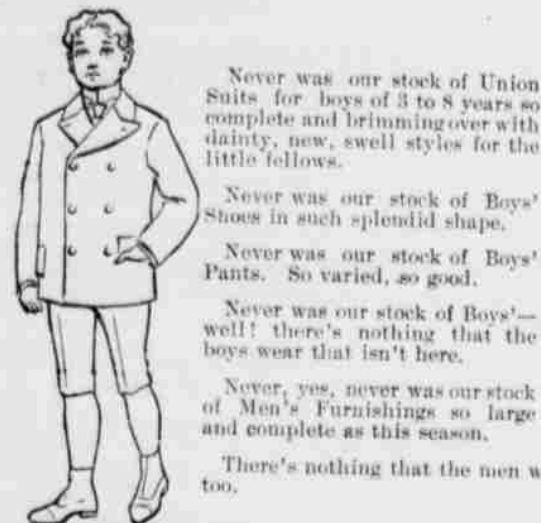

GENERAL NEWS.

In the municipal elections in France
on Sunday the nationalists made sur-
prising gains.The sundry civil bill which passed
the house carries slightly more than
\$61,500,000, about \$10,000,000 more
than any previous sundry civil bill.Ex-Congressman David B. Culbertson,
father of United States Senator C. A.
Culbertson of Texas, died Sunday at his
home at Jefferson, Texas, of a gripe.William Crowinshield Endicott,
aged 73 years, secretary of war during
President Cleveland's first administration,
died at his residence in Boston,
Sunday, of pneumonia.Livermen of Indianapolis have
formed a combination, supported by
the undertakers, to discontinue Sunday
funerals on the ground that they inter-
fere with more lucrative business.Governor Roosevelt has accepted an
invitation to be a guest of honor at
the National convention of republicans
to be held at St. Paul, Minn.,
July 17, 18 and 19. He will probably
make a speech.The Los Angeles Times edited by
Major-General H. Otis, editorially
presents the name of Congressman Wil-
liam F. Hepburn, of Iowa, as a run-
ning mate for William McKinley, on
the republican ticket.The Mallory line steamship pier in
New York was burned Sunday. The loss
was \$1,000,000. A nine year old child
was burned to death, it being left in
the cabin of one of the barges lying at
the pier, several of which were burned.The Knoxville chapter of the Daugh-
ters of the American revolution have
had a large boulder of Tennessee
marble placed on the spot where
Admiral David G. Farragut, who was
born near Knoxville, Tenn., is buried.
It will be dedicated by Admiral Dewey
May 15.Smallpox has broken out at Butler
College at Irvington, near Indianapo-
lis, Indiana. Gertrude Atherton,
Helena Carver, Marie Martin, Geneve
Hall and Catherine Richey have the
disease. Twenty-five students and
other persons exposed have been put
into quarantine.The report of the constitutional con-
ference, which will probably be pre-
sented this week, at Chicago, will call
for the continued maintenance of the
religion of John Wesley. The episco-
pacy may be abandoned and other con-
stitutional features changed, but the
articles of religion, the doctrines of the
church, are to be retained in their
purity.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Richard Rurres, a pioneer resident of
Linn county, died Sunday.J. D. Fuller, a prominent farmer,
living near Jefferson, Linn county,
died Friday night.Beady Burnett and H. Allen, two
Corvallis young men, have been given
clerkships in the census office at Wash-
ington.Henry F. Taylor, colored, has filed
his petition as an Independent Republi-
can candidate for state senator in
Multnomah county.There is a wood famine in Boise
City. Only one firm has a stock on
hand and it has only 115 cords. Boise
is a town of 12,000 people.Over one hundred Japs have arrived
at Boise City to go to work on the
Idaho Midland railroad project, from
Boise to Butte, and 500 more will
arrive soon. Work on the grade will
be commenced.The Trade Dollar Consolidated Min-
ing Company will invest \$250,000 in a
power plant at Swan Falls on Snake
river, for the purpose of generating
power for its mines and mills at Silver
City and to supply other consumers.Sunday, the 2-year-old daughter of
Mr. and Mrs. G. M. Taylor, who lives
on the Coppel, about three miles above
Waitsburg, Wash., was missed from
her usual play ground. Search being
made her dead body was found in the
creek a short distance from the house.
She had fallen in the little creek and
drowned.William Marshall has been pardoned
by Governor Geer for the murder of
James Reed in Baker City, about two
years ago. Marshall is but 18 years of
age and served 20 months in the peni-
tentiary. The pardon was obtained
through the efforts of his lawyer, O.
L. Marshall, and others who believed in

