OPENING COLVILLE RESERVATION.

President issued Proclamation—Date is

October 10, 1900.

The advice from Washington have

been that the proclamation by the

president on April 10 opening up the

northern half of the Colville reservation,

while it will not take effect until

October 10, has produced already a

sensible stir among the settlers in the

southern part of the state as well as

in Oregon, Idaho and adjoining states

and territories. The land office is in

daily receipt of a number of communica-

tions from prospective settlers and

the outlook is that by the date set for

the opening of the reservation there

will be a large gathering awaiting the

opportunity to acquire land to be dis-

posed of under the homestead law at

the rate of \$1.50 per acre. Provision

will be made to guard against lawless-

ness, but because of the class of those

who have already signified their inten-

tion of purchasing, little or no trouble

is feared. They are mostly of the

prosperous class of farmers of the

southern part of Washington.

"The reservation was originally set

aside by the executive and it was then

held by executive order. It could not

be opened except by executive order. The

Indian commission made an agreement

that the United States should pay the

Indians \$1,500,000 for relinquishment

of this land. That agreement was

presented to congress in a bill for its

ratification, but was opposed by some

of the senators and it was then deter-

mined by some of the executive depart-

ments that it did not need an act of

congress to open the reservation and

that as the reservation had been set

aside by executive order it could be

opened by executive order. The In-

dian department feels, however, that

the agreement made with these Indians

regarding the payment of money should

be upheld as an act of good faith upon

the part of the government.

### AARON SPARKS FOUND DEAD.

Came to Death From Natural Causes.

Probably Heart Disease.

"We, the undersigned jurors, sworn  
to enquire of the death of Aaron S.  
Sparks, on oath do find that he came

to his death from natural causes, not  
being able to find any evidence of vio-

lence upon his person. We find that  
his name is Aaron S. Sparks, age 50

years, residence Pendleton.

Above is the verdict of the coroner's  
jury in the case of the death of Aaron  
Sparks, who was found dead beside

his home in south Pendleton across the  
railroad tracks. Early in the morn-

ing today, the report became current  
that Sparks came to death through vio-

lence, but the coroner's investigation  
removed all suspicion of that being  
true. Heart disease was probably the

cause of death.  
Aaron Sparks was 50 years of age.  
He was an old-timer in Pendleton. He

came here twenty-five years ago and  
during the first years of his residence  
in Pendleton was in business. He was

a quiet, inoffensive man with many  
friends among the old settlers and no

enemies among any class.  
The coroner's inquest disclosed these

facts:  
Sparks' body was found close beside

the door of the house in which he and  
his brother lived, his brother Henry  
Sparks being the first one to discover

it. Henry went home at 1 o'clock  
this morning, and as he was about to

pass into the gate, saw an object lying  
in the street. He first did not recog-

nize who it was, and turned away,  
moment later going back to Main street  
to notify an officer that a man was

lying in front of his house drunk or  
injured. He found Nightwatchman  
Secher, and with Walter Lindsey the

two returned to Sparks' house. As  
they raised the body, Henry Sparks  
recognized his brother. No marks of

violence could be found on the body,  
and no evidence of any struggling on  
the ground.  
The funeral occurs tomorrow from

Nelson's undertaking parlors at 2 p. m.
