THE WESTON NEIGHBORHOOD.

George Wall, Now 830 Foot Deep—Republican Club Rally.

The East Oregonian is indebted to the Weston Leader for the following items:

While catching baseball the other day, B. F. Swagart's young son had the third finger of his left hand badly injured. The ball struck his finger and something had to suffer from the force of the collision.

The sad news was telegraphed Tuesday to his friends and lodge brethren at Weston of the death of Wade H. Masor at Bakersfield, Calif. It has been much sorrow here, where he was a well known and highly respected citizen.

In account of the sterling strength and manliness of his character.

Dr. F. W. Vincent, Pendleton's energetic mayor, was in town Tuesday.

Dr. Vincent has been obliging enough to manage the republican campaign in this county, and came up to consult with the central committee here concerning registration of voters and other matters.

George D. Peabody, democratic candidate for county treasurer, was in town last week on a canvass of the East End. Mr. Peabody is an extensive farmer northwest of Pendleton, and has been a resident of the county for 25 years. He is well known and well liked, and will make a good race for treasurer.

One of the attractive features of the pioneer reunion at Weston, will be a race between gray-haired sprinters who must be over 65 years old. "Squire Powers is managing this event, and will endeavor to induce Ed Simpson, J. E. Saling, J. W. Young, Boston Burr, Mr. Slumway and other eligible citizens to contest with him.

All arrangements for the Umatilla County Pioneer Association's seventh annual reunion at Weston on May 31 and June 1 and 2, are progressing favorably. There is every prospect that the reunion will be the most successful in the annals of the association, and that the largest gathering of people ever witnessed in Umatilla county will assemble at Weston.

The well at Still brothers' place four miles north of town has been drilled to a depth of 830 feet without striking a sufficient supply of water, and operations have been suspended for the present. The well has already cost a small fortune, and the expense increases proportionately with depth.

The Still boys deserve credit for their enterprise and patience in prosecuting this work, and it is hoped that success will yet reward them.

Mr. and Mrs. J. N. York returned Saturday from North Carolina, bringing home a fine pair of twins born during their absence. Mr. York reports that from the Atlantic coast to Oregon the prospects for good crops this year are immense. He was accompanied by R. W. Davis, of Pine Ridge, S. I., who came out to see what Oregon is like. If satisfied with the country he intends to remain and cast his lot with the future of this growing state.

The McKinley and Hohart club of Weston held a rally at the opera house last evening. So far Weston voters have manifested much interest in political gatherings, and the audience for the rally was quite large.

By T. J. Kirk, candidate for the

legislature, and Lot Livermore, candidate for clerk. L. B. Reeder, who is again standing for a seat in the house, gave quite a lengthy address. Mr. Reeder's argument seemed to be mainly defensive of the government's policy concerning Puerto Rico and the Philippines. Both the legislative candidates expressed themselves in favor of a broad and liberal educational policy, and spoke kindly of the normal school here.

John Shaw is introducing a new variety of potato, called the "Mortgage Lifter." Two years ago he sent 25 cents east and received just one potato. He planted it, and last fall grew plenty of potatoes on two lots to supply the family, as well as furnish seed to several neighbors.

The "Mortgage Lifter" is a smooth-skinned, gentee-looking potato, with no knob-like protuberances that mark the plebeian spud. It is very prolific, and would never be any danger of a potato famine in Ireland if this variety was given a show. Mr. Shaw thinks that if given a general trial in this locality it will lead all other varieties in popularity.

TRAINING FOR FIELD DAY.

Public School Athletics Preparing for Saturday, May 19.

The first annual field day of the Pendleton public schools, to take place at Simpson & Pennington's racetrack on Saturday, May 19, is the occasion for regular training by the young men nowadays. The work of preparation is in the hands of Roy Conklin, assistant principal. Mr. Conklin is now getting ready his list of events and contestants, and in a few days will have it complete.

The events are to be open for the Pendleton public schools and the Weston normal school students, who will come down with some crackjacks, so the report is.

Of the Pendleton boys, four of the best have been sick this week, so that the training has been interfered with to that extent. Wyck, the crack sprinter, has been laid up, and is not yet out. It is hoped he will be able to participate in the contests, however. Wells, the board jumper, and Cronin and Hawks, all-round men, have been sick, but are out and will train from this time on.

The field day is to be preceded by the indoor physical culture entertainment at the Frazer opera house next Thursday evening, May 17. This is to be an entertainment of merit and will be more fully made known later.

It is desired to offer prizes for the fifteen events on field day. Assistant Principal Conklin will ask the business men to put up the prizes, asking in no instance for expensive things, but merely such articles as will furnish a list of suitable prizes.

The university of Washington and Whitman college had a field day on Wednesday, which was well attended. Gate receipts were \$200. The Union thus speaks of the affair:

"The state university visitors carried off the lion's share of the honors in the field day contests at the race track yesterday afternoon. The Whitman athletes showed lack of practice in every event, save the bicycle races, when the prowess of Walters, Moore and Toner gave cause for great rejoicing and partly compensated for the other fallen heroes.