TO ASSASSINATE ROBERTS

A Plot Has Been Discovered and It Is
Under Investigation.

BOERS WILL FIGHT ON ZAND RIVER

Force of Boers Around Mafeking Estimated
at Three Thousand—Bridge Destroyed
and Supplies Delayed.London, May 8.—The Standard bears
that information has been officially re-
ceived of a plot to assassinate Lord
Roberts. Telegrams are now passing
between the Cape authorities, Lord
Roberts and the home authorities on
the subject.Boers to Make a Stand.
Smaldeel, May 8.—According to re-
ports received here the Boers intend to
make a big stand near the Zand river.
The railroad has been repaired to the
south side of the Vet river.Boer Forces Increased.
Lorenzo Marquez, (Sunday).—A dis-
patch received here from Plumer's
camp, under date of April 26, states
the Boers around Mafeking have been
reinforced and their strength is now
estimated at 3000.Why Boers Evacuated Thabanchu.
London, May 8.—The following dis-
patch from Lord Roberts has been re-
ceived: "The Smaldeel railway, from
Brandfort to this place, has been con-
siderably damaged and the bridge over
the Vet river hopelessly damaged. This
delays the supplies coming up. In
spite of these wrecks the British
advance goes on steadily. Lord
Roberts' outposts are about twelve miles
north of Smaldeel. Reconnaissance
made by General Rundle of the Boer po-
sitions at Thabanchu resulted in their
being pronounced impregnable and
their evacuation is reported to be due
to the receipt of an urgent message
from President Steyn.Roberts' Phenomenal Advance.
London, May 8.—A dispatch from
Cape Town says: "Lord Roberts
phenomenal advance is not only utterly
demoralizing to the Boers but is strik-
ing terror to the rebel colonists. The
relief of Mafeking is expected at any
moment."The Boers Retiring.
London, May 8.—The Boers are
everywhere retiring before the British
except on the Natal frontier and at
Mafeking to the inner circle of their
defenses. They appear determined not
to fight until the Kroonstad hills are
reached.Lord Roberts is expected to do an-
other forty or fifty miles and then wait
for a time in order to bring up supplies
and to repair the railways. There are
one or two hints in the dispatches from
the front that he may rest for a few
days at Smaldeel.General French's 10,000 cavalry have
not been mentioned in the dispatches
for four days. It is by no means likely
that he is idle and the conjecture is
that he is either detouring toward
Kroonstad or raiding the Ladybrand
district. Fifteen thousand British are
now operating on the western frontier
of the Free State.As the deadlock at Warrenton has
been broken and the Boers are retreat-
ing there is nothing formidable except
distance between Warrenton and
Mafeking. Most hopeful advices from
Mafeking on April 22 were that the
garrison would be barely able to hold
out for a month. At that time fever
was spreading.According to advices from Maseru,
Basutoland, 7000 Free Staters are north
of Ladybrand, where they have col-
lected great herds. The district is rich
in food for men and horses and the
Boers seem resolved not to move north-
ward, but to be prepared to resist
where they are.Lord Roberts and Lord Kitchener
personally directed the artillery in the
Vet river engagement.Six thousand four hundred and fifty-
eight troops are now at sea on the way
to South Africa. No others are under
orders to go except as needed to fill up
the losses of regiments at the front.

