Trade does not always "follow the flag" promptly but you can bet your life taxation does, even when there is military rule over the flag lands.

A number of legal voters promise to be disfranchised, for both the state election in June and the presidential in November, by failing to register prior to the fifteenth of the present month. After next Tuesday a voter cannot register, and, failing to do so before that time, he will find himself deprived of the rights of suffrage.

A dispatch a few days ago said that "the American flag floats over Tutuila," which is an island of the Hawaiian group. The flag has floated over Tutuila, in Umatilla county, for many years, which derived its name from Tutuila, of the Pacific, James Daniel, still living in this county, a prominent farmer and stockman, being the man who named the little stream which flows through the hills all the year around a little south of Pendleton.

The regular people's party, assembled in convention at Sioux Falls, nominated W. J. Bryan for president. Bryan has a strong following among the populists and he deserves it, but his nomination by them at Sioux Falls was not expected. It is simply a testimonial of his popularity and greatly increases his chances of election to the presidency in November. The nomination comes in such a way that he is not embarrassed and hampered by it, as he was to some extent in 1896.

Mayor Jones, of Toledo, says he has not as yet decided whom he will support for president. From all appearances he will have five names to select from. Debs, Barker and Swallow have already been nominated and Bryan and McKinley are as good as nominated. Mayor Jones will have every opportunity to deliberate from early in July to early in November, and it is quite probable that he will go to the polls and there show his preference for William J. Bryan, the candidate of the plain people for whom Jones has done some good work.

For the first time in many years the republicans of Nebraska are united. The state convention at Lincoln was harmonious. The hatchet appears to have been buried there by the warring factions, and there are indications that an aggressive and determined struggle will be made to take the state away from Bryan. Funds are not lacking for this purpose, as shown by the election of the rival factional leaders, Senator Thurston and Editor Rosewater, of "The Omaha Bee," as delegates at large to the national convention.

The Portland Telegram says: "Multnomah county is satisfied with Malcolm Moody," as congressman from the second district. By Multnomah county "The Telegram" means the republicans in control of politics in Portland. The fact is, Malcolm Moody is "pledged to Portland" and Joe Simon is the power behind the throne which moulds the Moody mud to his own sweet will. Malcolm Moody, because of Simon and those who Simon represents, "belongs to Portland," bag and breeches, and Eastern Oregon has neither representation in the lower or the upper house of congress. What the Portland Telegram pleases to designate as "Multnomah county" is the controlling force in the republican party and will probably remain so as long as ex-Senator Corbett has galloping, vaulting ambition to shine in politics and wield an in-

fluence with his money that even draws the great-only-paper-of-Portland into the vortex, thereby gaining its support in all things without question, but not without price. When the money the "great only" owes is paid and the "refusing teller" of the First National bank of Portland, who gains his title by a habit of shaking his head at all customers of the institution, has satisfied his political ambition, then, and not until then, will Eastern Oregon have representation at Washington. But the people of Eastern Oregon may decide to have it sooner by electing William Smith, the democratic candidate, to congress next month.

The railroads, as well as the McKinley administration, is opposed to the passage through the senate of the Nicaragua canal bill, which passed the house several days ago. The transcontinental railroads have done everything in their power to delay the passage of this measure through congress, and thereby delay the building of the canal, on the ground that when the work was completed freight rates would be greatly decreased under competition with the shorter water route between the Atlantic and Pacific, and it does appear as if the McKinley administration has set itself at work to give aid to these railroad interests by its strange attitude toward the project which the people favor more than any other before congress. It is most probable that the railroads, assisted by administrative influences, will succeed in preventing the passage of the bill at this session of congress.