"Over 500 people witnessed the sport and the glaring hot sun did not melt their enthusiasm for the majority preferred closer proximity to the shade of active operations than the shade of the grand stand afforded.

"Considering the condition of the track some fine records were made and four were broken, including the northwest record for 440 yard sprinters. George Harris of the Seattle Athletic club last year made a record of 53.2 seconds for this distance and Hantoun yesterday lowered this to 52.2-5. The previous university record was 53.4-5.

In the 880-yard run Morford lowered the university record held by himself, from 2:09 to 2:07.3-5. The record for the 220-yard dash was reduced from 23.1-5 to the time made by Vester last year—22.4-5. In the hurdle race, Caulkins lowered John Palmer's university record by 2-5 of a second."

An interesting event, one which will be on the program here on May 19 was the mile relay, which the Union thus describes:

"The last race was entered by Worthington, O. Lasater, Walter and Palmer for Whitman, and Thayer, Morford, Chestnut and Caulkins for the university. The first quarter was run by Caulkins and Walters; the latter lost ten yards for Palmer, his successor who gained some on Thayer during the second quarter. Chestnut and Worthington ran the third relay and turned the race over to Morford and Lasater. They came down the home stretch abreast and Morford won by a nose. Time, 3:43."

PRESIDENT MEDICAL SOCIETY.

Dr. Park Willis, of Seattle, Honored by the Physicians.

Dr. Park Willis, of Seattle, brother of Mrs. Lee Moorhouse, was honored by the state medical society of Washington at the annual meeting in Spokane on Wednesday, in being elected to the presidency for the coming year. Dr. Willis is a young man who has risen to eminence in his profession in the chief city of Washington, having one of the largest practices in Seattle.

At the meeting in Seattle, the society adopted a resolution, which, in view of the existence here in Pendleton of a well observed ordinance against expectorating on sidewalks, will be read with some interest:

"We the physicians assembled at the meeting of the state medical society, have noticed with gratification the clean condition of the sidewalks, public buildings and street cars in Spokane, which are unusually free from the disgusting sputa noticed in other cities of the state.

"Whereas, Tuberculosis is the cause of more deaths than any other disease and this being to a large extent preventable, and in order to check the rapid increase which is going on at present, we beg to call the attention of all cities and towns in the state of Washington to the effectual preventive methods which are now being enforced in the city of Spokane, viz., an ordinance prohibiting expectoration in halls of public buildings, street cars and sidewalks. Therefore be it

"Resolved, That the secretary of this society transmit a copy of this resolution to the officers of each city and town of the state of Washington, together with a copy of the ordinance of the city of Spokane, and that similar laws be passed and enforced in other cities of the state.

CONDUCTORS' ANNUAL PICNIC.

To Be at The Dalles on May 27—Over 2000 People Expected.

Passenger Conductor Wm. Dunn, of the O. R. & N. Pendleton-Portland run, announces the annual picnic of the order of Railway Conductors at The Dalles on May 27. Mr. Dunn is chairman of the committee of arrangements, the other members being Sam Veach, of the Southern Pacific; W. W. Farnell, of the Southern Pacific; J. A. Allison, of the O. R. & N.; and T. D. Hughes, a former conductor and now foreman of the yards of the terminal company at the union depot in Portland.

Mr. Dunn thus told of the picnic arrangements to the East Oregonian:

The conductors expected to run between 35 and 40 coaches to The Dalles from Western Oregon points, in which something like 2000 people will be carried. A train will be run from the Shillamette river; a train from Albany on the east side; a train from Dallas on the east side; a train from Dallas connecting with the main excursion train; and a train from Portland.

Persons desiring to go from points east from The Dalles may take west-bound train No. 1, arriving at The Dalles at 12:30, and come home on No. 4, which leaves Portland in the evening.

The conductors annual excursions have been the biggest excursions ever run in Oregon. This will be the ninth annual one. The Dalles people will exert themselves to entertain the excursionists, and all who attend will be sure to enjoy themselves.

Mail and express, No. 6, arrive at 6:05 a. m.; leave at 6:15 p. m.

Spokane branch—Pendleton passenger, No. 7, arrive at 5 p. m.

Spokane passenger, No. 8, depart at 7:45 a. m.

No. 41, mixed arrive from Walla Walla at 2 p. m.; No. 42, mixed, leave for Walla Walla at 5:55 p. m.; daily except Sunday.

Freight trains, westbound—No. 21, arrive at 9 a. m., leave at 9:45 a. m.; No. 23, arrive at 3:40 p. m.; leave at 4:45 p. m.

Eastbound—No. 22, arrive at 5:30 p. m.; leave at 6:30 p. m.; No. 24, arrive at 7:40 a. m.; leave at 8 a. m.

This brings in the westbound No. 1 at the same time as under the old card, and westbound No. 3 at 17 minutes later. The train from Portland will arrive in the morning at 6:05 a. m., or one hour and fifty minutes later than at present. The Spokane train arrives thirty minutes earlier.