THE CAPTURE OF GARCIA.

General MacArthur Regards It as Very
Important.Washington, May 8.—The War de-
partment has received from MacArthur
the following cable: "Manila, May 8.—
General Pantaleon Garcia, a promi-
nent insurgent officer, was captured
with valuable documents by General
Funston's troops. I regard the capture
as very important."Rebels Made an Attack.
Manila, May 8.—A force of rebels,
on May 2, attacked twenty men, of
Company I, 44th regiment, at Barotac,
Island of Panay. Three Americans
were killed and seven wounded.Fierce Fight at Barotac.
Manila, May 8.—A band of insur-
gents, estimated at 400 men, surrounded
Barotac and began an attack upon the
American force there on all sides. After
two Americans were killed and four
wounded the American com-
mander sent four men to communicate
with the remainder of the company at
Dumaguas. One of these men was
killed and three were wounded. The
wounded men managed to return to
Barotac. However, the news of the
attack reached Company F, 43d in-
fantry, who at once succored the garri-
son of Barotac on the night of May 3.
The enemy's losses were heavy.The Crew Rescued.
Philadelphia, Pa., May 8.—A dis-
patch received here from New Orleans
reports the arrival of the steamer
El Paso with the second officer and four-
teen of the crew of the steamer Vir-
ginia which went to pieces a few
nights ago on Diamond Shoals, Va., off
Cape Henry.Wheat Markets.
San Francisco, May 8.—Cash wheat
is quoted at 95 1/2.Chicago, May 8.—July wheat is
quoted at 67 1/2, and cash at 72.Blair for Hawaii.
Washington, May 8.—It is under-
stood that the president has practically
decided upon John C. Blair of Wyo-
ming as United States attorney for
Hawaii, and Daniel A. Roy of Illinois
as United States marshal.

FORAKER NOT WANTED.

He Will Not Be Selected to Nominate
McKinley at Philadelphia.Washington, May 8.—Opposition has
developed to the selection of Senator
Joseph B. Foraker of Ohio to deliver
the speech placing President McKinley
in nomination at the Philadelphia con-
vention. His prominence in the Puerto
Rican legislation and the fear of pro-
voking anew the sentiment felt by
many republicans against the island
tariff bill are advanced against his
selection. Senator Chauncey Depew
is being urged by a number of republi-
can leaders to deliver a nominating
speech, and unless pressure is brought
to bear in favor of Senator Foraker,
the eloquent New York statesman will
place President McKinley in nomina-
tion.Senator Foraker delivered the prin-
cipal nominating speech at the St. Louis
convention in 1896, and his selection
again for the same honor is regarded as
unwise in some quarters, especially
in view of the fact that he was the
standard-bearer of the republican
faction which passed the Puerto Rican
bill through the senate. The political
return recently indicates that the
principal source of danger to the re-
publican party is from the Puerto
Rican bill, and therefore it is urged
as a part of political diplomacy and
discretion to allow some other senator
than Foraker to put McKinley in
nomination for the presidency.Depew's selection appeals
favorably to a larger number of re-
publican leaders than does that of
Foraker. Although still in the
juvenile class of the senate, the New
York orator has made a brilliant rep-
utation during this session as a speaker
of eloquence and argumentative re-
sources. Senator Hanna entertains
a great respect for Senator Depew as an
orator, and in view of the splendid
material which would be at his com-
mand in delivering the principal
speech at Philadelphia, no one is re-
garded as better qualified to undertake
the responsibility than Senator Depew.No More Forest Reserves.
Washington, May 8.—Representative
Jones of Washington introduced a bill
in the house providing that no new
forest reservations shall be created and
that additions to existing reserves
shall be made hereafter only by act of
congress.The Canal Bill Up.
Washington, May 8.—The senate
committee on intercommerce canal held
a meeting and discussed the Nicarag-
ua canal bill, which passed the house
last week. No action was taken and the
committee will meet again Wednesday.More Pension Money.
Washington, May 8.—The house
passed the senate bill to amend the
general pension laws so as to provide
for disabilities under the act of 1890
without regard to service, and to in-
crease the net income a widow may
have without destroying her right to a
pension from \$86 to \$250.The purpose of the bill is to modify
the rulings of the pension office in ac-
cordance with the recommendations of
the Grand Army of the Republic.The bill was passed without a dis-
senting voice. A bill to increase the
appropriation for the national guard
from \$400,000 to \$1,000,000 was also
passed.Commissioner Makes Estimate.
New York, May 8.—A Herald special
from Washington says: From \$2,000,
000 to \$3,000,000 a year is the amount
Commissioner Evans roughly esti-
mates will be added to the pension
expenditures of the government by the
passage yesterday of the measure
known as the Grand Army bill.