### TOPICS OF THE HOUR.

Louis Post's Public makes timely editorial comment on public questions, as follows: President McKinley's oriental dependent, the polygamist sultan of Suva, though not what we call civilized in domestic relationships, is capable of giving points to his sultan chief as to the phases of civilization. He knows that the foreigner does not pay tariff taxes. So at least the newspapers imply. They tell of his complaining to the British that the Americans, in disregard of a treaty of 1857 between Great Britain, Spain and Germany, in which Germany guarantees free trade for his dominions, have established a tariff that nearly doubles the prices of the goods that his subjects import.

By his resolution in the senate, demanding the evacuation of Cuba by the 4th of July, Senator Mason shows how vastly superior in shrewdness as a politician he is to the fatuous crowd in his party that surrounds McKinley. No one thing could do more at this moment to restore confidence in the republican party than the actual withdrawal of our troops from that beleaguered island. It would prove, what nothing less can prove, that the administration has no designs upon the independence of Cuba. If the republican party goes into the campaign with American military forces still in Cuba, it will confront a universal conviction that Cuba is to be Puerto-Ricanized.

It is interesting just now to watch the trade and financial papers in their struggle with the McKinley "prosperity" problem. When the bottom dropped out of steel, it burst all the pretty soap bubbles. If prices hadn't been cut, they could have charged Gates with arbitrarily making ducks and drakes of investors, consumers, workmen and all, and called him "a real wicked man." But the bottom of steel did drop. It had to. Gates had not created a bad situation, he had taken advantage of one. So the truth is beginning to come out. We have not had any genuine firmly based prosperity. It has been all soap bubbles—pretty to look upon but dreadfully sensitive to the touch.

That was a great joke on our Canadian friends at Windsor, who thought to rebuke some American school children for sending a message of sympathy to Omi Paul, by encouraging their school children to send a like message to Aguinaldo. So many Americans recognized the propriety of such a proceeding, not as a rebuke to any of their fellow citizens, but as a tribute to one of the weaker peoples fighting for liberty, that the school authorities at Windsor were overwhelmed with encouraging letters from the states. This incident may forcibly help our patriotic Canadian brethren to understand that some at least of the sympathy of this country for the South Africans, whose independence is threatened by British jingoes, is inspired by no traditional antipathy to Englishmen, but springs from the same democratic impulse that finds expression at home in sympathy for Aguinaldo's people whose independence is threatened by American jingoes.

The recalcitrant republicans of the house have taken advantage of the necessity of modifying the Puerto Rico government act, to force an amendment of the great franchise grab clause. And they have succeeded. Under this amendment, certain franchises must be approved by the president before they become operative, and all franchises are to be subject to amendment, alteration and repeal. There is a measure of safety here. Aside from the manifest outrage of allowing a foreign government

to deal out franchises for any people under any circumstances without their consent, it probably makes the franchise clause unobjectionable. Not that the requirement that the president approve is of much value. A president who belongs outright to the great plundering interests of the country, who was elected by them and depends upon them chiefly for re-election, and whose reelection is not likely to disturb their plans to any serious degree. But in the reserved right of repeal, there is at least promise of ultimate protection to the Puerto Ricans from American franchise grabbers.

The disposition of the senate, though by a slender majority, to suppress a declaration of sympathy with the Boers in their struggle to maintain the independence of their republic, is not a gratifying fact. Under the circumstances it is deplorable. For a distinct impression had been created that the American government sympathized with the British. This impression is deepened by the attitude of the administration, and it will be deepened still further if the senate remains silent upon the subject. So it will go abroad that the British, in the war of subjugation they are waging, have the sympathy of the American people. Yet that is not the fact. The American people, by an overwhelming majority, sympathize with the Boers. No one of intelligence here doubts this. Every observer knows it to be true. Max O'Rell, who has just returned from this country to England, assures the English of it. Some expression, then, of the national feeling ought to be made in an authoritative manner. If the government were really neutral, there would be no impropriety in maintaining silence. But as the government is not neutral, as it impresses all Europe as well as the British public with its British leanings, as it gives color to Chamberlain's assertion that there is "an understanding between statesmen"—for these reasons the senate owes it to the country to set the country right in the eyes of the world.