IRISHMAN VS CHINAMAN.

A Desperate Fight in a Hotel Kitchen at
Lewiston.Lewiston, Idaho, May 8.—A terrible
hand-to-hand fight took place in the
kitchen of the Hotel De France, in this
place between a Chinaman and a
white man named Jack Ryan. As a
result the Chinaman has been uncon-
scious for hours and the white man
will lose the use of one of his arms.There is no certainty that the Chin-
aman will recover, while the physicians
say that Ryan can never regain the
use of his arm. The stroke of the keen
blade used by the Chinaman cut all the
forearm muscles and severed the
artery. It was with difficulty that he
was saved from bleeding to death.
Both men are under arrest.Populists National Convention
Cincinnati, May 8.—Two presiden-
tial candidates are talked of by leading
populists gathered in Cincinnati to-
day for the national convention of the
people of the United States. They are
Ignatius Donnelly of Minnesota and
Wharton Barker of Pennsylvania.Everything is in readiness for the con-
vention to assemble Wednesday after-
noon.Another Island Taken.
Auckland, N. Z., May 8.—Advices
from Samoa received here announce
that the American flag has been hoisted
over the island of Tutuila, amid great
native rejoicing, and chiefs have made
formalcession of the island to the
United States. Inhabitants of Manua
island also request the formal hoisting
of the American flag over that island.A Building Falls.
Kansas City, May 8.—The three-
story brick building at 108 Grand
avenue, in the business center of the
city, collapsed, burying seven persons
in the ruins. John W. Moore, aged
seventy years, formerly mayor of this
city, was most seriously hurt and will
probably die. The building had been
condemned several months ago.Against Union Labor.
Chicago, May 8.—Judge Tuthill has
granted an injunction restraining
the board of county commissioners
from inserting in contracts a clause
stating that only union labor shall be
employed in carrying out the work of
the county when it is to be paid for
with public funds.Knights at Spokane.
Spokane, May 8.—The Dramatic
Order of the Knights of Khorassan is
to have a grand caravan in Spokane on
May 15. This is the time that the
grand lodge of the Knights of Pythias
will hold its meeting. About 75 mem-
bers with grand lodge will ride the
camel on the evening of that day.Tacoma Strike Is Over.
Tacoma, Wash., May 8.—The paint-
ers and carpenters strike here is
now practically over. Nearly all of
the employers granting the demands of
the strikers.

BIG STRIKE AT ST. LOUIS

It Began this Morning, 2600 Men
Quitting Work.

EVERY CAR LINE IN CITY TIED UP

Rioting Already Commenced and Several
Persons Have Been Injured—Six
Postal Cars Tied Up.St. Louis, May 8.—One of the greatest
strikes in the history of St. Louis was
inaugurated here today, when about
2600 employees of the St. Louis Transit
company went out to compel the accept-
ance on the part of the company of
demands, as formulated several days
ago. Practically every car line in St.
Louis is tied up. Frequent riots have
occurred today. John Ketching, a 16-
year-old boy, was shot and seriously
wounded by Conductor George Mc-
Clellan
